



Hunters' Feed Draws Large Crowd





Zig Zigler says fear is the main reason for failure -- and that fear s, putting it in an acrostic, "False Evidence Appearing Real." That may sound like an oversimplification of it. There is a fear based upon real evidence -- real reason for being afraid or fearful. But then there is fear with no real basis -- which could and should be eliminated. In speech I learned a few basic reasons for fear--fear in the sense of stage fright -- such as: 1) A lack of knowledge of your subject; 2) A lack of preparation; 3) A lack of experience; 4) Inability to deal with human beings. Stage fright is not altogether bad -- a little is good -- it keeps one alert. Someone said, "Knocking knees are not so bad -- except when they start missing each other -- that's bad!"

So is the case with fear of God. A certain amount is very good - a must! But an overdose of fear is fatal. And the apostle John says love is a key in getting it all together. "There is no fear in love: but perfect love cast out fear, because fear has punishment and he who fears is not make perfect in love," I John 4:18. Fear God -- in the sense of respecting him for who and what He is (and what He can do!). But don't fear Him in the sense of developing a phobia. Learn of Him, rid yourself of as much ignorance of Him as possible, and you'll fear Him less and respect Him more -- and love Him more, too!



COUNTY COMMITTEE **HOMINATIONS AND** ELECTION

The FSA County Committee is a vital link between national USDA programs and the needs of local farmers. An election will be held late this year to elect a member to serve a three-year term on the FSA County Committee beginning in 2002. The individuals elected will be a representative of Local Administrative Area 3 (LAA 3). LAA 3 encompasses the southeastern part of the county and includes the Cross Plains, Cottonwood, and Atwell areas.

It is critical to FSA's future that we ensure all producers in the county have an equal opportunity to be a candidate for our County Committee. We would like to see diversity on our Committee and are now in the process of seeking and accepting nominations. We encourage all farmers and landowners, especially minority, female, and other under-represented groups in the county, to get involved.

Producers is the LAA 3 area are urged to take part in this important local election process and nominate someone you feel would adequately represent you on the FSA County Committee. If interested In making a nomination, petitions can be obtained by contacting or visiting our office. Nominations may be returned in person or mailed with a postmark dated no later than October 29th, 2001.

November 21- Final date to mail ballots

SMALL GRAIN GRAZING Producers planning to graze their small grain crops must report their grazing intentions 15 days prior to turning in livestock in order to remain eligible for the 2002 NAP program. As always, we will conduct all certifications by appointments.

PERMANENT GRASS REPORTING DATE FOR MAP

Beginning in the 2002 program year all native and Improved grasses whether for grazing or hay must be reported no later than December 17, 2001 in order for producers to remain eligible for the 2002 NAP program. This is a change from 2001

APPOINTMENTS




The honoree was Cody Hodges, son of James and Carol Hodges, of Clyde.

An open letter to the 17th Congressional District from Congressman Stenholm

Congress Watchers are aware that the House of Representatives has been operating normally within the House chamber in recent weeks. There is a great deal of work to be done, both in response to the recent terrorist attacks as well as our regular end-of-year business. That work is proceeding. In recent weeks we have passed legislation to authorize the President to use force against terrorists, fund the rebuilding process in New York and Virginia, keep our airlines running, provide law enforcement additional tools for tracking down and bringing terrorists to justice, and strengthening airline security. Other issues will probably keep Congress busy past Thanksgiving.

Not everything is as usual, however. Ever since October 16, my staff and I have been unable to work out of our normal Capitol Hill office In addition, all mail has been held at off-site locations since the discovery of anthrax in some letters addressed to Congress.

One of the most important activities of a U.S. Representative is service as a liaison between the federal government and his or her constituents back home. For both Representatives and citizens, open communication is vital for ensuring a government which is truly of, by, and for the people.

If you sent a letter to my Washington office any time during the month of October, chances are I never received it or it remains unanswered in my closed office. If you sent something urgent, I encourage you to con-

Only my normal Washington office has been closed temporarily. Phone calls to that office are being automatically routed to Texas. In addition, constituents can reach me or my staff through one of the following

The Abilene Area Pecan Show will take place November 19-21 at the Mall of Abilene (J.C. Penney Courtyard). Those wishing to enter this year's show needs to bring at least 42 nuts from each variety to either the Callahan County Extension Office or the Taylor County Extension Office by November 14th.

The current pecan show program, under the direction of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Pecan Growers Association, has played a very important role for the Texas pecan industry by teaching growers how to grade their pecans for better prices; identifying the most outstanding variety for each region of the state; recognizing and awarding the most successful

pecan-management programs in the country, region and state; and advertising and promoting Texas premium-quality pecans.

There are over 50 county/ area shows in Texas each year, with over 100 entries in each show. The winners advance to three regional shows. One pecan sample consists of 42 nuts. Ten nuts are graded for percent kernel and size (number per pound). The kernels and the in-shell nuts are graded by a team of experienced judges for flawlessness, kernel color, uniformity and appearance. This year's show promises to be another educational opportu-

AUSTIN-Texas Comptroller million behind what we collected today(Friday, November 1) said the September 11 terrorist attacks reduced sales tax collections by a total \$42 million, a rebound from the initial \$100 million plus dip.
