

TRAIN DERAILS SOUTH OF BAIRD— Twenty train cars derailed here, early Friday morning. No injuries occurred, but one tank car that derailed was carrying sulfuric acid. Limestone was put on the acid to neutralize it.

20 TRAIN CARS DERAIL HERE EARLY FRIDAY MORNING

BAIRD- Friday, November 9, 1979 twenty train cars derailed south of Baird around 4:40 a.m.

There were no injuries to any of the crewmen.

One of the cars was carrying sulfuric acid which spilled out as it turned over. Limestone was brought in to neutralize the acid.

One concern was whether residents living near the track would have to be evacuated, because of the sulfuric acid. Sheriff Bill Skinner said if the wind had been from the south, the odor and irritation would have forced evacuation. The fumes weren't toxic, but they can cause irritation to the respiratory system.

A dangerous situation was narrowly avoided when none of the train cars hit a Texaco warehouse and gasoline tanks

near the site. The car carrying the sulfuric acid derailed about 60 yards from the gas tanks. If they had hit, there would have possibly been an explosion.

Crewmen from the Department of Highways and Public Transportation built a sand dam to keep the acid from spreading.

Most of the derailed cars were empty, however, one car was carrying new Chevrolets and Pontiacs but only one vehicle received damage.

The derailment caused extensive track damage for about half a mile.

The train was en route from Big Springs to Fort Worth.

The wreckage of the train was cleared up by Hulcher Emergency Service, Inc., from Greenville, Texas.

Trains began moving through again around 6 p.m.

Sheriff's Office Investigating Vandalism

BAIRD- The Sheriff's Office is investigating some vandalism and theft which occurred south of Hamby, November 10 and 11. Some construction equipment was damaged and stolen.

In other news, Sheriff Bill Skinner and the Clyde Police Department recovered

a stolen 1962 Chevrolet truck. It was stolen from Abilene October 30.

The Teletype is really helpful to the department. It has helped in recovering stolen items and has brought about some arrests.

Second Petition Turned Over to City Council Friday

BAIRD- Another petition, petitioning the sale of the electrical generating and distribution system of the City of Baird, was turned in Friday, November 9, 1979.

This petition has 233 signatures on it.

This is the second petition that has been turned in. The first one being turned in August 28, 1979. No action was taken with that petition. There were 261 names on the first petition, however, only 235 were registered voters in Callahan County.

The first petition asked the Council to call an election to advertise for bids to sell the power plant and distribution system of the City of Baird.

This second petition that was circulated wants the City Council to negotiate with West Texas Utilities Company for an offer

for the electrical generating and distribution system.

It was turned in around 4 p.m. Friday.

The second petition reads as follows:

PETITION FOR THE SALE OF THE CITY OF BAIRD ELECTRICAL SYSTEM

We, the undersigned registered voters of the City of Baird, Callahan County, Texas, herewith petition the Baird City Council to negotiate with West Texas Utilities Company for an offer for the Electrical Generating and Distribution System of the City of Baird and submit that offer to the voters of Baird in a referendum to be held at the earliest possible date.

