CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 6 .- After a swing around the southern states, durng which time he visited several of the larger banks of the district, D. C. Willis, member of the federal reserve board, while in Cleveland fecently, said that the crops, especially cotton and rice, appeared to be moving better than they have been.

Mr. Willis was formerly chairman of the board of the Fourth District Federal Reserve bank here.


