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CONDENSED AUSTIN NEWS

A bust painting of former Governor Pat M. Neff, now a resident of Waco, to be hung in the rotunda of the State Capitol, has been approved by the State Board of Control and only awaits the approval of Mr. Neff before it receives its place of honor.

Reports on conditions of the 950 State banks in Texas at the close of business April 6, have been called by Banking Commissioner Charles O. Austin. A similar call has been made by the Comptroller of the United States for all National banks at the same date.

The annual meeting of the Texas Industrial Traffic League will be held at Galveston on July 3, it was decided here at a meeting of the board of directors of that organization. It embraces the traffic men of the commercial organizations of the various Texas towns.

C. V. Terrell, member of the Texas Railroad Commission, and H. E. Bell, chief of the oil and gas division of the Railroad Commission, are inspecting the new Lytton Springs oil field, twenty-one miles southeast of here. This field now has seven producing wells and seventeen derricks, a computation shows.

J. A. Smith, father of Railroad Commissioner Lon A. Smith, observed his eighty-fifth birthday recently at the home of his son. The elder Smith served throughout the Civil War as a member of Company B, Third Texas Cavalry, in which he enlisted at Houston. He was born in Monro, Ga., April 7, 1840.

Burrette Deal, sent to the penitentiary from Eastland County for one year for manufacturing liquor, has been given his freedom under a conditional pardon by Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson because his wife and four small children, the oldest 8 years old and the youngest less than a month old, are in destitute circumstances.

Water and sewer improvements calling for an expenditure of \$35,000 will be made in the near future by the city of Lamesa, according to plans submitted to the State Board of Health for approval. This includes the laying of 3 1/2 miles of sewer lines, 46 miles of water mains and the construction of a 50,000-gallon reinforced concrete covered reservoir.

Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson refused to grant the requisition of the Governor of Iowa for return to Des Moines of a former army officer, now a resident of Beaumont, to answer a charge of child desertion filed by his divorced wife. The Governor does not regard the man as a fugitive from justice and found after investigation that no offense had been committed.

The 35,459 teachers in the public schools of Texas during the 1923-24 session drew salaries aggregating \$36,336,737, according to a compilation made by the State Department of Education. The average salary was \$880. Women teachers totaled 28,061, with salaries aggregating \$21,668,169, with average salary of \$772, compared with 7,398 men teachers with total salaries of \$8,668,567, averaging \$1,172.

Listening to the appeal of the Cuban Consul at Washington for executive clemency for M. Silva, a native of Cuba, sent to the Texas penitentiary for twenty-two years for theft and burglary committed in Harris County, Texas, Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson Monday granted Silva a full pardon. Silva has served and has to his credit eight years of his sentence.

All sportsmen in Texas have been asked by State Game, Fish and Oyster Commissioner Turner E. Hubby to assist him in enforcing the laws. It is the duty of sportsmen to help game wardens and not stand idly by leaving those officials an almost superhuman task to perform, Hubby said, and it is his opinion that all good sportsmen should promptly report all violations of the game and fish laws that come to their notice.

Even the Japanese are motoring over the country, like many Americans, obtaining signatures of public officials. Two subjects of Nippon were in Austin recently in a motor car which has traveled many thousands of miles. They were the first Japanese to call on Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson. Both Japanese discussed the radically different sentiment in their own country and in the United States as to women in politics.

The largest inheritance tax ever paid in Texas will be contributed by the estate of Mrs. H. M. King, multimillionaire, who resided on the famous Santa Gertrudis Ranch near Kingsville, and owning a ranch of 1,200,000 acres, besides thousands of head of cattle, bank stock and other valuable assets. As yet no estimate has been made of the aggregate value of the property. Land and cattle may go to \$20,000,000. This alone makes it by far the largest estate ever left in Texas.

Texas News

The 100,000 gallon concrete water reservoir which has been under construction the last three weeks at Sinton has been completed.

A determined fight to prevent a threatened invasion of grasshoppers in Dallas county has been started.

The county dipping vat located about four miles from Bluffton, Llano County was recently dynamited.

Plans are under way for establishing a fig preserving plant in Edna in time to handle this year's crop.

Towers for the new radiocasting station in Brownsville have arrived, and will be placed at once.

The strawberry crop as a whole was almost a failure around Alvin this year, not more than a third of the crop being made, on account of dry weather.

Two issues of city of Killeen bonds, one for \$36,000 sewer and the other for \$16,000 waterworks, have been approved by the attorney general's department, bearing 6 per cent interest and maturing serially.

Formal transfer of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railway properties to the Southern Pacific system under the terms of sale approved recently by the interstate commerce commission, will take place on May 1.

Citizens of a dozen towns, extending from Waco toward Beaumont, met at Groesbeck recently and planned a whirlwind drive to have a through state highway from Waco to Beaumont designated at once along a direct line.

A fight to exterminate grasshoppers, which caused unestimated damage in Hunt county last year, has been started by county officials. A large number of the pests have been already destroyed, especially in the southern part of the county.

The commissioners court has called an election to be held May 30 in Rosenberg and Tavenner districts to vote on bonds to build hard surfaced roads on highways Nos. 3, 12 and 36. The Rosenberg issue calls for \$225,000, the Beasley district for \$150,000, and the Tavenner section for \$60,000.

