She recalled her dad purchasing an Aladdin's lamp for a bale of cotton and they couldn't believe how much brighter this was than the regular oil burning lamps. She still has the original lamp, as her sister June Hughes had it converted to. electricity and it's still providing

once used. Mother and Richard talked about the spiders that were always present, yet no one was ever bitten. I remember Granny Ethel had a chamber pot she kept beside the bed at the ranch house. I would not enjoy returning to those days.

Richard recollected sleeping under a pile of quilts, so heavy you could hardly move. The houses back then were not insulated. I don't see how they kept warm at all, but everyone survived.

When we began thinking about all the changes that would be necessary if the electricity went -- it was pretty

We teased about some adjustments and how it would change everyone's life. My son-in-law, Chris Orum, said, "Well, I guess I know what my job would be --cutting wood and trash detail." Everyone would have to pull together and daily living would be much more challenging.

Since we are so spoiled to the modern conveniences, can you imagine how hard it would be to adjust. However, it probably wouldn't hurt any of us to experience such, just so we would appreciate how wonderful we have

Can you imagine life without the micro-wave, hot water heaters, heating units, air conditioners, all the handy dandy appliances, televisions, radios, computers, etc. All the time-saving devices have pushed us into a fast paced world that could stand some slowing

I found out that Richard had planned to scare me by sneaking out about midnight and flickering the electricity. It is a good thing he didn't -- I probably couldn't have stood the shock.

You have to admit, this will be a memorable New Year's Eve and what an honor to witness the beginning of a new millennium!

The seat has been vacant over a year after the resignation of the elected Constable. Filing for the Constable Precinct #4 position at Cross Plains were Tom Rumfield and Bill Young.

· Tom Rumfield filed for the Precinct #4 Constable position on Friday, December 31. Rumfield, 43, resides at 19260 FM 604 South in Oplin. A telephone technician, Rumfield has resided in the state 21 years and in the county eight years.

William "Bill" Young filed for the Precinct #4 Constable place on Monday, January 3. Young, 64, lists an address at P.O. Box 428 in Cross Plains. He has resided in the state 64 years and in Callahan County 12 years. Young is retired.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at Rose Hill Cemetery in Merkel, directed by Starbuck Funeral Home.


Katherine Opal **Bodine**







Beeping world...

It was morning, very early. The furnace was taking the chill out of the air as I heated water in the microwave for the tea that would warm my insides. I pushed the buttons on the microwave out of habit. Beep (the power "on" button), beep-beep-beep (two minutes and thirty seconds), beep! (that was "start!").

Beep-beep-beep-beep. That's five beeps to tell me the water is hot.

Then there was another beep. I wondered if it was the beep to indicate a power outage.

Nope. The lights were still on, the refrigerator still hummed, and all the clocks on the wall, the radio, and the VCR were still saying 5:24

There it was again! Is it the microwave doing something weird?

It's a noisy world this generation lives in. Our phones beep when we push the "on" button, when we dial, each time we choose a path on a business phone menu, and again when we set the receiver back in the cradle. We are instructed of the many beeps and often long beeps we have to wait for before leaving a message on the answering machine.

I get really confused when there's a beep from any of these things on a TV program. I have run through the house to answer a phone, only to hear someone on a TV show say, "Hello?"

By now, I'm on my second cup of tea (beep - beep, beep, beepbeep!) and still at the microwave, heating goat milk bottles for twin goat kids. I heat it slowly, stirring between the beeps. It must be warm enough for the little critters whose normal body temperature is a few degrees warmer than humans. I keep hearing beeps in between the

It took me several hours to trace down the sporadic signals. It was the phone charger, calling the phone back to its cradle. They'd


