





This week has been saddened by the passing of a dear friend, Dennis Daniell.

I will never forget the first time I met him about 4 years ago. He was so timid that you hurt for him. It is amazing how much he had changed and grown over the years. He had conquered many troubles in life with such courage. Some of Dennis' battles were with circumstances that the rest of us take for granted. He was the kindest and most polite young man you can ever imagine. It was yes ma'am and no ma'am with every response. He was attentive to opening doors, even to the car -- a true gentleman.

Dennis didn't look his age and it was difficult to remember that he was 44. Being very careful about his appearance, he dressed in cowboy fashion. He appreciated a good Stetson hat with a tall crown. He informed me that this came from his high school bull riding days. He thought it was funny that lots of people thought he was probably bald, since he wore the hat consistently. However, he had a full head of hair and kept it perfectly. Music was Dennis' comfort zone. He liked soft rock and country western. If he discovered you cared for a cor tain artist it was his greatest pleasure to give you a gift of a tape. He had given me several tapes over the years and this morning I listened to one

while I dressed for work. This time I listened with my heart and all the songs had a special meaning.

When he chose a card for anyone he would search diligently until he found just the right words to express his feelings, that ran very deep. At first it was difficult for him show any expression of affection and he would pat me on the top of the head. Later he could finally give you a big old bear


He was a rare individual and I am so glad that I had the opportunity to know him.

Dennis was in the process of completing his GED and wanted to better himself. He told me a few weeks ago he had a dream of building a house on his place. It seems he had come full circle in finding his self-confidence -- what an accomplishment. Katherine Carter, who delivered his eulogy, summed it up when she said, "Dennis gave a special meaning to friendship." It was apparent that she knew him well. He was somehow miraculously there for me every time I had an emergency. He came to my rescue when I had a flat on the car or it wouldn't start in the morning. Richard goes to work very early and it is difficult to reach him, so I would

call Dennis. Often I have said, "What would I do without Dennis?" The prospect is dim.

I feel that the Lord had a special place of comfort just for Dennis. We will miss him dearly

In writing these memories, I have attempted to apply the philosophy of a dear friend who says, "Grief divided by two is lessened."

Applications Being Accepted

"Applications for emergency farm loans caused by drought and excessive heat occuring January 1, 2000, and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Anson," Marilyn S. Richer said today.

'Callahan, Eastland, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, and Taylor Counties are six of 243 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought and excessive heat." Marilyn S. Richer said, "Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent."

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least an 80 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FSA emergency loan," Marilyn S.

Richer said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under the emergency designation will be accepted until August 20, 2001 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backloss in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Marilyn S. Richer said.

FSA is a credit agency of the United States Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.



3252 VIETNAM-DIABETES-The possibility of a diabetes epidemic in the United States has spurred a call for Vietnam War Veterans to seek a routine health examination for the disease. Type II diabetes, often referred to as "the hidden killer" affects 16 million Americans, and Vietnam Veterans, most of whom are over 50 years old, are clearly at risk, said VA Subcommittee on Health chairman Cliff Stearns. Veterans who served in Vietnam and have not had this

routine test in the past several years should inquire about it.

Later word finds that the path has been cleared for Vietnam War Veterans infected with type II diabetes to receive disability payments and health-care benefits because of possible exposure to Agent Orange and other herbicides during the war.

VETERANS STAMP-The US Postal Service recently unveiled a new commemorative first class postage stamp entitled "Honoring Veterans" that is scheduled for release May 1, 2001. This follows four stamps offered last year honoring Sgt. York, General Omar Bradley, John L. Hines and Texas' own Audie Murphy.






When May came into the 3rd quarter they had their guns loaded. They wanted the ball and they went after

Rep. Keffer ready to help rural Texas

AUSTIN - A House committee has released a report on rural development that experts say could help Rural Texas meet its economic potential, according to Representative Jim Keffer (R-Eastland)

The report, by the House Select Committee on Rural Development, identifies critical issues facing rural Texas, the experts said in testimony last Thursday, January 25 before the Rural Caucus of the Texas Legislature.