One hundred Mexican quail have been received at Longview, for the purpose of restocking land in that section with birds. The birds were liberated on the Bivins Estate farm at Tally. Ten thousand acres of land where the birds were placed will be protected against all hunting for two years.

Airplane raids on troops of the 2d division as they march from Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, to Fredericksburg and return in May, will be made by pilots of the 3d attack group, Kelly Field, according to plans that are being considered. It is 80 miles from San Antonio to Fredericksburg.

The average salary for all teachers in the public schools was but \$888.62, a compilation of the state board of education just made. The average for men teachers was \$1,172.22, while the average for women teachers was \$772.41. The average for white teachers, men and women, was \$902.19, while the average for negro teachers was \$523.77.

Water and sewer improvements calling for an expenditure of \$35,000 will be made in the near future by the city of Lamesa, according to plans submitted to the board of health for approval. This includes laying three and one-half miles of sewer lines, four and one-half miles of water mains and the construction of a 50,000 gallon reinforced concrete covered reservoir.

Removal of some of the present buildings at Ellington Field, Houston, to the new Texas National Guard camp at Palacios was decided upon at a conference of Major W. A. Danielson, quartermaster corps, Fort Sam Houston, with Major General John A. Hulien of Houston. It was announced this week. The work of tearing down and rebuilding the frame buildings at the new camp will not get under way for several weeks, it is said.

The per capita cost of the 12,541 State wards in the 17 State eleemosynary institutions during March was \$21.28, a report of the State board of control shows. This is less than the per capita cost for the seven months of the fiscal year which shows \$23.10. The highest per capita cost was the Girls' Training School at Gainesville, which averaged \$77.94 each. The lowest was the Southern western insane asylum at San Antonio, which averaged \$15.22. The total expense for the several institutions was \$231,012.46.

FIRE INSURANCE PREMIUMS REDUCE.

Austin, Tex.—Savings in fire insurance premiums aggregating \$1,123,684 will be effected for 1925 in grants in 221 Texas towns good fire record credit, according to J. J. Timmons, state fire marshal. These figures are based on total premiums of \$8,030,197.22 paid last year, he said, which, because of increasing volume of premiums, indicate even better savings than the figure now

Substituting Skim Milk for Whole to the Calf

A calf ought to have whole milk for three weeks. After that skim milk may be substituted, but the substitution should be made gradually, at the rate of about a pint a day, that is, reducing the whole milk by one pint and increase the skim milk by the same amount. In that way a complete change will be made in about two weeks. The calf will then be from five to six weeks old. It should be taught to eat just as soon as possible. It will usually begin to nibble at hay at the age of two weeks and it may also be taught to eat grain very soon thereafter. Whole oats is perhaps the best grain to start with, although cracked corn is also a splendid feed and especially so if clover hay is available or mixed clover and timothy. Some farmers feed alfalfa to young calves and get splendid results, but in other cases it does not work so well.

Care for Sow and Litter

The sow and litter can be left in the small pen until the pigs are five to eight days old, after which both sow and pigs should get a little exercise. Care must be taken not to feed the sow too heavily on rich feed or she will produce so much milk that the pigs will very quickly become too fat and some will be lost simply because they get too fat. Once a litter of pigs has reached two weeks of age, losses should be very small.

Healthy Hogs Best

"The three first principals for healthy hogs are segregation, sanitation and vaccination," said L. E. Drury, a farmer of Morgan county, Ill., who markets about 1,000 head yearly. Cleanliness, sunlight, and plenty of commercial disinfectant he cited as necessities in sanitation. He regards it of importance to have the farm fenced in small well-watered beds with portable hog houses, and also to keep the herd assorted according to size.

LIVE STOCK

SEPARATED MILK IN RATION FOR SWINE

The Michigan experiment station has recently reported an interesting experiment in growing pigs on corn and water as compared to corn and separated milk. Two pigs that got milk gained 221 pounds each in five months. Those on corn and water gained only 9.5 pounds.

At the end of five months the milk-fed pigs were marketed and the two stunted pigs put in separate pens. Pig No. 4 got shelled corn, water and a good mineral mixture. Pig No. 3 got corn and separated milk and though he only weighed 43 pounds at seven months old, weighed 350 pounds at a year old, a gain of 307 pounds. No. 4 gained only 28 pounds, weighing 76 pounds at one year. Then No. 3 was marketed and No. 4 got separated milk and corn for five months. At the end of this time he had gained 274 pounds, weighing 350 pounds, showing that separated milk can bring out even a stunted pig to make good gains. The gains with separated milk cost 6.7 cents per pound, with skim milk at 35 cents per 100 pounds. Gains without milk cost 19.7 to 39 cents per pound.

Although separated milk contains valuable mineral matter, this was evidently not what was lacking in the corn. The main deficiency was in protein and in the growth-promoting vitamins, both of which were supplied abundantly by the separated milk. Many people try to feed pigs on corn alone, while others who have dairy cows separate the milk and throw the skim milk away. Both are making a serious mistake. If separated milk is not available one should use alfalfa pasture, tankage or some other protein supplement along with corn.

Some will say that they get better results on corn alone than were obtained by the Michigan station. This is probably true where pigs are getting some grass or weeds to supply them with mineral matter and vitamins and with some of the supplementary proteins. The main thing to remember is that corn is not a complete feed for growing animals.

