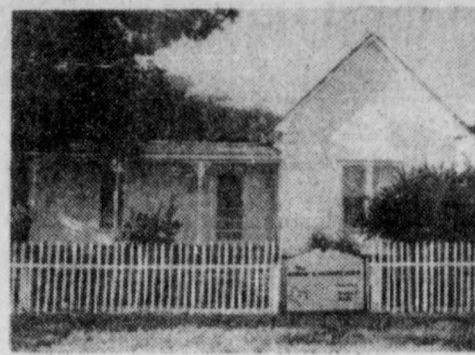

ANNUAL JUNIOR RODEO DEEMED A HUGE SUCCESS — RESULTS NOTED —

July 22-24, the Cross Plains Roping Club hosted its annual Junior Rodeo. Cowboys and cowgirls from 16 surrounding counties came to show their talents in riding and roping.

Local talent included Scott Mackey, River Dillard, Brandi Richey, Justin Dickson and John Peters. We also had an out-of-state entrant - Chris Crego from Palm Coast, Florida came to ride the bulls.

Events included steer/bull riding, breakaway roping, barrel racing, pole bending, flags, ribbon roping, tie-down roping and team roping.

All around buckles were given to the high-point boy and girls in each of 3 age groups. 10 and under, 11-14 and 15-19. The best were chosen from 140 entrants each night.

The Cross Plains youth impressed the crowd Thursday night - Brandi Richey, Scott Mackey and John Peters placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd respectively in breakaway roping. River Dillard also placed 3rd in breakaway Thursday night in his age group while Justin Dickson tried his hand at the steer riding.

The 10 and under all-around buckles went to Mitsy Schoen from Moran and Zac Harris from Zephyr. Mitsy had a 1st and two 2nd places in barrel racing to help her collect 29 points. Zac Harris won the steer riding all three nights and Saturday to accumulate 39 points.

Lara Woodall from Merkel and Cooper Hogg from Brownwood won the all-around buckles for the 11-14 age group. Lara had a good night Friday winning barrels and flags and won 2nd in breakaway and had an impressive 42 points. Cooper Hogg won breakaway Friday and Saturday and also did well in ribbon roping to collect 28 points.

The 15-19 all-around buckles were won by Tracie Ingram of Cisco and Jeff Kanady of Carbon. Tracie had impressive marks in the barrels, flags and poles while Jeff showed his skills in the roping events.

One hundred seventeen team roping teams tried their hand at a chance to win the Bill Dillard Memorial Buckle sponsored by the Bill Dillard family. Tory Morrison and Kipp Harrell were the lucky recipients with a time of 7.222. Tory Morrison is from Blanket and Kipp Harrell is from Brady.

Saturday night, Texas Legend performed country favorites under the stars and entertained a large crowd.

Hendrick Cancer Center Chosen STAR Trial

Hendrick Cancer Center has been selected as one of the institutions nation-wide to participate in the second NSABP (National Surgical Adjuvant Breast and Bowel Project) breast cancer prevention trial. The STAR (Study of Tamoxifen and Raloxifene) trial will be a five-year study comparing the two drugs for breast cancer prevention. Hendrick Cancer Center held a press conference Thursday, July 29 in the lobby of Hendrick Cancer Center.

It is expected 50-100 women will participate. Nation-wide, the STAR program will have 22,000 women participate. In order to qualify for the study, candidates must be postmenopausal, 35 years or older and have an increased risk for

developing breast cancer. Participants will receive close follow-up examinations, including a mammogram, physical exam and gynecologic exams on a regular basis.

Dr. Milan Patel, Hendrick Cancer Center, will serve as the local principal investigator. "We are very excited about participating in this trial. It is the largest breast cancer prevention trial ever conducted. It is a privilege to bring this opportunity to community members in the Texas Midwest," said Patel.

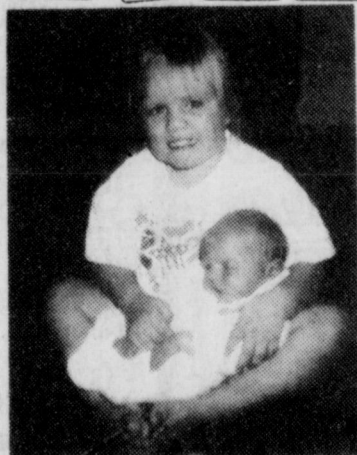

TRIAD Minutes

Minutes of the Callahan County TRIAD/S.A.L.T. Advisory Council, July 14, 1999, Multi-Purpose Center, Cross Plains, TX. 3:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Esther Kerr. The invocation was given by Dr. E. Richard Chaffin, pastor of the Cross Plains First United Methodist Church.

