DOWN HOME

"Making Hay"

It has been several weeks since we baled our wheat for hay, but we had a good time in the process. The wonderful rain sent by the Lord provided an abundant crop for all the area farmers and ranchers.

I like to ride the tractor with Richard while he goes through the various steps. It is amazing what you can see traveling up and down the rows cutting the wheat. The rodents are scrambling for safety, along with the quail. There doesn't seem to be a lot of quail this year and you hate to see their nests disturbed. Of course there are the cottontails. We saw some young ones that were so cute. Thank goodness none were caught by the blade.

The hawks and buzzards came to pick up the scavenges of any snakes, etc. killed in the path of the swather. The hawks show no fear of the tractor and simply fly over a little when you approach. They are very adept at catching various prey as it scurries in its plight.

The hay rake fascinates me as it gathers several rows together into a pile. We had some trouble getting it set properly and that is frustrating. The breakdowns on the equipment are what slow you down. That is the negative side of farming. When everything is going smoothly, a wheel either breaks off or you have a flat—always something.

Our neighbor baled the hay into round bales. How the baler wraps all the cuttings and puts the string around is neat. This is quite different from the older type balers like my Granddad Ben used when he baled for the public.

While we raked I tried to keep count of the number of bales as they rolled out. This step seems to go pretty fast.

Then the last stage -- hauling it to the designated place. Richard bought another little truck and a hay buggy so I could help him this year. We thought this would work great, until we discovered I couldn't back the bale buggy. I tried and tried, but turning the opposite from what it appeared just didn't happen. Oh well, we found another method. Richard would load the bale and I hauled it to the home place where I could release it on my own.

I think if I could practice without his watchful eyes for a while I might accomplish the feat; however, he is a little afraid for the equipment-- imagine that!

Bufs Claim Area Championship in Baseball

The Cross Plains Buffaloes made a clean sweep defeating Bryson in two consecutive baseball games to take the Area Championship. In the first game of the Class A area-round series at Cooper's Cougar Field in Abilene the Buffs won 8-2 and the second game 11-5.

In the second game, the Buffs had scored two runs after four innings and had only a one-run lead, when Kevin Wilson got an RBI double that turned the tide.

They scored nine runs in the fifth and sixth innings to secure their Area title.

The Buffs were at their best in the fifth and sixth innings scoring seven of their 11 hits.

Pitcher Seth Potter struck out 11 batters, and of the five runs he allowed, four scored in the final two innings after Cross Plains had taken a 6-1 lead.

Bryson cut its deficit to 6-3 in the sixth inning, but the Buffs allowed no more.

Cross Plains advanced to the regional semifinals where they faced Bosqueville, who defeated Itasca in an earlier series.

The Buffs lost the first game of the series 7-4. They must win two consecutive games against Bosqueville to advance to state.

On Tuesday, May 29, they played their second game and won with a score of 7-4. Following a 30 minute break the Buffs will play their third game against Bosqueville. The score was not available at press time, but we wish them the very best. Coach Cord Woerner has taken his team to state the past two seasons and the fans are hoping for the third time. Go Buffaloes — All the way to STATE!!!

Remembering back, Mona had a resonant and most pleasant sound. But it was always Earma's cry filling the air.