Separated milk should be considered as a supplementary feed, not as a complete feed in itself. Where fed in moderate quantities, 2 or 3 pounds of separated milk may take the place of 1 pound of corn. In large amounts count 8 or 10 pounds of milk equal to 1 pound of corn. A good rule is to count 100 pounds of separated milk worth half the price of corn per bushel.—Chas. I. Bray, Colorado Agricultural college.

Salt Supply for Stock Is of Great Importance

Without giving much thought as to why they do so, most farmers provide salt for their live stock. They know that cows will become "salt hungry," if not well supplied with salt regularly.

Denied salt, normal growth, health, general thrift and production either cease entirely or are sadly impaired. Carefully conducted experiments have proved this to be true. Salt is an essential as good feed and pure water.

Most farm crops and mill feeds are very low in the element chlorine, the very element that common salt supplies cheaply, abundantly and in readily available form. The main use of salt is to supply chlorine that is required to make the hydrochloric acid found in the digestive juice of the cow's stomach, and without which that organ cannot properly perform its digestive function. Diminished milk flow and generally impaired physical condition soon follow if salt is not included in the ration.

It is sometimes customary to add salt to the grain mixture at the rate of one pound salt to 100 pounds grain. This, however, is not enough to provide the requirements for all purposes. Whether fed in the grain mixture or not, additional salt should be available at all times in the barn lots and pastures. This may be provided in the form of rock salt or salt blocks. It is advisable to keep this outside supply protected in some way from the weather. A common practice is to keep common feeding salt in a covered box, where the cattle may have access to it at all times.

Grades of Butter

In recent years, thanks to a better understanding of the relation of quality in cream to quality in butter, farmers are not only willing to sell their cream on a grading basis, but in sections where grading has not been established they are demanding that their cream be paid for on a quality basis. Not long ago patrons of the Iowa creamery boycotted their old creamery man and built a co-operative creamery, for no other reason than that the creamery man refused to pay according to grade.

DAIRY FACTS

DAIRY SIRE OFTEN BADLY NEGLECTED

The dairy sire is often the most neglected animal on the farm. There are two factors which are largely responsible for this condition. First, the average farmer has not been convinced of the important place which the well-bred sire holds in building up the production of the herd. Although the bull represents 50 per cent of the future herd he often receives less than 50 per cent of the care he deserves from his owner. On many farms the bull is required to stay most of the time during the winter months in a dark, damp stall without sufficient space for proper exercise, and is fed largely on cottonseed meal and low-grade roughage. Such treatment not only reduces the vigor of the bull, but often results in either temporary or permanent sterility.

The second factor which is partly responsible for the poor care which the bull receives is his nervous temperament. This makes it necessary to handle him with care to avoid accidents. The press frequently carries reports of persons being injured or killed by bulls. Because of such occurrences, dairy bulls have come to be looked upon in many cases as necessary evils. This attitude, coupled with a low appreciation of the value of the herd sire on the part of the owner, results in neglect of such essentials as feed, exercise, removal of manure from the stables and such other details of care that are necessary.

The ration of the bull may be much the same as that for the herd. Many breeders feed him the regular herd grain mixture. However, this is not advisable if this mixture contains a high percentage of cottonseed meal, as many breeders think that it has a tendency to cause impotency. A grain mixture composed of 300 pounds corn meal, 200 pounds wheat bran, 200 pounds ground oats, and 100 pounds soy bean meal is recommended, when fed with a legume hay. Enough grain should be fed to keep the bull in a vigorous physical condition, but not too fat, which tends to make him sluggish.

The roughage part of the ration should be made up of legume hays and a small allowance of silage. Legume hays are rich in protein and mineral matter, and are valuable in keeping heavily used bulls in condition.

Heavy feeding of silage has a tendency to distend the paunch and make the bull less active on his feet. From 10 to 15 pounds per day can be fed with safety.

The daily bull should have plenty of good pure water. He should be watered at least once per day in the winter and twice per day during the summer.

South Plains Line To Put Down Track

PROPER MANNER FOR MAKING CUP OF TEA

Freshly Boiled Water Is of Much Importance.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Water for tea making should be freshly boiled, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Water that has been boiling for some time is distinctly flat and insipid. Have two earthenware teapots, both warmed previously by pouring hot water in and allowing it to stand until the pot is to be used. The amount of tea required depends on the individual taste and on the kind and quality of the tea. Measure the required quantity of tea in the hot pot (from which the warming water has been emptied), pour on as many cups of freshly boiling water as are needed, steep from three to five minutes, and strain into the other hot

pot. Three minutes will usually allow most of the aroma and taste to develop without an excess of tannin, which makes the tea astringent.

When using English breakfast or China congo tea, one level teaspoon to each cup of water is satisfactory. A five-minute brewing gives more body, but the three-minute brewing makes a more delicate cup of tea. China congo has less tannin than the green teas and less than the India and Ceylon black teas.

Tea should never be boiled. After straining off the leaves, the pot should be kept hot in a tea cosy. Tea served with cream should be stronger than tea served with lemon.

Cheese Salad

- 1 1/2 cupfuls cream cheese
- 2 table spoonfuls corn oil
- 1/2 teaspoonful salt
- 1/2 teaspoonful paprika
- 1/2 cupful pecans
- 1/2 cupful green pepper
- 1/2 cupful pimento
- 1/2 cupful mayonnaise
- 1/2 cupful evaporated milk chilled and whipped

Blend oil with grated and whipped cream cheese, salt and paprika. Add chopped nuts, green pepper and pimento. Blend with mayonnaise and fold in whipped evaporated milk. Place in mold and pack in equal parts of ice and salt for 3 hours. Serve on lettuce leaves garnished with parsley or water cress.

