


\$3,000,000 in total output, with over \$750,000 income into the local community is the possibility of one year of operation by two new home grown businesses in Cross Plains was the good news from Bob Forman to the Kiwanis luncheon meeting October 17 along with a good rain that started during the meeting. A large turnout of civic leaders and visitors joined the local Kiwanians to hear the Economic Impact Analysis prepared by Forman, who is the remaining Economic Development specialist in the Abilene office after the reorganization of WTU into AEP. He has been assisting local communities with their economic development since 1996. Forman analyzed the impact of Barr Manufacturing and Potter Game Tables who have started new businesses here. Forman was introduced by Dr. Charles Rodenberger, who commented that new businesses could provide a stable economy for Cross Plains for years to come. Home grown businesses are more likely to stay in the community than are businesses that come in from the outside, as happened to the furniture manufacturing business in Santa Anna. A major problem for new startups is getting initial funding. Forman

gave several ways that the community could assist developing companies, including adding another one-half cent sales tax to the current tax that is used for economic development. Steve Mack, bank president and chair of the Economic Development Committee stated that this small increase would bring an additional badly needed \$28,000 for assisting new companies. Keith Lawrence, with Lawrence Farm and Ranch Supply, a EDC member, stated that the lack of the tax has not brought new business to Cross Plains, and the added tax would bring the city to the same tax as all of the large surrounding cities where many local citizens shop.

Both new companies are also looking for investors that would share profits from the successful operation of the companies, which




The business session begins at 5:30 p.m. Supper will be served at 6:00 p.m. The evening meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m.


Betty Hardwick Center elects new officers


Eighth Annual Brownwood Arts & Crafts Festival to be Held Oct. 28-29

Total crude oil production in Callahan County for the month of July was 20,385 barrels of oil.


The total oil production in Callahan County during June 2000 was 23,990 barrels of oil. Total gas production in June was 110,017 MCF of natural gas.

Other oil production months for Callahan County include: July 1999 with 23,231 barrels of oil, August with 22,238 barrels of crude, September 1999 with 21,222 barrels of oil, October with 22,873 barrels, November with 21,686 barrels, December 1999 with 22,404 barrels, January 2000 with 22,083 barrels, February with 22, 175 barrels, March with 22,292 barrels, April with 20,013 barrels and May with 21,121 barrels.

Big Country area counties oil and gas production for July 2000 include: Brown, 139,353 MCF of gas and 9,146 barrels of oil; Coleman; 137,660 MCF of gas and 28,122 barrels of oil; Eastland, 441,031 MCF of gas and 24,955 barrels of oil; Jones, 62,135 MCF of gas and 61,251 barrels of oil; Runnels, 102,972 MCF of gas and 49,318 barrels of oil; Shackelford, 415,554 MCF of gas and 83,168 barrels of oil; Stephens, 916, 145 MCF of natural gas and 25,396 barrels of oil; and Taylor County, 27,091 MCF of gas and 49,330 barrels of oil.

The state's ton oil producing in July was Gaines with 2,786,061 barrels of oil. The top gas producing county in the state in July was Webb with 26,073,368 MCF.

Texas oil and gas production in July came from 146,445 oil and 54,492 gas wells.







Deer season opens in County Nov. 4

Landowners and sportsmen are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Callahan County will begin on Saturday, November 4, 2000 and run through Sunday, January 7, 2001.


As in the past, no special antierless deer permits or tags will be required for harvesting antierless (doe) deer in Callahan County. Only the appropriate tag from the required hunting license will be necessary.

Annual fall deer surveys are conducted during August and September each year to determine overall deer density, reproduction and sex ratios. Because it is impossible to survey each individual ranch, standard survey lines are established and conducted each year. By collecting this trend information over a period of years, it is impossible to make density estimates and general harvest recommendations for a particular area. It should be stressed that these

harvest recommendations are very general. Deer densities may very greatly in a given area, even between adjoining ranches. A ranch which is overstocked, overgrazed, and/or over hunted will not support as many deer as a well managed ranch where selective harvest is practiced.

Therefore it is important for each landowner to look closely at his existing deer herd and decide how many deer need to be harvested, if any. The bag limits established by the Texas Parks and Wildlife department are intended to be used as broad guidelines, which will ac-

commodate most areas of the county. Even though the legal bag limit in Callahan County is 3 deer limit 1 buck, there are several areas where few if any deer need to be removed. The landowner can and should make the final decision as to how many deer and what sex may be taken from the property. As we grow older and the daily activities of life slowly become an ever-increasing chore, many of us begin to wonder what the future has to hold for us. Will we ultimately wind up in a Nursing Home stuck in a little room with someone we don't know, be a burden on our children, or will we be able to retain some of our independence and dignity?

Kenneth Hickman, of Austin, brother of the groom performed the double ring ceremony. Glen Hickman of Proctor was his


brother's best man and Marcus and Hayden Hickman of Dublin served as their father's groomsman and ring bearer.


