"A Tribute to Mabel F. Halsell"

In the past, Mrs. Halsell had written several memorial tributes to friends which were published in the Cross Plains Review and I was impressed by her expression of love and admiration. It seemed the perfect gift. Following her example, it has been my pleasure to memorialize several individuals and I especially wanted to honor Mabel F. Halsell.

As John Swift noted at her service, she personified the word "teacher". You just knew she was a teacher by her countenance. She touched the lives of many, instructing them concerning basic subjects, the arts, and in faith. Eugene Wilcoxen, a former student, eulogized his teacher with loving memories.

I was not privileged to have her as an instructor, but my Granny Loma Atwood was a personal friend of Mrs. Halsell and that is how I first met her. The two of us became friends quickly and I so enjoyed her little visits at the office when she was still driving. Often she brought poetry she had composed and it was published in the newspaper. After she became house-bound Mrs. Halsell would call and chat sometimes. She was delightful to talk with.

When I interviewed her last year for her 95th birthday, the three hours I spent with her were like a breath of fresh air. Her brilliant mind simply fascinated me. This lady truly knew what life was all about and how to live it. We would all do well to follow in her footsteps.

She was completely devoted to her Lord, her marriage, her children and her career. Her strong faith in the Lord was present in all her endeavors. Mrs. Halsell was active in her church serving as a Sunday School teacher at the Presbyterian Church. For years she was able to climb the steep steps of the church to worship her Lord.

The letter her granddaughter Louann Bates read at the service was so beautiful. She described all the grandchildren's relationship with Mabel as being "story book" quality. What a great legacy!

She finished her career as math teacher for many years at Woodson High School near Throckmorton.

She was a loyal member of Cross Plains Presbyterian Church, where she taught a Sunday School class for many years. Ten days before her death, she continued to work on her personal commentary on the Old Testament. She wrote poetry. Austin Writers League honored her several years ago by publishing one of her poems. She also won several awards for her poetry. Active in her home until her final illness, she will be fondly remembered by her many former students and missed greatly

by her family.


Buffaloes Suffer First District Loss

Watching her and listening to the clack-clack of the keys took me back 100 years to high school typing class. I pictured the drills and exercises and the frequent timed tests that strengthened weak


Baird Fire Department Receives Donation from Texas Farm Bureau