Earning Money at Home by Making Your Own Soap

In farm butchering there is usually a large quantity of fat scraps which would be a loss if not utilized for making soap. Also, there are the fat scraps and trimmings from hams, haws and all home-cured meats, which can be saved and made into soap. The fat scraps saved from fall until spring will amount to considerable, and with these you will be able to make enough soap for all family needs, to last at least six months. This would be quite a saving. An excellent recipe for making a hard white soap, as good as any commercial soap you ever bought, is given below:

- 20 pounds of clean melted fat (free from salt)
- 4 quart of soft water in which are dissolved:
- 4 1/2-ounce cans of lye and
- 4 heaping tablespoonfuls of powdered borax.

Let the lye and borax solution stand until cold. It is best to dissolve the lye the day before you want to make the soap, as it takes the solution quite some time to cool. The grease should be just warm enough to be in liquid state. Add the lye solution slowly and stir mixture moderately until it reaches the consistency of honey. Now pour in cloth-lined box to harden. When partly hardened cut in bars but do not remove from box. Cover with an old rug or blanket and let stand 24 hours, when it may be removed. If possible, let soap stand in a warm dry place for a month before using. Remember, the longer the soap ages the better. It is milder and lasts longer. This recipe will make you about 100 bars of hard white soap, worth more than \$5, and you will get a great deal of satisfaction out of seeing the results of your own handiwork.

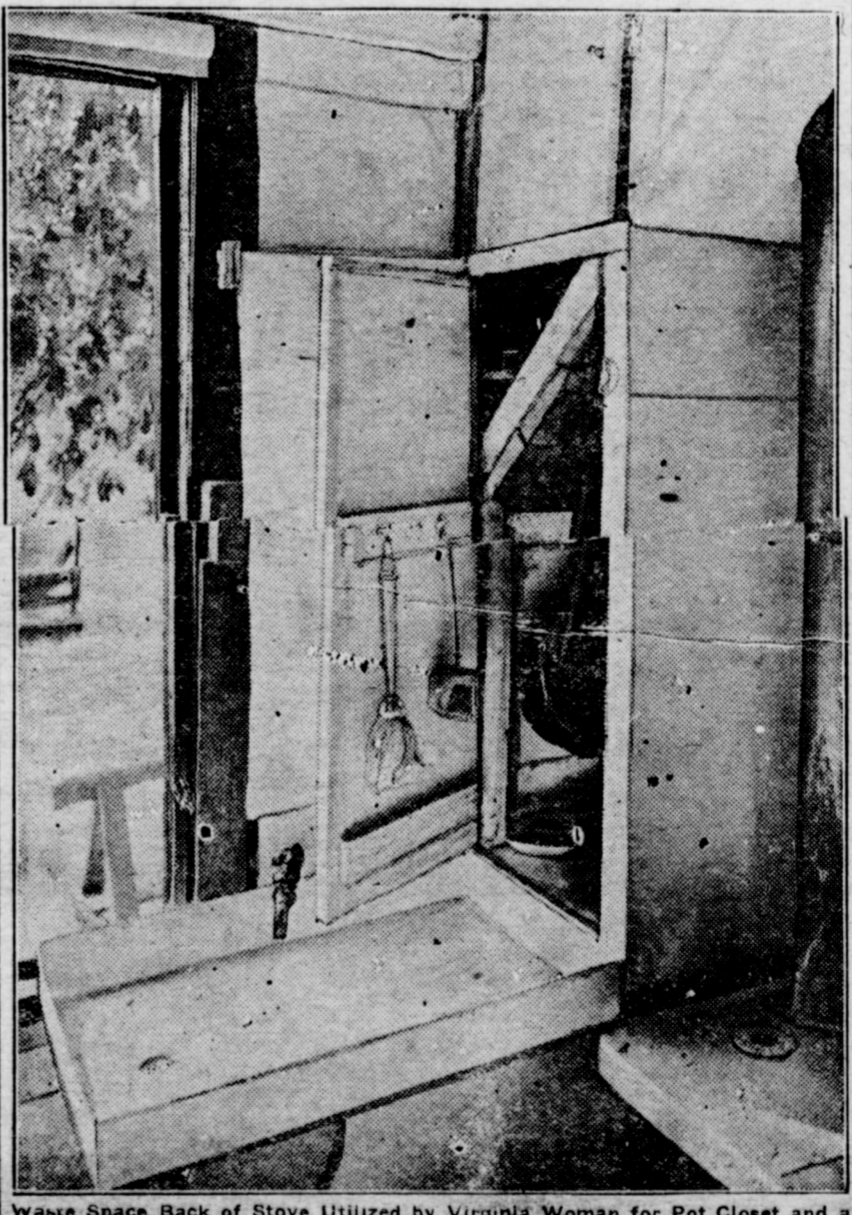
Baking Rhubarb Before Canning Is Ideal Plan

Try baking rhubarb before canning it—you will like the flavor. Wash the rhubarb stalks and cut them into half-inch lengths. Add one-fourth as much sugar as rhubarb, by measure, and bake until tender in a covered dish. Then pack in hot jars, and process for five minutes in a hot-water bath—that is, in any covered vessel of sufficient depth for the jars or cans, when set on a rack or false bottom, to be completely immersed while processing. The time is not counted until the water surrounding the jars has begun to boil actively.

