Cross Plains did very well in the individual competition. There were

The one goal of the PIP program is not the idea that competition is to compete to be better than others, , it is compete to better oneself.



CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

March 6, 2001

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. All members were present. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as read.

Don Gosnell read the monthly police report. He reported sixty-eight calls for service: four criminal mischief, two family disturbances, four thefts, three assualts, two disorderly conducts, with forty-five warning citations and fifty-one citations being given. By general consent the council approved the report as presented.

Debbie Gosnell read the monthly judge's report. She reported fifty-one citations for February with twenty remaining outstanding, sixteen remain oustanding for January and ten remain outstanding for December. There were five reminder letters sent. By general consent the council accepted the report as presented.

Ricky Potter, Dal-Mar Energy representative, met with the council requesting a rate increase on natural gas prices. He advised the council that Dal-Mar has been in business for the past nineteen (19) years and this is only the second rate increase requested since beginning business. He requested a \$1.00 increase to the minimum, which would increase from \$12.00 to \$13.00. He also requested a \$1.00 increase per MCF, which would increase from \$8.50 to \$9.50. He informed the council that Dal-Mar has delayed increasing natural gas prices in an effort to forecast the long-range stability of the market, but feel at this time that a higher market price is inevitable. Jerry Cassle moved to grant the rate increase as requested. Dean Dillard seconded and motion carried with Joe Ingram and Edwin Weiss abstaining from voting.

Mayor Purvis opened bids for the sell of the 1961 DD Allis Chalmer Motor Grader. Bids were as follows:

Joe Ingram moved to award the bid to Johnny Barton in the amount of \$8,250.00. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

Mayor Purvis opened bids for the purchase of a used motor grader. Bids were as follows: Texas Independent Wholesalers - 120G Caterpillar

Motorgrader \$41,500.00; Ken Greaves & Skeet Walker - 120 G Caterpillar Motorgrader \$36,000.00; West Texas Equipment - 120G Caterpillar Motorgrader \$35,800.00; Parker Construction - John Deere 670-A Motorgrader \$26,500.00; Circle D Truck Sales - 120G Caterpillar Motorgrader \$24,250.00.

Joe Ingram moved to table the discussion until a later date. James Nichols seconded.

Joe Ingram moved to withdraw his motion to table the discussion. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

James Nichols moved to purchase the 120G Caterpillar Motorgrader from West Texas Equipment Co., Abilene, Texas in the amount of \$35,800.00.

The council discussed the rules for the Senior Citizens Center, Nichols moved to pass the rules as presented. Edwin WEiss seconded and motion

Under miscellaneous business Ron Bagley met with the council to disucss the alley and street next to his property. He informed the council that there is a lot of traffic in the alley behind his house and that most of the traffic that comes down the alley turns across his property and goes out down SE 7th Street. This traffic has caused a large mud hole onhis property. He suggested clsing SE 7th Street but the council informed him that they could not close the street, but would have the Chief of Police to talk with individuals who use this alley on a regular basis and advised them not to drive across his personal property.

Kim Baker met with the council to discuss transportation needs of the Senior Citizens and ask that the council consider giving them an additional \$1,000.00 in the new budget to help obtain a used van for the center. She informed the council that the cost of the van was \$8,000.00 and so far \$7,000.00 has been raised. She thanked the council for their time and consideration.

Jerry Cassle moved to pay the bills. Dean Dillard seconded and motion carried.

Discussion was held at length concerning the 2001/2002 budget. By general consent the council agreed to meet on March 26, 2001 at 6:30 P.M. for a public hearing on the budget.

Jerry Cassle moved to adjourn. Edwin Weiss seconded and motion carried.

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



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Clabbered milk...

Do you remember clabbered milk? Likely not. Sometimes the world turns so fast, things of the past just disappear off the face of the earth. For instance, dinosaurs. No one has seen any of those for

Mostly, it's only those who have made their way bravely into geriatrics who carry the memory of creatively soured milk with them.

There's other things, too. They remember transportation before cars, spelling bees, treadle sewing machines, box suppers, and the horse-drawn plow. They cranked telephones and the first Ford engines. They stared at the radio in the middle of the living room, and at the first miniature black and white TV screens set in large cabinetry

They made their own butter until oleomargarine came packaged in white blocks at the grocers. Pretty soon, all they had to do was squeeze the button on a plastic casing to work the yellow color through the blob.