Nancy Gresham of Austin, guest speaker, was introduced by Chairman Esther Kerr. Nancy is Outreach Coordinator of TRIAD and Specialist in the Elder Law and Public Health Division of the Office of Texas Attorney General John Cornyn. She spoke on the purpose of, the need for, ways and means for funding (2 examples), and other TRIAD matters, bringing the council up-to-date on Attorney General Cornyn's endeavors and support for TRIAD. He recently resigned the Texas TRIAD Agreement and promised to facilitate the prosecution of crimes against the elderly.

Ms. Gresham stated that the Attorney General has pledged an additional 100 TRIAD'S by the year 2000. There are presently approximately 100 TRIAD'S in Texas, of these only about 1/3 are currently active.

The Texas TRIAD Conference and the National TRIAD Conference are both scheduled for this fall. The Texas Conference is to be in Austin, and the National is to be in Baton Rouge, Louisiana.

Chairman Esther next welcomed Rev. Wayne Lenz, pastor of First Baptist Church to the meeting.

The council then went into the business meeting.

Copies of the minutes of the June meeting were mailed by Secretary Kay Mosley to each member and were read by each individually. The minutes were approved as written.

Esther called on the following members for reports.

Sharon Parr - Grants - She reported she is progressing with work on obtaining grants for funding and needs additional information from council members to add to applications for grants. She reported that she has at least 1/2 dozen foundations to which we can apply.

Anita Mays, Coordinator of the local council, provided input on some of the councils goals, which is to aid the elderly, the physically challenged and other in need and with problems they encounter and to work toward preventing and reporting crimes against senior citizens. Currently one goal is raising funds to provide an "Are You OK" calling program for the homebound, senior citizens and the handicapped. Presently the sheriff's department is facing the dilemma of finding space for the "Are You OK" caller system equipment. Anita stated she thought it would be of benefit to the council to visit and view a caller system already in operation for the councils information, instruction and for ideas pertinent to the matter. She stated that the Callahan County TRIAD/S.A.L.T. Advisory Council is one of the sponsors, as listed on the brochures of the Barbarian Tradesday Festival, scheduled for September 4, '1999, for which TRIAD will have the hamburger stand, which is the current fundraiser on which we are working.

Joe Howser - Neighborhood Watch - Joe reported he is organizing a program to distribute refrigerator cards and magnets for and to assist the elderly and homebound in filling out the cards. He is working with a map to instigate, promote and provide block captains for the Neighborhood Watch program. He

reports receiving contributions from interested citizens to obtain materials and brochures toward this end.

Next on the agenda Esther stated that TRIAD and Methodist Mission now are co-sponsoring a program to aid those in need of food and other items. She introduced Betty Edwards - Chairperson of the Methodist Mission Committee.

Betty included in her talk a brief history of the Food Pantry. The first food drive was held in December 1987, with the pantry beginning in 1988. The Methodist Mission has been involved with the food pantry since then. They have also assisted with other needs of the needy such as clothing, volunteers, Christmas gifts for the children, etc. They also assisted CTO with initiating the Meals on Wheels program locally as well. A food drive is badly needed to benefit the Food Pantry which will in turn benefit those who need and request assistance. They are inviting assistance to aid in this endeavor such as volunteers, donations of food, clothing, money, etc..

Dr. Chaffin emphasized if interested are also welcome to assist.

Esther stated that plans are to have volunteers at the Multi-Purpose Center 9-5 weekdays to assist those applying or help. This is for all of Callahan County to aid the elderly, physically challenged, the needy, local as well as transients. Clyde has a similar operation already in progress.

Dr. Chaffin stated after calling on Rev. Lenz for verification; that at the last pastors meeting a need for a central clearinghouse to monitor the number of times individuals apply for assistance to various local churches and organizations was discussed. Rolan Jones, having had some experience in a similar program has agreed to serve in the capacity of clearinghouse for this program.

Rolan stated that we have not had much problem with this type of activity which is indicative of the low crime rate and the good job which local law enforcement does.

Leonard commented that we need to remember to honor the confidentiality of those who apply for and need assistance and to always leave them their dignity as stated last meeting by Betty Edwards.

The meeting adjourned. The next meeting will be at 3:00 p.m. Wednesday, August 11 at the Multi-Purpose Center.

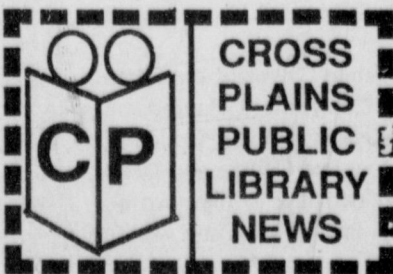