What might be called the "hot pack" is now considered the best method of canning for all vegetables and a number of fruits, although certain fruits may be packed cold if boiling sirup is poured over them in the containers and the processing is continued for 20 minutes or more according to the product.

Directions for canning the common kinds of fruits and vegetables are given in Miscellaneous Circular 24, which may be obtained by writing to the United States Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C.

VIRGINIA WOMAN UTILIZES WASTE SPACE



Waste Space Back of Stove Utilized by Virginia Woman for Pot Closet and a Warming Closet Above Where She Raises Her Bread.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The corner between the stove and the wall is almost never utilized. In most kitchens it is too small and awkward to get at, so nothing is kept there. In Mrs. E. L. Johnson's home in Powhatan county, Va., this waste space was made even more hopeless because an old, unused staircase ran up to the second floor just there. The stovepipe was run through this staircase, the wood lined with metal to make it fireproof, and the space under the tread was made into a closet for pots and pans, mop, soap shaker and other accessories to dishwashing. A homemade sink was installed, taking advantage of the good light from the window. She has a barrel waterworks. There was another space available above the pot cupboard and as the heat from the stove pipe is just right for a warming closet, Mrs. Johnson raises her bread there. Mrs. Johnson also made herself a wheel tray from an old washstand and a high stool. She took all the old paint off her kitchen cabinet, enameled it white and painted a number of coffee cans for cereals and supplies, thus making her kitchen very compact and convenient. U. S. DEFENDS ITS SALE OF 5 VESSELS

CONTEND PURCHASE BY DOLLAR WAS IN THE NATIONAL INTEREST

ASK INJUNCTION BE VACATED

The Company Has No Equity at Stake, and That the Court Has No Jurisdiction in the Case

Washington.—Sale of five Government vessels to the Dollar Steamship Company, contested by the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, will be of "financial benefit" and will "result in a conversion of the assets of the United States and is in the national interest," the Shipping Board declared in answering an injunction suit brought by the Pacific Mail, whose bid was rejected.

In its answer, the board denounced the Pacific Mail as trying to "confuse the issue" and delay sale of the ships for its own advantage by its bid, which it declared was unsound, in addition to disregarding the terms and conditions agreed upon as basis for offers. The Dollar bid, it said, was found best, upon analysis. It was accepted recently by a vote of four to three.

The Pacific Mail recently was granted a temporary injunction holding up the sale, and its representatives and those of the board will appear in District Supreme Court here in a hearing as to whether it shall be made permanent.

Defending sale to the Dollar interests, the board denied that its action was illegal, arbitrary and capricious, as the Pacific Mail had alleged.

"On the contrary, the sale will be of financial benefit to the United States and to the people and taxpayers thereof and will result in a conservation of the assets of the United States and is in the National interest," the brief asserted.

The board was satisfied it was said, on the other hand, that the new corporation which the Pacific Mail proposed to create to take over the ships, which it now operates, "would not be able to maintain the service desired and proposed to be maintained."

The board asked that the injunction be vacated on the ground that petition of the Pacific Mail violated all rules of equity pleading, that company has no equity at stake, and that the court has no jurisdiction in the case, because the judicial branch of the Government can not review the exercise of the discretion imposed by law in the executive branch.

The answer of the board to the injunction proceedings "can not truly be considered the answer of the entire Shipping Board, but only of the four members out of seven who voted for the sale." Glen H. Carter, president of the Pacific Mail, declared in a statement commenting on the answer.

"Practically every vital statement in the answer has already been contradicted in the public statements of the three members of the board who voted against and denounced the sale as violating every principle of the merchant marine act."

WOMEN PREPARING TO WAR ON LEGISLATOR

Wadsworth Assailed With Reference to Proposed Amendment

Richmond, Va.—Nonpartisan women are united on at least one issue. The delegates to the convention of the National League of Women Voters have unanimously agreed to carry their political battle into the partisan field in so far as fighting recalcitrant legislators is concerned.

The latest target is receiving the concentrated aim of the women voters at this session. Senator Wadsworth of New York is the one whom the women are assailing with particular reference to the Wadsworth-Garrett amendment.

At a meeting of the Department of Efficiency in Government, in a sequestered spot in the Jefferson Hotel, the feminine politicians themselves are solemnly pledging themselves to oppose the proposals of the New York Senator which would make amending the Constitution of the United States more difficult than at present. It is a proposal to amend the amending clause of the Constitution making it possible for thirteen States refusing to ratify an amendment to preclude any further action on the amendment.

If the Wadsworth-Garrett amendment was enacted into law it would tear down all of the props which the women have set up to secure a child labor amendment they claim.

"Rainmaker" Gets \$8,000
Fresno, Cal.—W. H. Elliger, Tulare Lake grain grower, presented Charles M. Hatfield, Glendale, Cal., "rainmaker," a check for \$8,000 in payment for rainmaking operations from March 1 to April 15. Hatfield was to receive \$500 for producing 2.50 inches of rain and \$1,500 for producing 1.50 inches of rain. He accomplished his task in the lake region but fell shy at Coalinga.