I can still hear my Dad's voice lamenting, "It's a shame they don't teach penmanship in school anymore." My generation, my kids, and their kids, grew up without having to draw spiraling circles across a whole lined page. But all the octogenarians remember.

In our neighborhood, Dawrmen milks his own goats. I try to keep his fresh goat milk at the front of the refrigerator, and feed the older milk to the cats. "Oh, honey," he says, "don't worry about me. I grew up on soured milk products." He has an iron gut. At his age, he hurts in his muscles and bones, but he can eat anything he wants. He spends a lot of time in the kitchen fixing his favorites.

All those cultured milk processes were ways to preserve old milk. People made cottage cheese, butter, cheese, yoghurt, clabber, and fermented milk products. They used the whey left over from the cheese curds, and drank the buttermilk left after the lump of butter was formed, which they remember was just before the churner's arm

All this because they lacked one crucial modern convenience. Refrigerators!

There were seven children and two parents in Dawrmen's family. He says it was nothing for them to drink two gallons of milk at one meal. Surplus milk made milk toast for breakfast, cornstarch pudding, bread pudding, and baked custard. The rest was cultured and

People flavored their clabber or buttermilk with sorghum syrup or honey, and Dawrmen laughs remembering that one brother seasoned his with pepper!"

Pearl is a spry teeny-bopper in her 80s. She loves the taste of clabbered milk, and the memories it brings along with it. She says she still has the churn she grew up with, and other things, like their butter bowl.

B.J., in his 90s, was failing fast after a third surgery. But there is no frailty in the man. He threw away his medicines, went out to sit under a tree and make himself well. He treated himself with fresh air, healing exercises, and goat milk, the magic medicines of healing. These days, he walks with canes, but he walks, and visits, dines out, and

I tried some clabbered milk. Sure don't care much for it. So far, I haven't found anyone under the age of 70 who even remembers it.

But there is more than flavor laced among the molecules of clabbered milk. Even one sniff of the beverage carries with it the treasures of youth and family for those who lived with no refrigerators.

Someday there won't be anyone who remembers push-pulls, switchboards, or clabbered milk, but I don't want that to happen without tribute to the durable folks who grew up on sour milk, and learned to love it.

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



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

CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

March 6, 2001

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. All members were present. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as read.

Don Gosnell read the monthly police report. He reported sixty-eight calls for service: four criminal mischief, two family disturbances, four thefts, three assualts, two disorderly conducts, with forty-five warning citations and fifty-one citations being given. By general consent the council approved the report as presented.

Debbie Gosnell read the monthly judge's report. She reported fifty-one citations for February with twenty remaining outstanding, sixteen remain oustanding for January and ten remain outstanding for December. There were five reminder letters sent. By general consent the council accepted the report as presented.

Ricky Potter, Dal-Mar Energy representative, met with the council requesting a rate increase on natural gas prices. He advised the council that Dal-Mar has been in business for the past nineteen (19) years and this is only the second rate increase requested since beginning business. He requested a \$1.00 increase to the minimum, which would increase from \$12.00 to \$13.00. He also requested a \$1.00 increase per MCF, which would increase from \$8.50 to \$9.50. He informed the council that Dal-Mar has delayed increasing natural gas prices in an effort to forecast the long-range stability of the market, but feel at this time that a higher market price is inevitable. Jerry Cassle moved to grant the rate increase as requested. Dean Dillard seconded and motion carried with Joe Ingram and Edwin Weiss abstaining from voting.

Mayor Purvis opened bids for the sell of the 1961 DD Allis Chalmer Motor Grader. Bids were as follows: Johnny Barton \$8,250.00 Clay Estes \$6,525.01

Joe Ingram moved to award the bid to Johnny Barton in the amount of \$8,250,00. James Nichols seconded and motion carried.

The council discussed the rules for the Senior Citizens Center. Nichols moved to pass the rules as presented. Edwin WEiss seconded and motion carried.

