



Retirement of Attorney General Daugherty from the Coolidge cabinet has again been brought under serious consideration, and indications today point to developments in the near fu ture, said an Associated Press report last night.

President Coolidge has almost, it not entirely, come to agreement with many of his closest advisers that with charges piling up daily against Mr. Daugherty's administration of the department of justice, continuance of the ttorney general in office is more of a oad than any administration justly an be called upon to bear.

Inquiries made by the president are understood to have failed to convince him that the current business of the department is being administered with the expedition the country has a right to demand. This circumstance is believed to have weighed more heavily with Mr. Coolidge than any other factor.

Two conferences held by the President with his attorney general vesterday are understood to have been devoted largely to a consideration of this subject and to have brought the matter nearer to a head than it ever has been before.

# **POINCARE AND**

PARIS, March 26.—Premier Poincare, with his entire cabinet, resigned from office today and when he announced his resignation he declared that his decision was final.

But tonight there is every reason to believe that he will acquiesce tomorrow in President Millerand's request that he resume office at the head of the ministry. M. Poincare's acceptance in principle of the President's earnest plea that he continue to direct French public affairs virtually ends the ministerial crisis, which broke over comparatively serene conditions. Mr. Poincare's official acceptance of President Millerand's request is regarded as a foregone conclusion by the vast majority of those identified with French political affairs.

New Orleans Man Attracts Them With Bright Light And Burns Them.

Claiming that after years of study he has discovered a new method of destroying the boll weevil, E. Se. Amant, a New Orleans florist, has invited government agents, studying this enemy of the southern cotton farmer, to make an inspection of his method.

The florist insisted that his method works like a charm. The idea is very simple, he said, and consists of placing a strong light in the center of the field at night to attract the weevils' natural impulse to fly toward light. Around this light he would place a contrivance of his own invention, from which issues a strong fire which kills the weevil instantly.

"I have studied the weevil," continued St. Amant, "and have learned that for about one month during the life of the adult in the summer it is bothered by light-so much so that it won't work on the cotton bolls in strong moonlight.

"Working on this observation, I fixed up a fire in the field around a strong light with a contrivance that will kill the weevil the instant he reaches the light. Following my experiments I have seen them lying dead by the millions around the light. "One light will clean them out of a