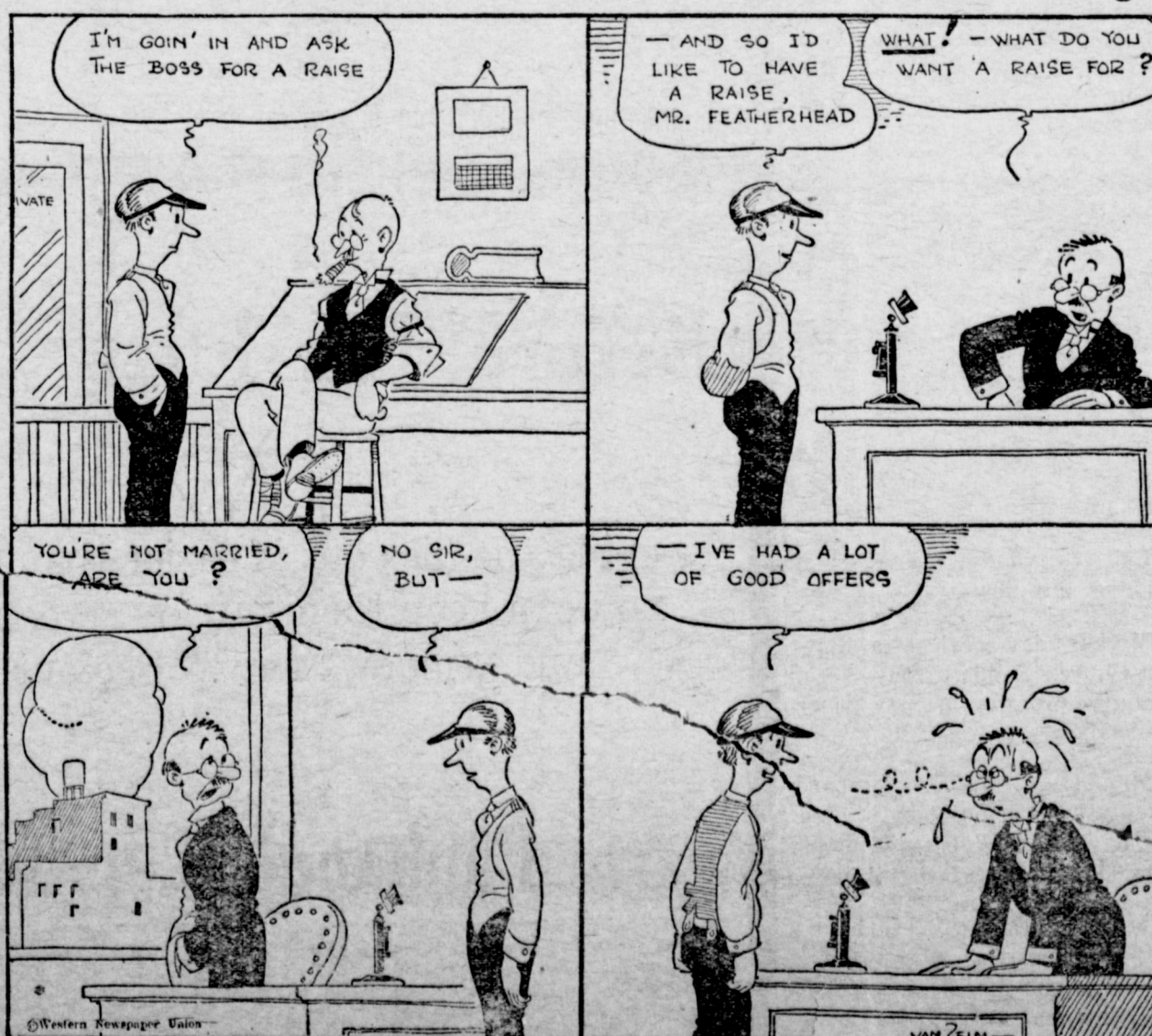

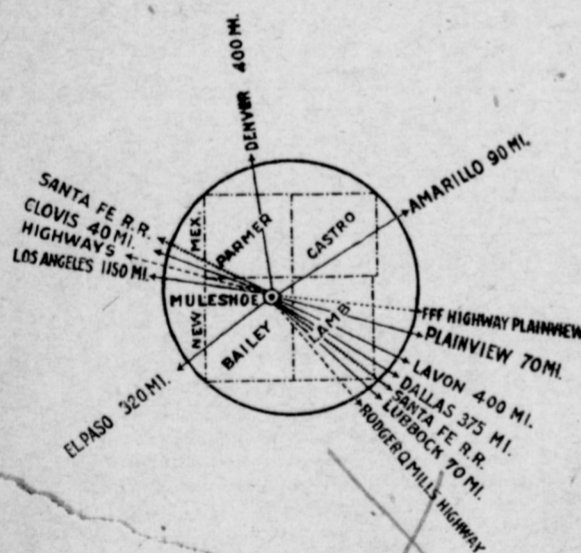

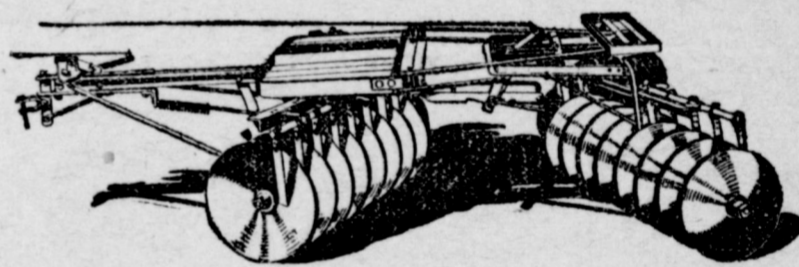

PICTURES IN THE HOME

By ALMA ZAISS

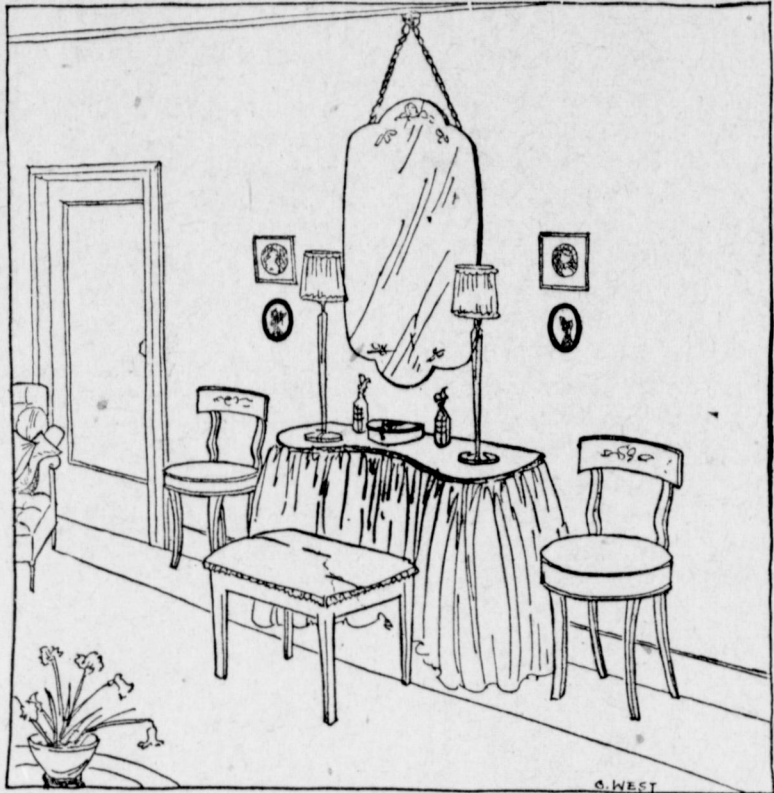

WHEN we see the beautiful silken cords and tassels that suspend large pictures today it seems incredible that for so long walls endured tarnished wires wriggling up and down between molding and picture frame. And small pictures, dangling by wire looped over a single hook, were once a common sight.

Thanks to artists, that day is past and now in almost every store and art shop there are big drawers of royal-looking cords and tassels, with snuz

As applied to pictures, then, this principle suggests it is wise to have in each room one fine, dominating picture, and that it should be so staged from the standpoint of lighting, grouping of furniture about it, favorable colors reflected in draperies and upholstery, that those who enter the room are subtly drawn to it, and remember it is a beautiful thing long, long afterward.

Some rooms have so cleverly capitalized this rule that one fine picture,

rosettes at the top to conceal the hooks that go over the molding.

For large pictures two parallel cords and two hooks are usually used. As indicated in the sketch, boudoir mirrors are sometimes hung on a single V-shaped cord, with a center rosette and a pendant tassel, but in other parts of the house the two cords are usually preferred. It is better to have cords blend into the wall tinting than to have a contrasting effect, which tends to call attention away from the picture.

All pictures not hung with the decorative cord, and always small pictures, are given a blind, flat hanging. Screws are placed in the back of the frame near enough the top so the

one best piece of furniture beneath it makes such a favorable impression that other lacks and shabbiness pass quite unnoticed in the glory of this impressive spot.

