# **Nixon Foresees** Era Of Peace For Tired World

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Nixon was inaugurated Saturday to his four more years in the White House, and declared he foresees a new era of world peace "as America's longest and most difficult war, comes to an end."

Amid pageantry and protest, the 37th President of the United States renewed his oath of office and spoke of his second term hopes

I read in the paper where Judge Ahders (of the Midland Municipal Court) was given a ticket for driving a car with an expired inspection sticker. Because it was his first ticket in Midland, he gave himself the choice of paying a fine or going to traffic school. I got a ticket for the same thing, my first ticket in 30 years of driving, but I was not told I could go to traffic school.

Judge Ahders said that anyone is eligible to go to traffic school on the first ticket, whether it is a moving violation or not-except for a violation of no valid Texas driver's license. But he suggests not taking the school on a non-moving violation because it would be of more value later if one received a moving violation citation. This is because a non-moving violation is not counted where insurance premiums are involved. As far as this particular situation is concerned, he said he would need more information to determine why the school was not offered. Persons with non-moving violation tickets do do not have to appear in court and it is possible that you did not appear before him. He said he would have given you the option of the fine or school.

Why doesn't the postman pick up mail clipped to the outside of a mailbox which can be seen clearly from the street or as he crosses the yard, even if he doesn't have mail coming to that house?-G. C.

Postal Service officials say that regulations covering residential delivery state that mail carriers are not responsible for picking up mail at any stop where he doesn't deliver mail.

However, in many instances the mail carriers do so anyway, particularly in cases where the resident is elderly or an invalid.

But if the carrier goes on by without picking up your mail, it may be because he is running behind schedule. Postal officials say that routes are set up on eight-hour day schedules based on the experience that carriers only have to stop at 80 per cent of the houses on that route. If they stopped at every house every day, it would either require more carriers or a 12 to 14 hour work day.

Is a person covered by Medicare barred from reimbursement for doctor bills if he postpones filing a claim for them?

No, but there are time limits. You must file before Dec. 31, 1973, for services received from Oct. 1, 1971, through Sept. 30, 1972.

# St. Ann's School Facing Crisis

The Rev. Ben Verbrugge, pas-tor of St. Ann's Catholic Church, said Saturday that St. Ann's School faces a crisis that will, within the next six weeks, decide whether the school can keep its doors open past the end of this school year.

It was learned Saturday that the five nuns who serve on St. Ann's faculty will be leaving the school at the end of the spring semester. Father Verbrugge explain-

ed, "The Congregation of the Immaculate Conception (the order of which the nuns at St. Ann's are members) is primarily a missionary order, not a teaching order, really. They

have decided to engage in missionary work after this year. "Of course," he continued, "here, as anywhere else, Catholic education is made possible by Catholic sisters who teach for a salary which in effect amounts to about \$2,000 annual-

Ernest Angelo Jr., president of the St. Ann's school board, said he hoped the five nuns could be replaced by other nuns from a teaching order, rather than by lay teachers. "Five additional lay teachers would put a considerable additional financial load on the school," he observed.

R. C. Michener, principal of

the school, said requests had been sent to 186 teaching orders in hopes of finding replacements. When asked about the possibility that the school might close, he said, "I wouldn't want to make a flat prediction right now; I think it's too early to say. But I do tend to be an optimist."

Father Verbrugge, however, noted that of the 186 inquiries, "We have received 92 answers so far - none of them very promising. Teaching nuns are a scarcity right now. Frankly, I think the chances are very slim of finding sufficient replacements." He added, "In about six weeks we will have to make a decision one way or another, but no decision has been made so far." All three men indicated much would depend on how many of the five nuns could be replaced with other nuns, as opposed to lay faculty replacements.

Based on average salaries in today's public schools, replacement of the nuns with lay faculty would mean an increase in the school's faculty salary budget of approximately 40 per cent.

Currently, the school has 13 faculty members plus Michener. The student body numbers approximately 315 in kindergarten through the sixth grade.





died in Midland County during 1972, 43 of them as results of violent acts and accidents. There were 937 births, 559 more than deaths.

The previous year, there were about 340 deaths, 26 of them by violence or accident.

The largest difference in violent deaths was the number of persons killed in traffic. Eighteen persons died in 1972 traffic mishaps, compared with eight in 1971.

**One Less Homicide** 

Midland County had one less homicide last year than the year before but had four more suicides. Seven deaths were ruled homicides last year and nine were ruled suicides.

There were five accidental deaths during 1971 but nine last vear.

Six of the nine accidental deaths last year were related to fire or electricity but only one resulted from fire during 1971.

Three of those six persons died of burns and-or smoke inhalation; two were workmen who were electrocuted; and one was a youth struck by lightning. No Drug-Related Deaths

Two of the 1971 deaths were caused indirectly by drugs but there were no drug - related deaths investigated last year by the justices of the peace.

Two of the other three deaths last year were caused by something falling on the victims.

The tongue of a boat trailer slipped off a block and fell on a 2-year-old boy, crushing his chest, and a wall fell on a workman, also crushing his chest. The other accident-ruled death was that of a Midland drilling contractor, who shot himself while handling a gun, according to Justice of the Peace Robert Pine.

All but one of the nine deaths ruled last year as suicides were caused by gunshot wounds. The other was carbon monoxide poisoning. Only one of the suicide vic-

tims was a woman and all were white. First Thought Murder.

eral days in a car in the Greenwood vicinity

After the sheriff's department determined there had been no foul play, Justice of the Peace John Biggs ruled the death a suicide.

There were seven homicides last year and grand juries determined that five were murders

Six of the deaths were results of gunshot wounds and one was a stabbing.

Five indictments of murder were returned in the deaths and two of the cases have been to court, resulting in convictions.

#### New Grand Jury To Be Empaneled

A new federal grand jury will be empaneled here Monday and it is expected that it will consider a recent area gambling investigation.

One source said that the government has acquired the room the grand jury uses for all next week, which is considerably longer than the one or two days the grand juries usually sit.

Receiving information, partly through conversations overheaded on tapped telephone lines, the FBI obtained 16 search warrants which were executed last month in Midland, Odessa and Monahans.

No arrests were made but numerous items of gambling paraphernalia and cash were confiscated.

#### Leary To Face Court On Monday

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) -Drug advocate Timothy Leary is scheduled to be arraigned in Superior Court Monday on 19 counts of a grand jury indictment in connection with a \$5-million drug-smuggling case. Leary, 52, a fugitive since his escape from a state prison in September 1970, arrived in Los Angeles Thursday and was arrested.

Leary is also wanted for his escape from a minimum-security prison near San Luis Obispo, Calif., where he had been serving a 1-to-10-year sentence for drug possession.