Bear Cubs Remain Undefeated, Take Rotan 26-12 Thursday

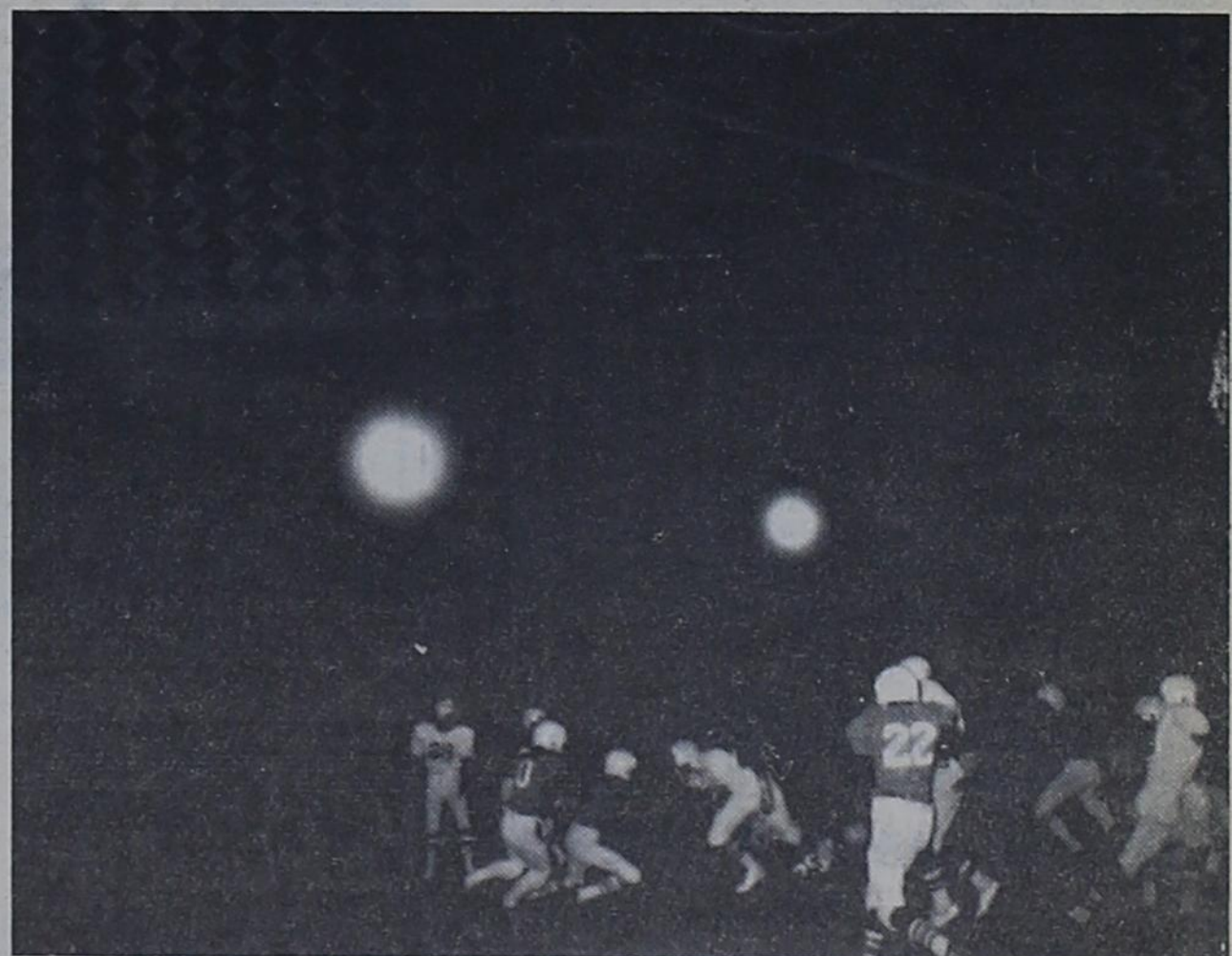

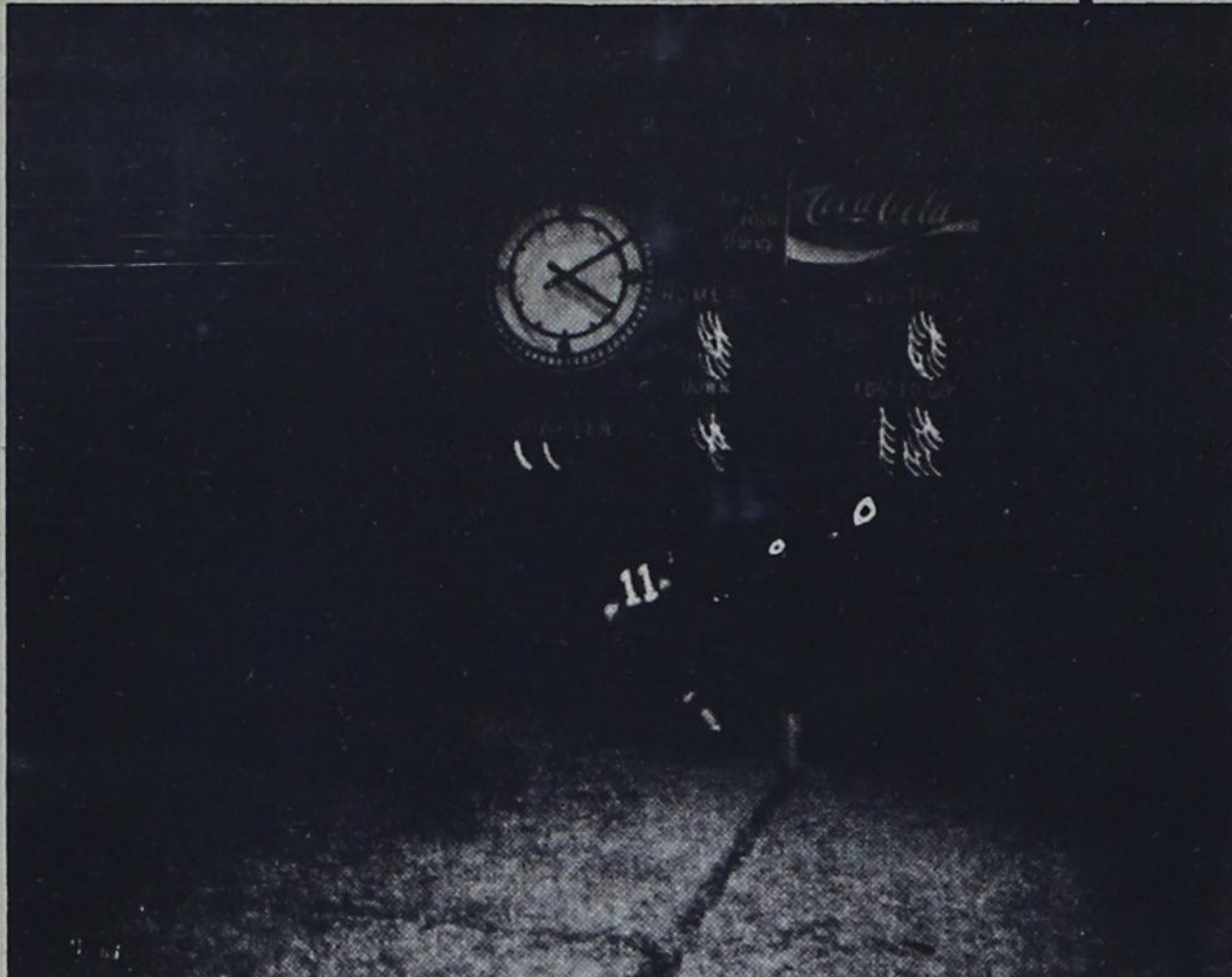
Rotan Defeats Baird 21 - 15 Bears Meet Albany Lions Friday - There

Rotan got their first touchdown with 2:01 left to play in the third quarter. Baird had Rotan on the 24 yard line on the fourth down, but Rotan pulled a trick play and scored.

Bairds first points of the game came on a safety. Then Sid Grant got six points on a pass from QB Darryl Harris. Alan Bohannon kicked the extra point.

In the second quarter, Baird scored

again after Greg Austin recovered a fumble. Sid Grant scored on a 30 yard pass from halfback Davy Vestal.

Rotan scored again, when Baird had a bad punt snap. Rotan recovered on Bairds one yard line. The quarterback finally got it across the goal line on the fourth down.

Rotan got their next break on a punt return. The Yellowhammers' Mullins ran it to the Baird 9 yard line before being caught by Bairds Darryl Harris. The Rotan coach, Don Mullins suffered a knee injury about the same time as the Rotan player went down. He was running right along with Mullins on the sideline.

On the third down, Rotan completed its only pass of the night for a 3 yard touchdown.

Baird had 10 first downs to Rotans 12, and had 60 rushing and 82 passing yardage to Rotans 157 rushing and 3 passing.

Baird plays Albany Friday night. Everyone go out and support the Baird Bears.

Thanksgiving Service At Baptist Church


BAIRD- The community wide annual Thanksgiving service will be held Tuesday, November 20, at 7 p.m. The First Baptist

