Darrell Hargrove and his son were in the office at the same time and he remarked that a man had related seeing sugar gliders in the wild in this area.

They were probably someone's pets and they set them free. Don't be surprised if you see one. At least now you will know what they are!

To make a long story short, the insurance company was notified and the library learned that it would pay for damages from collapse in the amount of approximately \$1,800. In order to repair the floor right (so it wouldn't collapse further), we needed \$3,100 plus the cost of treating both buildings for termite infestation and damage.

Just when the Cross Plains Public Library was experiencing "that sick feeling you have when a major and unexpected repair becomes necessary", it was thrilled to receive a most generous gift of \$5,000 from Mrs. A.G. (Phelo) Thompson of Hamilton. "Mrs. Thompson and her late husband, A.G., have been major donors in charitable endeavors over the past twenty years that we have been friends," stated Mary Ann Chaffin, president of the library board. "They gave the land and partial financing for the beautiful

library in Hamilton...Mrs. Thompson recently bought a CT Scan machine for the Hamilton Hospital...they are generous with the New Horizons Center for emotionally disabled children in Goldthwaite ... and many, many other philanthropic endeavors. We are so thankful for this generous, unrestricted gift from Mrs. Thompson!"

New school immunization requirements effective Aug. 1

The Texas Department of Health has made some changes in immunization guidelines recently.

Hepatitis B Vaccine Children born between September 2, 1988 and September 1, 1992 must have proof of three doses of Hepatitis B vaccine within 30 days after their 12th birthday.

Children born on or after September 2, 1992 must have proof of 3 doses of Hepatitis B

This is a 3 shot series that takes approximately 6 months to complete, so it is advised to start

Varicella (Chicken Pox) Vaccine Children born between

September 2, 1988 and September 1, 1994 must have one dose of vericella vaccine on or after their first birthday or within 30 days of their 12th birthday; or proof of the disease.

Children born or after September 2, 1994 must have 1 dose of varicella vaccine on or after their 1st birthday or proof of the

One Rabies Case Reported in 12 month period in 1999

Callahan County reported one positive rabies case, involving a rabid cat, during the twelve-month period of 1999, according to the Texas Department of Health.

Some 16 animals were tested for rabies between January 1999 to December 1999 and only one test came back positive.

The Texas Department of Health tested some seven cats during the year, with the one positive and six negative results. During the year, there were five dogs tests for the disease in 1999, with all coming up negative. One skunk, one raccoon, one bovine, one equine and one listed in the "other" category, all came up negative for rabies.

The Texas Department of Heath tested some 9,861 animals during 1999 with 400 cases, just over four for every 100 cases, reported as positive for rabies. Positive skunk cases led the way for rabies with 192 cases of rabies. There were 90 bats tested positive, 56 fox, four

raccoons, 13 dogs, 21 cats and eight cows tested positive for rabies in 1999. The Department of Health reported nine horses tested positive for rabies in 1999, three goats tested positive, two coyotes, and two bobcats tested positive in

The 400 positive case reported in 1999 was up 93 from 303 reported positive cases in 1998. There were 266 positive cases of rabies in 1997 and 351 cases of rables in 1996. Both 1995 and 1994 had 590 positive cases of rabies in Texas.

Freestone County, located in East Texas south of Corsicana, led Texas in the number of positive rabies cases last year with 45. Tom Green County and Limestone County (which borders Freestone County) reported 18 positive cases for rabies in 1999. Erath County reported 13 positive cases for rabies in 1999.

Byrd Began New Job At Cisco Junior College

"The Lord wants me to give back, to help kids find the right direction" says twenty nine year-old National Football League (NFL) retiree, Israel Byrd, whose path to Cisco Junior College was a winding and interesting trail of experience through St. Louis, Utah, California, Europe and Nashville. Byrd just began his new job coaching defensive secondary and wide receivers at Cisco Junior College in January after an injury forced him into retirement from the game he loves.

The oldest of four children of a single mother reared in the ghetto of East Saint Louis, Byrd has a motto for his life, "Think about your goals every day, and don't let anyone take you off of that path. Focus on those goals everyday; see them become reality." Those thoughts and that focus saw Byrd through being bussed an hour one way to high school during the desegregation of schools in East Saint Louis, through junior college at Allen Hancock Community College and Utah State University before six successful football seasons with the New Orleans Saints, the Tennessee Titans and two European NFL teams, the Scottish Claymores and the Berlin Fire. Byrd's younger brother, Isaac, is in his fourth season as a wide receiver with the Tennessee Titans and was a starter in this year's Super Bowl.

Though Coach Byrd could have

accepted a position coaching for an NFL team, he chose to begin his coaching career at Cisco Junior College. Byrd went through the NFL Players Association for advice on his career after playing professional football, where he learned that CJC had a coaching position open. He knew that Texas junior college football had a reputation for being the best in the country, and decided to apply for the job. Excited about the opportunity to have someone with his knowledge and experience of the game, the CJC Athletic Director, Jeff Schaum, hired him after conducting a phone interview. Coach Byrd accepted the position without even visiting the campus. Byrd says that after he was offered the job he prayed about the decision to come to Texas and feels very content with his choice. "I am focoused on helping the kids with their lives and their game...I know where these kids are coming from, I

Byrd could easily afford to purchase a home in the Cisco area; however, because of his commitment to be available to mentor the students, he has agreed to live in the athletic dorms on the campus of CJC. When asked if he ever felt like his life was a wonderful dream, he smiles and simply says, "I knew I was blessed." CJC has every right to be proud of their newest employee.



as 1.2 million working Americans missed out on \$751 million in Earned Income Tax Credits by not filing a tax return.