Naturally, a fine, rather large print of an Old Master subject is most frequently chosen for this purpose for living rooms, one that is rich and compelling in color, so hangings may be easily chosen to blend. For the bedroom the scene may be most delicate, but compelling, nevertheless; for other rooms, subject and colorings that best suit the spirit and furnishings of each.

Much depends on the lighting of this picture. Place it either where day light focuses on it in spotlight fash-

ion, or beneath a strong artificial light; and choose for its furniture comrade, if possible, a piece directly in sympathy with the period and subject of the picture. Other artificial lights and pictures it will be well to subordinate to this, your central theme.

It is a sly little trick, but worth trying for lackluster rooms that in spite of many lively trinkets fail to make a definite appeal.

The Importance Of Thoroughness

Once I worked in a Western Union office. Each morning as I came in to work the first thing I saw was the motto, printed in large letters, "Accuracy first, then speed."

Accuracy and Speed! How we need both in the hurry of this busy generation. Accuracy that each thing may be done without an error which might cost loss

of money or endanger life; speed, that work may be finished promptly so that precious time may be saved for rest, recreation and worship. But accuracy is by far the more important of the two virtues, and accuracy is but another name for the homely virtue called thoroughness.

The importance of thoroughness in school work can not be overestimated. It seems strange that parents and teachers so often overlook this fact and allow a child to get by without

doing his work at all or to do it in a slipshod manner. Knowing that such conduct handicaps one for life if it does not render him an absolute failure.

