Fire Takes Life of One, Destroys Building

H.T. Wagley, a longtime resident of Callahan County died early Thursday morning when the two room building he was living in caught fire.

Mr. Wagley, 67, had to walk with the aid of a walker. A wheelchair was found in the room with Wagley. He was bothered with arthritis and back trouble.

Mr. Wagley died either from smoke inhalation or poisonous fumes.

Justice of the Peace Ida Mae Waddell ruled the death accidental.

Two heaters, which were kept close to Wagley's bed, possibly started the fire. One was butane and the other wood burn-

Wagley was staying in the tin building to protect the property. The building was previously operated as Hilltop Liquor Store. The store had been closed for several weeks.

Four trucks from the Baird Volunteer Fire Department responded to the fire call about 8:30 a.m. Thursday.

When firemen finally reached the fire, Wagley had been in the burning building about fifteen minutes and was already dead. The firemen were hampered by the cold weather and they had to thaw the pipes to get water from them. It was about 20 degrees.

People at the scene tried to rescue Wagley using a small fire extinguisher, but the heat and flames were too intense.

Foam insulation in the building intensified the heat from the fire. Other than insulation, there wasn't much else to burn, because it was tin and had a concrete floor.

Eight firemen poured 4,000 gallons of water on the fire. It was under control by about 9:15 a.m.

Sheriffs Department Answers Questions

The Callahan County Sheriff's Department has been asked by numerous people of Callahan County to have published in the County newspapers about the operation and some of the work of the Sheriff's Department.

The largest percent of the work in the Sheriff's Department is criminal investigation and this does consist of 24 hour duty. At this time each deputy gets one week end a month off. The rest of the time he is on duty or on call. This department has three field deputies to patrol and investigate offenses over 907 square miles which are in this county.

Some comment has been made of the department using County cars for their personal use. These cars are owned by the Sheriff and the deputies and the reason we mark them is for the benefit of the County. The County approves us an allowance each month to help with the expense.

The national clearance rate of offenses is from 11% to 12%. Listed below are the number of offenses and clearance rates plus loss and recovery.