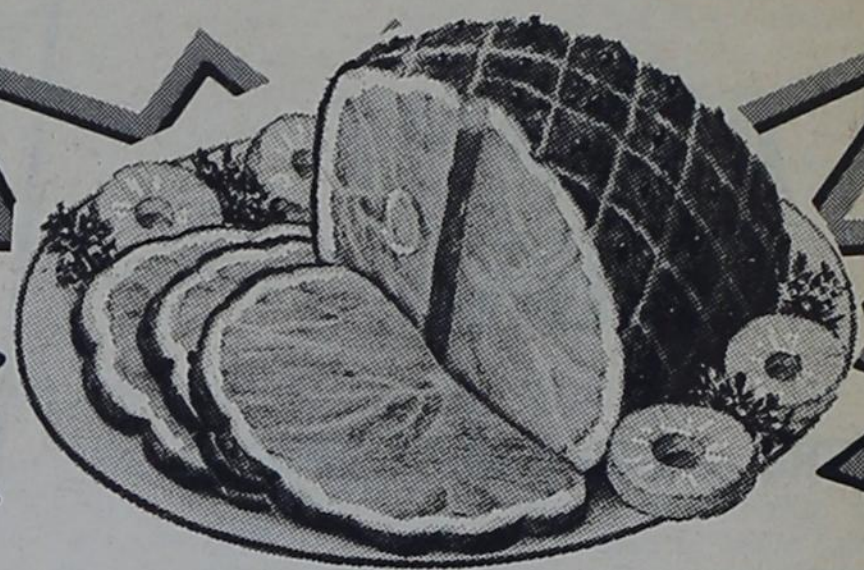

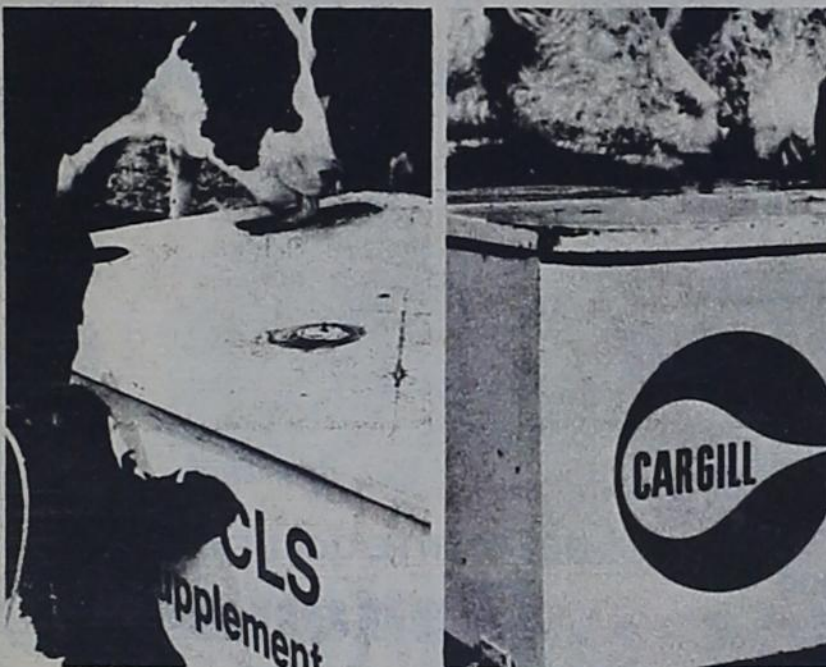

Homeowners May Be Eligible for Loan

COUNTY- A Callahan County homeowner whose house needs fixing up may be eligible for a loan and/or grant from Farmers Home Administration.

The agency makes home improvement loans to families who may not need or cannot afford a new house, but need some work done on their present house to bring it up to minimum property standards. It also makes loans as well as grants to homeowners to remove health or safety hazards from their dwellings. Grants are made only to low-income elderly homeowners, 62 years or older.

A borrower's income is the key to the type of assistance for which he is eligible.

If income is so low as to permit only removal of health or safety hazards, a repair loan and/or grant may be available.

For families with some what higher income, a home improvement loan may be possible to bring

the house up to FmHA minimum property standards.

Dear Editor:

In reading Sunday's paper I noticed an advertisement by an Abilene Bank concerning \$1000,000.00 CD's. It started me to thinking so, since the football games weren't very interesting I got out the copy of the June 30 audit report of the City of Baird and did a little figuring. Those calculations produced some interesting results and I'll try to pass those results on as simply as possible. The figures I use are approximate and some are calculated.

As of June 30 the total liabilities of the City was \$215,000. of that \$120,000. was in Bonds at 3 1/2 % and 4 1/2 % interest. Subtract the Bonds from the total leaves \$95,000. OK, now let's proceed. Let's sell the electrical system to WTU for \$240,000. and hopefully they would increase that figure by \$35,000. for the work the City has done and spent on the tie-ins. That produces a total of \$275,000 and out of that we pay off debts of \$95,000 and have \$180,000 left. That amount invested in CD's as mentioned above at 14.50% would mean a return of \$26,100. annually. Pretty good income, I'd say, and the City would be out from under their biggest problem and expense. Anyone who has studied as high as Sixth grade arithmetic can easily figure how that return would far surpass what can be produced by persuing present plans.