Surely the least that could be expected of a public school is that a pupil graduating therefrom should be able to read intelligently, to spell correctly the words used in ordinary daily communication. To write a friendly or business letter in a neat legible hand, and to calculate accurately simple problems in the four fundamentals or simple fractions and percentage. Yet business men constantly complain of the incompetency of high school boys and girls employed by them, because they fail along the lines mentioned.

Nor is the fault entirely with the teachers of our school. A teacher is often rated in a community according to the number of pupils she promotes. If she can promote all of her pupils she is a fine teacher in the eyes of most parents, who think their children are doing well if they are promoted each year, and who seldom take time to inquire whether or not the children are really learning anything.

Accuracy and speed! Yes both by all means, but let us remember that speed without accuracy is one of the gravest dangers menacing in our civilization today.

Let us not sacrifice thoroughness in our desire to speed children through school in order to rush them through their training for life and thrust them into the battle of life unprepared. Reflector.

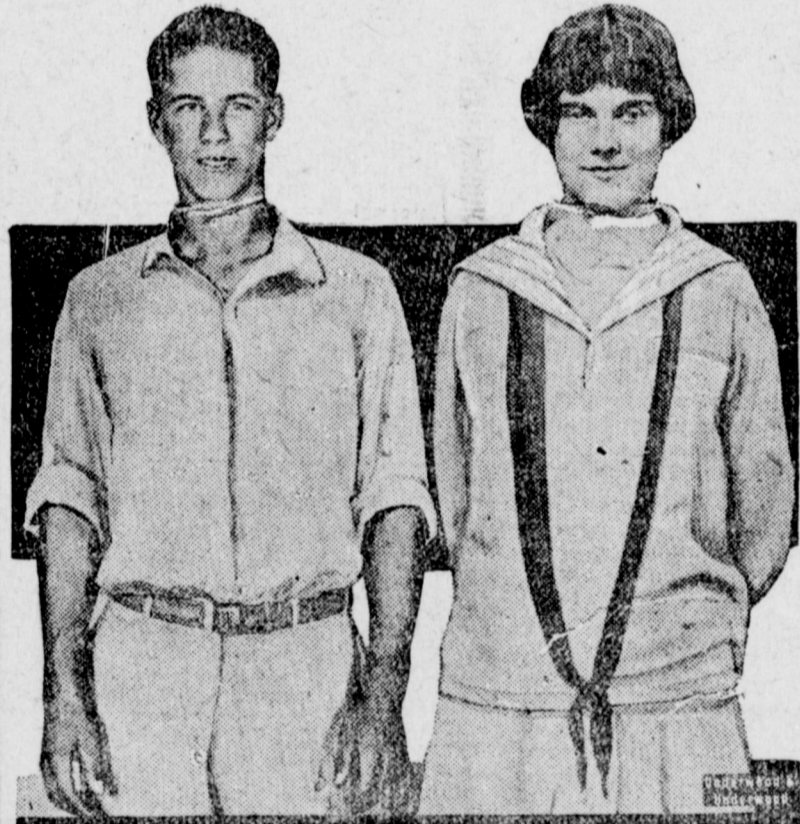

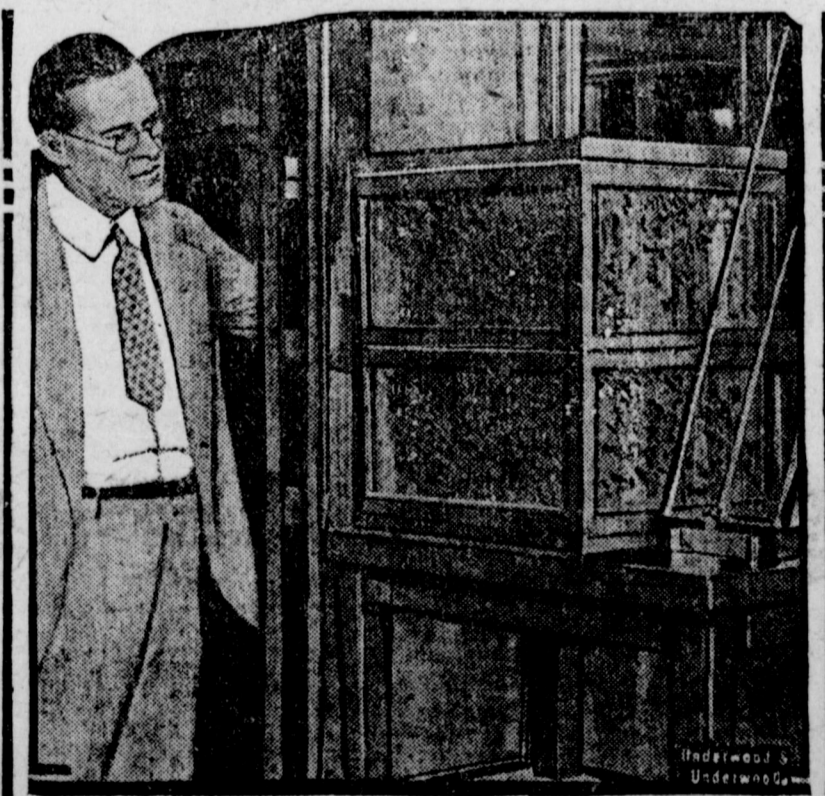