Keffer, who serves the counties of Eastland, Callahan, Hood, Palo Pinto, Runnels, Shackelford, Stephens, and Taylor in part is a member of the Rural Caucus and served on the interim committee that released the report.

"The findings of this report are crucial to rural development in House District 60," said Keffer. "Speaker of the House Pete Laney has recognized the importance of a comprehensive rural policy for the state of Texas by appointing this committee and supporting its recommendations. I am proud to stand with Speaker Laney and other members of the Rural Caucus in finding new ways to meet the needs of rural Texans."

"Texas has reaped enormous benefits from a new economy that emphasizes services, manufacturing and high tech, but not all of our rural areas have shared in the prosperity," Laney said. "The Legislature now has a unique opportunity to extend a helping hand. Rural Texans are hard-working and resourceful. Working together, state lawmakers and local leaders can find ways to create more rural jobs so that young people don't have to move away to pursue an education or raise their families, Improving economic opportunities will breathe new life into our rural communities and small towns.'

Caucus members, including both House and Senate members, plan to file a number of bills vital to the development of rural Texas. The bills range from one which would create new tax-free agricultural development districts to help local producers compete with large corporations to one that would refocus the majority of rural development efforts into one state agency. Rural lawmakers also expect to file bills to give more funding to rural community colleges, provide counties wider authority to regulate and control growth and change the term for Texas House members from two to four-years.

"The 77th Legislative Session could prove very significant for rural Texans, including residents in District 60," Keffer said. "Not only is it a redistricting session in which the boundaries of many rural legislative districts may change, but important legislative actions could determine how rural communities will survive in the future."

Rep. Judy Hawley, D- Portland, and chair of the Rural Caucus, said issues on telecommunications infrastructure, transportation funding and education will also be on the rural agenda.

"There are no easy solutions to the problems that face rural Texas," Hawley said. "But we firmly believe that rural Texans deserve access to good health care, the ability to get on the information highway, the best education available and the opportunity to live and work in their hometowns, without having to leave for a job in the City."

Rep. Hawley lauded the work of Rep. Keffer on issues important to rural Texans. "Jim Keffer has been an invaluable asset to improving rural communities across the state," she said.

Findings in the report on rural development were endorsed by five experts in the field including Economist Ray Perryman; Greg Taylor of the Texas A&M Department of Rural Sociology; A&M Agricultural Economics Professor Ron Knutson; Quincy Ellis, executive director of the Early Economic Development Corporation; and Sam Tessen, executive director of the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund. Among the report's recommendations are the development of a comprehensive state rural policy; combining rural programs into one central coordinating agency; training community leaders; and bringing advanced telecommunications and infrastructure to rural areas.

vice Agency. The Crop Disaster Program provides financial assistance to farmers who are eligible for compensation for crop losses directly attributed to adverse weather and related conditions.

"Natural disasters are a constant threat to our farmers," said Odom. "This program will help those who suffered losses last year. The signup period began yesterday, and the end of the sign-up period will be announced at a later date, once the program regulations are published in the Federal Register," he said. Producers should be aware that issuance of program payments is pending Federal Register publication as well.

According to Odom 2000 CDP payments will be calculated at 65 percent of the county rate for insured and non-insurable crops. For crops that are insurable in the county, but for which the producer did not purchase insurance, the payment will be calculated at 60 percent of the county rate.

tions are published-providing their County Office Committee has approved their CCC-557 (application), and the producer has provided all the necessary program documentation."

FSA employees will participate in Disaster Assistance training prior to program implementation at the county level to better prepare County Offices to handle the large number of sign-ups expected.

The Secretary of Agriculture is authorized to provide disaster assistance through the CDP by the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2001, Pub. L. 106-387.
