THIRD OF WORLD'S RAILROADS BUILT IN QUARTER OF CENTURY

Totaling approximately 750,000 miles according to figures prepared by the National City Bank of New York, the world's railroads, if placed in a single line, would reach to the moon and back and encircle the globe nearly eleven times. This amount represents an increase of 250,000 miles since 1900. Nearly all of the mileage has been built in the last seventy-four years, for in 1850 the world boasted only 25,000 miles of lines, less than is owned now by a single great system in the United

About thirty-five per cent of the railroads are under government ownership, it is estimated. Conditions of government control and operation vary in different countries, and in the United States, Great Britain and Spain practically all the lines are under private ownership.-Popular Mechanics

LONDON, June 19.-Without formal announcement to that effect, London has broken diplomatic relations with Mexico to the extent of recalling H. Cunard Cummins, agent, and by abandoning the proposed recognition mission which was to have been headed by Sir Thomas Hohler.

A total eclipse of the sun is visible on the earth every 120 years, but our span of years here is much shorter than that.

When we set out upon our life's work, little realizing what a comparatively short time we are to be here, how many of us decide what our aim in life shall be, and then set about as thoroughly to reach it as this newspaper reporter did in the accomplishment of his task?

If the Santa Fe intends to build from the Plains into Fort Worth via Benjamin, as reports indicate, exact plans for such a route are not known

Just before the World War the Santa Fe made an effort to purchase the Gulf, Texas and Western, which runs from Seymour to Mineral Wells, but whose Santa Fe before was a disagreement as to price.

MUSIC OF THE LAPPS RESEMBLES WAGNER'S

Karl Tiren has just returned to Stockholm with hundreds of phonograph records of the strange music of the Lapps, the mysterious nomad people who roam Lapland, far to the north of Sweden and Norway.

Mr. Tiren found that the Lapps have no "swear words" in their language, being perhaps unique among peoples in this respect, but that they have wrath songs and have thus, in a sense, exalt-

ed profanity into an art. The typical Lapp song contains a melodious metrical and rhythmical text without rhyme. The music is descriptive of the theme and there are "leit-motifs" for each person, animal or thing. The bear, the reindeer, the river, the hill, each has its peculiar

Many pieces of Lapp music strongly resemble Wagner's. An example is a song about a bear that attacks a reindeer; it is a close parallel to one of the motifs in "Rheingold."

Mr. Tiren's collection includes medicine men's incantations, laments, wrath-songs and a large number of descriptive tunes.



CORN FOR SHORT SEASONS

The development of a variety of corn that will grow and mature in a short season of cool weather is to be attempted by the corn investigators of the United States Department of Agriculture. Short season varieties are the northern edge of the United States some of which mature in less than 90 days, but they require high temperatures during the growing season. There are places in the Northwest, as in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, where the season is short and where there is not enough warm growing weather to mature these short season varieties.
