



### Commissioners Vote Not to Join Underground **Water District**

Callahan County Commissioners voted not to join the Middle Trinity Underground Water Conservation District after hearing a report from two temporary directors during the regular Commissioners' Court Monday, January 14.

Cecil Barton of Cross Plains and Word Estes of Clyde met with the Commissioners' Court recommending Callahan County not join the underground water district at this The two men recently attend-

ing a conference in Stephenville discussing the underground water conservation district.

Barton stated before attending the conference, it was reported that if Callahan County did not join the water district, the State of Texas would do it for the County. "That's not true," Barton said, Barton said, "Callahan County is not ready at this time to vote for an underground

water district." According to Barton, the two temporary directors have the authority to order an election, but he recommended the County not do so at this time.

Barton said if an underground water district had come to a vote, there would have been two options to bring to the votersfirst a vote for or against forming an underground water district and second a vote for or against imposing a tax of up to five percent of the property value to operate the district.

Barton explained to the Commissioners' Court that Callahan County can request to be placed into a water district at any time or vote to form their own underground water district.

Barton stated his reasoning for not forming an underground water district at this time is because Callahan County does not have the problem of water

# **County Commissioners Allow** Stephens Co. to Join MHMR Center

Callahan County Commissioners voted to approve an interlocal agreement by adding Stephens County to the Mental Health/Mental Retardation service area.

Commissioners took the action Monday, January 14 during the regular Commissioners Court meeting held at the

County Courthouse in Baird. Judge Roger Corn reported to

the Commissioners' Court Stephens County was making the request to be added to the MHMR area. Judge Corn said Stephens County officials had been in the Wichita Falls MHMR area and did not feel the County was getting the service needed. Judge Corn said the Betty Hardwick MHMR Center officials assured him that Callahan County's MHMR service would not be affected by adding

Stephens County. The Betty Hardwick MHMR Center was first opened in 1971 with Taylor County as the original member. Callahan and Jones Counties were added to the service area in 1973 and Sharkelford County was accepted to the MHMR service med in 1998. Stephens County

Lewallen, 48, will be moving to the Fort Davis area after he and his brother Greg purchased Combined Scientific Supplies in Fort Davis. Combined Scientific Supplies is an importer/exporter of scientific insect specimens. Lewallen decided to retire when he made the decision to work full time with his brother to help expand the business. With much thought he made the Board of Directors at the Callahan County Appraisal District aware of his intentions and began to make arrangements to leave by January 1, 2002.

Lewallen began working at Callahan County as a consultant for Albert Lovell-longtime County Tax Assessor/Collector and the first Chief Appraiser at the time. He helped setup the appraisal schedules and systems now used by the District.

Lewallen holds a BBA in General Business, Business Law from the University of Texas at Austin in 1976. He entered the Ad Valorem field in 1980. Lewallen is a member of the National Academy of Conciliators as a dispute mediator since 1983. He has also been a consultant for four years to other Central Appraisal Districts.

Lewallen began working for the Callahan County Appraisal District in October 1981. He spent one year working for the Internal Revenue Service in 1984, and was rehired as Chief Appraiser at Callahan CAD in

During his years with the Appraisal District, the Board of Tax Professional Examiners certified him as an instructor in 1989. He has held several statewide organizational offices for different positions with the Texas Association of Appraisal Districts. Lewallen was President of the Region 14 Big Country Chapter of TAAD in 1987.

AUSTIN, Texas-Counties awarded grants in Round III of the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program will be announced this month. A total of 83 counties are seeking grant money in Round III of the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. Counties requested approximately \$195 million in matching grant assistance from the Texas Historical Commission (THC). That money translates into \$250 million in total construction costs to preserve and restore their courthouses. Ten of those counties are firsttime applicants, 25 counties were automatically rolled over from Round II with no changes to their application and 48 counties from Round II revised their applications for reconsideration.

Callahan County Judge Roger Corn said Callahan County's grant application was one of 48 counties who revised their applications for reconsideration. Cal-

lahan County's Courthouse was constructed in 1929. Norman Alston of Dallas performed Callahan County's master plan grant application.

Gov. George Bush and the Texas Legislature created the Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program in 1999 with a \$50 million allocation to restore Texas' historic courthouses and make them safe, functional and a source of pride for Texas communities. Lawmakers allotted an additional \$50 million to the program in the last legislative session. The next restored courthouse dedication takes place in Presidio County in Marfa on January 5.