Under miscellaneous business Ron Bagley met with the council to disucss the alley and street next to his property. He informed the council that there is a lot of traffic in the alley behind his house and that most of the traffic that comes down the alley turns across his property and goes out down SE 7th Street. This traffic has caused a large mud hole onhis property. He suggested clsing SE 7th Street but the council informed him that they could not close the street, but would have the Chief of Police to talk with individuals who use this alley on a regular basis and advised them not to drive across his personal property.

Kim Baker met with the council to discuss transportation needs of the Senior Citizens and ask that the council consider giving them an additional \$1,000.00 in the new budget to help obtain a used van for the center. She informed the council that the cost of the van was \$8,000.00 and so far \$7,000.00 has been raised. She thanked the council for their time and consideration.

Discussion was held at length concerning the 2001/2002 budget. By general consent the council agreed to meet on March 26, 2001 at 6:30 P.M. for a public hearing on the budget.

A cork placed on top of the water will float on the surface. If it is pressed down ten feet, fifty feet, or even one hundred feet below the surface and released, it will rise again. But do you know what happens if it is pressed two hundred feet below the surface? It will not rise again; it will collapse because of the pressure being so great!

I wonder if we don't feel like that cork sometimes, being pressed beneath the water's surface. "Will this situation on this day or at this time be too great to withstand?" we may ask. 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Clabbered milk...

Do you remember clabbered milk? Likely not. Sometimes the world turns so fast, things of the past just disappear off the face of the earth. For instance, dinosaurs. No one has seen any of those for years.

Mostly, it's only those who have made their way bravely into geriatrics who carry the memory of creatively soured milk with them.

There's other things, too. They remember transportation before cars, spelling bees, treadle sewing machines, box suppers, and the horse-drawn plow. They cranked telephones and the first Ford engines. They stared at the radio in the middle of the living room, and at the first miniature black and white TV screens set in large cabinetry

They made their own butter until oleomargarine came packaged in white blocks at the grocers. Pretty soon, all they had to do was squeeze the button on a plastic casing to work the yellow color through the blob.

I can still hear my Dad's voice lamenting, "It's a shame they don't teach penmanship in school anymore." My generation, my kids, and their kids, grew up without having to draw spiraling circles across a whole lined page. But all the octogenarians remember.

In our neighborhood, Dawrmen milks his own goats. I try to keep his fresh goat milk at the front of the refrigerator, and feed the older milk to the cats. "Oh, honey," he says, "don't worry about me. I grew up on soured milk products." He has an iron gut. At his age, he hurts in his muscles and bones, but he can eat anything he wants. He spends a lot of time in the kitchen

fixing his favorites. All those cultured milk processes were ways to preserve old milk. People made cottage cheese, butter, cheese, yoghurt, clabber, and fermented milk products. They used the whey left over from the cheese curds, and drank the buttermilk left after the lump of butter was formed, which they remember was just before the churner's arm

All this because they lacked one crucial modern convenience. Refrigerators!

There were seven children and two parents in Dawrmen's family. He says it was nothing for them to drink two gallons of milk at one meal. Surplus milk made milk toast for breakfast, cornstarch pudding, bread pudding, and baked custard. The rest was cultured and preserved.

People flavored their clabber or buttermilk with sorghum syrup or honey, and Dawrmen laughs remembering that one brother seasoned his with pepper!"

Pearl is a spry teeny-bopper in her 80s. She loves the taste of clabbered milk, and the memories it brings along with it. She says she still has the churn she grew up with, and other things, like their butter bowl.

B.J., in his 90s, was failing fast after a third surgery. But there is no frailty in the man. He threw away his medicines, went out to sit under a tree and make himself well. He treated himself with fresh air, healing exercises, and goat milk, the magic medicines of healing. These days, he walks with canes, but he walks, and visits, dines out, and

I tried some clabbered milk. Sure don't care much for it. So far, I haven't found anyone under the age of 70 who even remembers it. But there is more than flavor laced among the molecules of clabbered milk. Even one sniff of the beverage carries with it the treasures of youth and family for those who

lived with no refrigerators. Someday there won't be anyone who remembers push-pulls, switchboards, or clabbered milk, but I don't want that to happen without tribute to the durable folks who grew up on sour milk, and learned to love it.

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
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SORORITY HAPPENINGS


A short business meeting followed which included reports on the successful sorority-sponsored Valentine Pageant and Photogenic Contest held this past February.
