Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs Discussed the Marash Tragedy With Correspondent of Associated Press; Denied Organized Massacre.

LONDON, Mar. 11 .- Zeitun, Humit and various other Armenian villages in Cilicia have been besieged by Turkish bands for the last 10 days, according to dispatches received from diplomatic sources today.

The dispatches say the Armenians thus far have been able to defend themselves.

Zeitun is 20 miles northwest of Marash, where the recent Armentan massacres are reported to have oc-






