Coldsmith served as a combat medic in the Pacific in World War II, then returned to schoo versity in 1949. After a taste of several vocations, he returned to school to obtain a doctorate in medicine in 1958. Until 1988, he served as a physician in Family
Practice in Emporia, Kansas. In Practice in Emporia, Kansas. In writing won out. Since that time writing has been his vocation Coldsmith has taught in the $D$ vision of English at Emporia State University and is a past president of Western Writers of America. Six times he has been a finalist for the Western Writers' Golden Spur Award, and in 1990 won the Spur for the best origi ing Wind.
In 1993 Coldsmith was chosen Distinguished Kansan by the Na tive Sons and Daughters of Kansas. Then in 1995 he was the recipient of the Edgar Wolfe

Award for lifetime contribution to
iterature. In 2000 he was inducted into the Writers' Hall of Fame of America and was listed by fellow professional writers to
be one of the 20 most important writers of the 20th century. In 1997 his novel Tall Grass (Bantam) was the Book -of-the-Month Club selection; and his next, Medicine Hat (Oklahoma University Press), was a Doubleday Book Club choice. Alder Nordyke was our "school
marm" and she ruled with a heavy marm" and she ruled with a heavy hand. It was a one-teacher school
comprised of first through eighth grades. There was never a doubt about who was in charge at Turkey Creek Elementary School. If a boy got a litle unruly, she would
send him out to the banks of Turkey Creek to cut a willow switch key Creck to cut a willow switch
with which she could "whip" him. If two boys got into a fight,
she would send she would send them both out. By the time they found proper
switches and made it back to the switches and made it back to the
school room, they were friends again ,but got the whipping anyway.
Miss Alder would occasionally "take up books, at the first bell" to see who bad prepared their homework. Students would walk up and deposit their first period school book on her desk, then "re-

eral Educational Development (GED) tests must pass the five tests this year or start over. Marilyn Flournoy, director adult education for the Abilene school district, said new GED lests will be introduced nationally on January 1, 2002. The program will include all new tests and a new scoring system. As a result, all tests previously
taken and passed by sudents will taken and passed by students will
be voided as of December 20 this year, she said.
The GED consists of five par - writing, science, math, social may be tested on each part separately. When they pass all five portions of the test, they are awarded the GED diploma, considered the equivalent of a high school diploma.
"It would be a shame for someone to have passed three or four of the five sections of the GED and be that close to getting their diploma, and then have to start what will happen to those who don't pass all of the GED by the end of this year."
