PREPARED FOR REDS. MAY DAY VIOLENCE

Department of Justice Officials to Keep Watchful Eye On All Demonstrations Today.

WASHINGTON, April 30 .- After checking over their reports from all cials expressed confidence tonight that threatened May day demonstrations by radicals would not result in any nation wide attempt at violence.

While taking that view of the situation, the department of justice renewed its warning to local authorities everywhere that if the radical elements were to be kept under control, every law enforing agency, state and federal, must be awake and equal to the dangers, real and fancied.

Assistant Attorney General Garvan. who directed raids on communist and labor party headquarters in January declared as he went home for the night that reports indicate whatever violence occurred would be sporadic.

Most of these reports showed that the adicals were preparing gigantic propaganda demonstrations. Meetings are cheduled at many places and it is at these that trouble may develop, according to Mr. Garvan. The department, said would allow "these gatherings to talk themselves blue," but govern ment agents would observe the tenor of agitation. Agents have been instruct ed "not to incite or to excite trouble in any such assembly.

It was disclosed by Mr. Garvan that several members of congress, three fed eral judges and an attorney recently ac tive in investigating radical disturbanes, had been marked for assassination With the early discovery of the plots however, Mr. Garvan believed the officials against whose lives the plots were directed now are amply protected.

CARNEGIE COMMITTEE AWARDS BENEFITS TO TWELVE FOR HEROISM

PITTSBURGH, April 30 .- One silve nedal and 11 bronze medals were awarded to heroes today by the Carnegie Hero Fund commission, in recognition of noteworthy acts by men and women who sought to help others at their own peril. Five of them died. while two were disabled. To these last the commission made monetary grants, \$2000 and \$80 a month in one case and \$1000 in the other. The commission also awarded \$5000 for other worthy causes.

The five who lost their lives were: R.