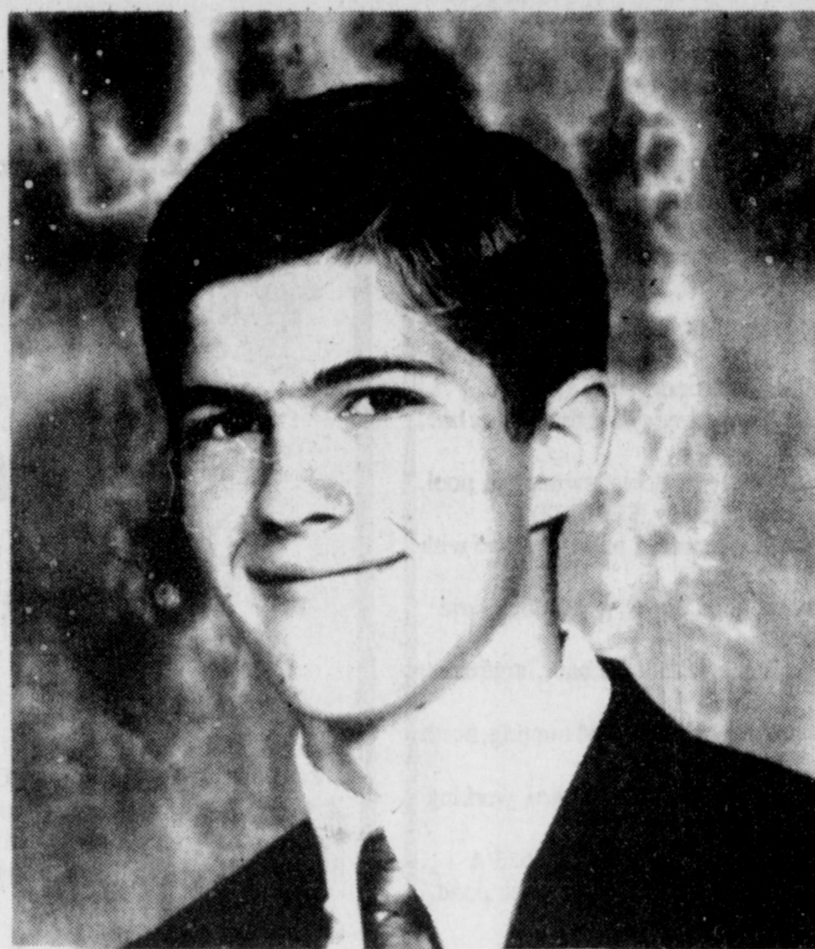

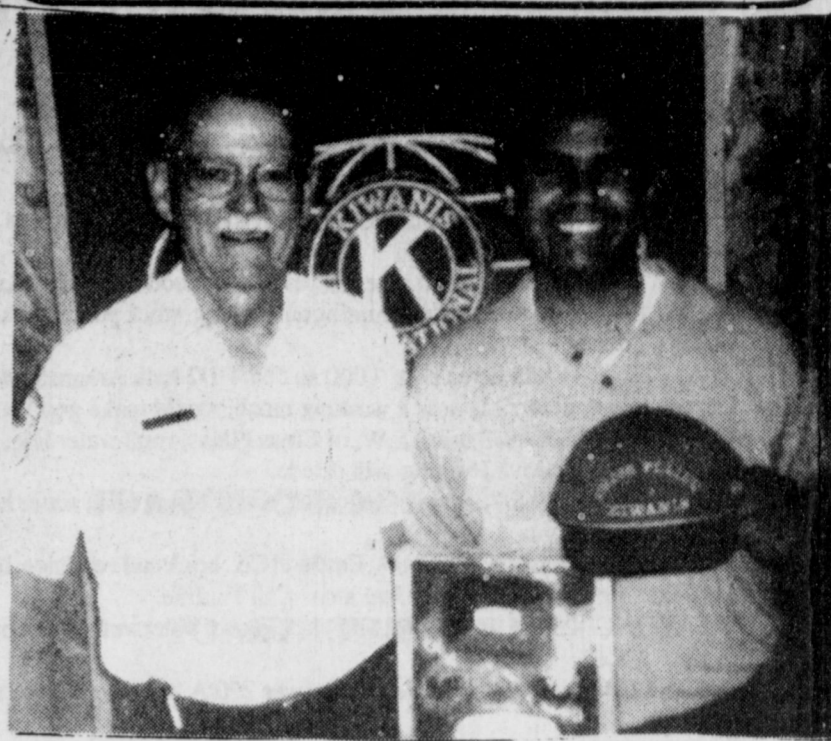

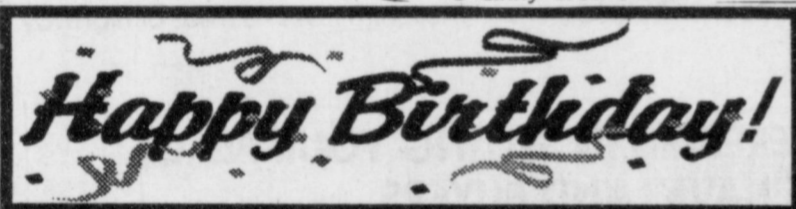