Don't let this happen to you! Each Saturday, beginning January 29 through February 25, 2000, taxpayers qualifying for the Earned Income Credit can get free assistance. Visit the local IRS at 341 Pine St., Abilene, Texas 79601, from 8:30 a.m.-12:30p.m.

The Earned Income Tax Credits is a refundable credit for hardworking people. It is designed for working taxpayers whose adjusted gross income is under \$30,580 with two or more qualifying children resulting in a tax credit as much as \$3,816. The credit could be as much as \$2,312 for working taxpayers whose income is under \$26,928 having one qualifying child. Working taxpayers, between the ages of 18 and 25, with no children whose income is under \$10,200 could walk away with a credit as much as \$347.

"For those who qualify," the IRS says, "you must file a return to get the refundable credit." Qualifying taxpayers are encouraged to bring original Forms W-2 or 1099s issued by their employees and valid social security cards for each person who will be listed on the





Campaign signs not allowed in highway right-of-way

ABILENE, Texas - As the election season moves into high gear, candidates and campaign workers are reminded to be careful where they place campaign signs.

Such signs are not allowed on state highway right of way, which is reserved for official traffic control signs. Campaign signs erected on highway right of way will be removed by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the owner can be charged for removal costs

In addition, a person placing an unauthorized sign in highway right of way can be fined up to \$500 per

"The law is intended to keep highway right of way clean and uncluttered so that official traffic control signs are clearly visible for the safety

of the traveling public," said Wes Heald, TxDOT executive director. "It means you can't place signs on trees, utility poles, traffic signs or other objects in the highway right

Campaign signs can be placed on private property with the landowner's permission if they meet certain restrictions. Signs must be made of lightweight material and be no larger than 50 square feet. They can be erected no sooner than 90 days before an election and must be removed 10 days after the election.

Signs within city limits may be subject to local ordinances.

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

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


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

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Rep. Stenholm's Ag Talk

By Charlie Stenholm February 18,2000 "Rural Local Broadcast Signal Act"

On Wednesday, February 16, the House Agriculture Committee reported out the "Rural Local Broadcast Signal Act." This legislation would establish a loan guarantee program within the Department of Agriculture, Rural Utility Service, to provide local broadcast television signals in unserved and underserved rural areas.

This bill passed the Committee with broad support and actually compliments a law passed last year allowing satellite companies, for the first time ever, to retransmit a local network signal back into the same local market area

As a result of that law, cable wireless providers are able to compete with local cable providers by offering the same service, giving consumers greater access to network television stations. With increased competition, consumers benefit through lower prices, better service and more choice in cable and wireless television service.

Echo Star and DirectTV are the only satellite television providers in the U.S. and, unfortunately, they claim they do not have the capac-

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ity to provide local-into-local network signals for the nation's 210 television markets.

In fact, by the end of this year Echo Star and DirectTV will offer service in only 30 of the largest television markets. These companies, incidentally, have no plans to expand beyond the top 30 markets anytime soon.

The legislation reported out of the Agriculture Committee earlier this week was introduced to help provide local-into-local network broadcast service to the other 180 television markets. The loan guarantee program will fund projects to provide local broadcast television signals into small and rural markets.

People living in rural areas deserve to have access to the benefits of local programming-local news, weather, sports and most importantly emergency information service. Since local television is one of our most vital safety information resources in times of natural disaster or other emergencies, this legislation has the potential to improve quality of life and save lives...

AUSTIN-Recruiting teachers from other countries and paying court fines online--just some of the innovative programs featured in the February issue of Texas Innovator, a monthly newsletter published by Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander.

School districts nationwide are facing serious teacher shortages, and some cities are going global to find teachers. Chicago public schools are recruiting teachers from foreign countries to teach math, science and foreign languages to help fill 400 vacancies. New York City schools hired 31 math and science teachers recruited from Austria in the last school year.

The foreign teachers will receive temporary teaching certificates and must complete requirements for a standard state teaching certificate within four years.

Texas Innovator also features a Website called SchoolCash.com, which helps schools raise money by returning portions of each purchase from participating online retailers to a school selected by the consumer.

SchoolCash.com includes more than 150 online merchants, including OfficeMax, ToysRUs, Starbucks Coffee and Petsmart, with rebates ranging from 5 percent to 20 percent for selected schools.

Also featured in Texas Innovator is E-Court, Inc., and Austin-based software company that developed software to pay court fines online. E-Court, Inc. has contracted with several municipal courts in Texas,

including Laredo. Laredo city officials expect the software to cut down on staffing needs and allow them to collect health fees and delinquent property taxes online.

Texas Innovator is a publication of the Comptroller's Center for Best Practices, a division created by Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander to identify innovation on a local, state, national and internantional scale.
