

Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten **Registration Set** For April 20th

Parents are asked to register their children who will enter Pre-Kindergarten next fall. Cross Plains Elementary offers Pre-kindergarten to all children who will be four years of age on or before September 1, 2001. Pre-Kindergarten will be offered if a sufficient number of four year olds register for the program. The Pre-Kindergarten program is 1/2 day, and ran from 8:00 to 11:30 a.m. this school year

Also, students who will be five years of age on or before September 1.2001 are eligible for Kindergarten. Kindergarten is a full day program. Kindergarten is a basic part of the Cross Plains School system and the service is available to all students. If you child is currently enrolled in Pre-K at Cross Plains Elementary, you will not have to go through the screening process. If your child has not been enrolled in Pre-K, and will be attending Kindergarten in the fall,

please register for screening. Pre-K and Kindergarten screening will be conducted Friday, April 20th at Cross Plains Elementary School. Please call the Elementary Principal's office at 725-6123 to make an appointment for your child. The screening will take about sixty minutes. Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills, language ability and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time. Parents will be given a report on their children's progress at the time of the screening. Parents are reminded that to enter

For this reason, I shall, 'Render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's,' and refrain from praying at this time. However, if you feel inspired to honor, praise and thank God, and ask Him in the name of Jesus to bless this event, please feel free to do so. As far as I know, that's not against the law ---yet."

AND.one by one, the people in the stands bowed their heads, held hands with one another, and began to pray. They prayed in the stands. They prayed in the team huddles. They prayed in the concession stand. And they prayed in the announcer's box. The only place they didn't pray was in the Supreme Court of the United States of America - the seat of "justice" in the one nation under God.

Somehow, Kingston, Tennessee, remembered what so many have forgotten we are given the Freedom OF Religion, not the Freedom FROM Religion.

Federal Funds Available

Director for USDA, Rural Development has announced that even though we are halfway through the fiscal year, there are still ample funds available for Very Low and Low Income Housing Loans, Guaranteed Housing Loans and 504 Loans and Grants (Repair & Rehabilitation only). Borrow-, ers can often qualify for these purchase/build loans with no down payment.

To be eligible for financing, the home must be located in a rural community with a population of less than 10,000 or on a farm or in open country, not closely associated with an urban area. Under certain circumstances, loans can be made in towns and cities with populations between

10,000 and 25,000.

Never assume that an area is not eligible for the loan program. We encourage anyone interested in owning their home to contact the Brownwood **Rural Development Office for details** on eligible areas.

The Rural Housing loan may be

Perryman, Acting State used for the construction of a home or to finance new or existing homes that are structurally sound and have adequate mechanical, electrical, plumbing and insulation systems. If located in a rural area, the home must have an approved water supply and septic system.

> The loan my be made for up to 100 percent of the market value. In this instance, no down payment is required, but there are closing costs. For a guaranteed loan, the lender may loan some closing costs, depending on the appraisal. Theoretically, someone could move into a home for zero out of pocket expenses. However, not all costs associated with buying a home can be financed. All loan must be secured by a first lien on a residential property.

The Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services encourages you to become an advocate for children and work with them to make our communities safe for all children. Suspect Physical Abuse When You See:

* Frequent injuries such as bruises, cuts, black eyes or burns with no adequate explanations

* Frequent complaint of pain without obvious injury

* Burns or bruises in unusual patterns that may indicate the use of a instrument or a human bite; cigarette burns on any part of the body

- * Lack of reaction to pain
- * Aggressive, disruptive and destructive behavior
- * Passive, withdrawn and emotionless behavior

* Fear of going home or seeing parents; injuries that appear after a child has not been seen for several days

* Unreasonable clothing that may hide injuries to arms or legs.

Suspect Sexual Abuse When You See:

- * Physical signs of sexually transmitted disease
- * Evidence of injury to the genital area
- * Pregnancy in a young girl
- * Difficult in sitting or walking
- * Frequent expressions of sexual activity between adult and child

* Extreme fear of being alone with

- * Obvious malnourishment * Lack of personal cleanliness
- * Torn or dirty clothing
- * Stealing or begging for food * Child unattended for long periods

Legal Obligations

Any person who suspects abuse or neglect or a child is required by law to report that information to the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services or a law enforcement agency. Reports to the Department may be made 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, by calling the toll-free Abuse Hotline, 1-800-252-5400. **Legal Protection**

Reports of child abuse or neglect made in "good faith" and "without malice" are confidential and immune from civil liability.

Legal Liability

Failure to report suspected child abuse is a Class B misdemeanor punishable by a fine of up to \$1,500 or imprisonment up to 180 days or both fine and imprisonment.

If you are a child's parent or guardian, you have the legal obligation to protect your child. If you permit your child to be placed in a situation where he or she may be injured, you may be prosecuted for child abuse. The fact that the abuser is your husband or wife or other family member does not affect your obligation to report or shield you from being involved with the legal proceedings resulting from your responsibility as a parent.

On Wednesday, April 4, seven neighboring homes were evacuated during a six-hour standoff between 35-year-old Walter William Pope III and authorities.

Pope was held at Callahan County Jail in Baird without bond on Thursday with Class C Assault and Class **B** Malicious Mischief charges.

Pope kept his five children hostage during the standoff for a half-hour according to authorities who responded at approximately 10 p.m. to a call of gunshots being fired at the home during an argument between Pope and his wife, said Police Chief Don Gosnell.

The wife managed to get out but the couple's children remained out of fear, Gosnell said. Pope did not physically keep the children from leaving he said. They climbed out a window after one kicked open the window screen.

The Abilene Police Department's SWAT Team was called and negotiated with Pope for three hours to no avail, said Lt. Ken Merchant, a team spokesman.

Pope surrendered peacefully about 4 a.m. after tactical officers shot canisters of pepper spray inside the home, Merchant said. Gosnell reported that no one was

hurt in the incident.






