



Now we have to make sure both are okay. The mother cow sometimes only takes one calf with her and leaves one hid. Richard had to make his special calf cry to get the mother to show us where the other baby was. She became really upset when he went into the distress bleating. We thought "mama" might charge the pickup in her hurry to see about the second calf.

She went straight to the other baby and checked things out. She is a great mom, as sometimes I understand they don't always ac-

The two are adorable. It is like seeing double, as they even nurse on the same side most times. I named them Mickey and Minnie (real original).

We had lost a newborn calf several months ago, so the Lord blessed us with two at a time. That poor little calf would stand and suck on my pants leg while Richard was milking his mother and trying to coax him to nurse. He must have had something internally wrong, because it even stopped taking the bottle. You sure hate to see one die.

All the new baby calves are out of a Charolais bull and they are cream and charcoal colored. There are at least nine about the same size and they are a sight to see. We will never know which one belongs to what cow. We have a couple that even nurse cows other than their mothers. When all these little darlings are running and bucking they are just too cute.



Farm Service Agency seeks County Committee candidates

BAIRD, TEXAS - August 30, ary 1, 2002 2001-The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is seeking candidates for the locally led County Committee election to be held

"It is crucial that every eligible agricultural producer take part in this election process because County Committees serve as a direct link between the agriculture community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture," says Scott Odom, Callahan County Executive Director. "The County Committee system needs everyone to get involved-from voters to committee candidates. Almost anyone eligible to participate in programs administered by FSA qualifies to be a

candidate for the committee." Nomination forms can be obtained from FSA County Offices. Completed nomination forms are due back to the FSA office by October 29, 2001. FSA will notify nominees and mail election ballots to eligible voters n mid-November. Completed ballots must be returned to FSA offices and postmarked by December 3. Elected members and alternates will take office Janu-

FSA County Committees provide local guidance and make decisions on issues including: commodity price support loans and payments; establishment of allotments, yields and marketing quotas: farm loans; conservation programs; incentive, indemnity, and disaster payments for some commodities; and other disaster program assistance. County Committees have served as the eyes, ears and voice of farmers and ranchers nationwide for more than 60 years.

"The County Committee plays an integral role in the delivery of Farm Service Agency services. We'd like the County Committee to reflect a diverse crosssection of the local agriculture community by including representation from nontraditional farming operations, small farmers or ranchers, specialty crop producers, minority producers, spouses or business partnersanyone who would be willing to add new or different perspectives to the County Committee."

To wrap up the scoring for the first half, Klay Wilson marched in from 35 yards out, with the extra point kick being a success.







July unemployment rate falls to 4.1%

The unemployment rate in 3.0%; Runnels, 3.6%; Shack-Callahan County for the month elford, 2.1%; Stephens, 3.0%; of July 2001 dropped seventenths of one percentage point to 4.1 percent, according to jobless figures released Monday, September 3 by the Texas Workforce Commission.



Caving for sissies...

"Too late to turn back now!" My sister answered the puzzled look that passed between us. For the third time the cave had tricked us. We were not at the exit, only at the base of another heap of rocks where the dome above had collapsed to create the great round skylight above us. Even if we climbed to the peak of the rock pile, we were still faced with scaling about twelve feet of sheer wall.

We were in this predicament because we chose a day trip to Craters Of The Moon during my vacation with her in Idaho. The National Monument is 75 square miles of lava river swirls and cascades and bubbles frozen in the act of flowgroanings left fossilized tubes and spatters, shields and cones, cinder mounds, and caves - lots of caves.

Together, we toured each station at Craters Of The Moon, staying on the narrow paths as required. Preservation is emphatically impressed in order to prevent destruction by crumfrom pioneer diaries declared the other-worldly landscape desolate, bleak, barren, impassable.

Some stations were wide, easy walkways. Mostly we found ourselves on a breathless ascent to some astounding vista, or peering down a cone that still has snow at the bottom while we sweated in the rare air and sunshine at 6,000 feet.

Hours later we found ourselves at the caves. A thin pathway across the lava fields connects a series of five caves. The hike is akin to walking miles and miles of asphalt- lumpy, bumpy, crusty, hot, unshaded asphalt.

We picked our way down into the first cave along rocks that were wobbly, flat, sharp, or mere toe holds. Too soon, the cave was deep and very dark, and the flashlight we brought was more worn out than we were. We skedaddled out of there, thinking spelunking was not our game.

A touring family told us of a for sissies.

It sounded like Caving For Sissies, so we put our broadbrimmed hats back on and headed there.

Rocks and slabs and gaps made for rough passage, but light sifted through crevices, lighting the domed interior covered with patterns and streaks

and drips. About the time we were ready to head back to the entrance, a couple passed us, commenting on the rock my sister was framing in the lens of her camera. It looked like a baked potato that lacked only chives to make it a mouthwatering meal.

The hikers told us the cave continued on and that those who make it to the end get to walk a section of lava marked only by a few stakes guiding Earth's prehistoric back to the path. We still thought it was a daylight cave for sissies, so we went around the corner where the couple disappeared.

The climb got more treacherous, the light dimmed, the trail disappeared. At the point of desperation, we saw a subtle paint daub pointing to the next step. A few feet later another bling and oxidation. Quotes light shaft dimly pointed the way

Twice we were at the end of the cave, at the base of a heap of rocks in a deep bowl. Scaling a sheer wall seemed the only way out. Paint daubs lured us to the third dead end. We pictured ourselves ending up bones to be found by explorers centuries later. But - a few exploratory steps later we found ourselves at the foot of the climb to the sur-

The final steps were the worst. Climbing upwards on our hands and knees, we two grandmas emerged from the bowels of the earth. We were triumphant and felt quite privileged to be among those successors rewarded with the awkward trek across the rough natural lava field. Sturdy as it seemed, much of the ancient flow was a thin crust, or cracks and deep fissures.

We made it out shortly before the park closed for the night. On the way back, we decided the daylight cave was definitely not
