It will be on the J. C. Anderson land. Rig has been built and tools are moving in. The area around the location was geologized by E. C. Bergman, who is impressed with the prospects there.

Criticising the Home Town Newspaper

Make a few allowances for the difficulties that beset the newspaper publisher, and remember always, that nothing hurts a newspaper editor and his assistant quite so much as to see their mistakes in print. They have no chance to cover them up. The printed word can't be erased. Don't forget that newspapers are made by human minds and human hands and to err is human.

Rumors of Oil In Terry County

Vague rumors to the effect that oil in quantities ranging from three up to twenty five barrels per day have been found at various depths in Terry County are a float. The well which is the center of the greatest interest is located on the Brownfield ranch eleven miles southeast of Brownfield, and is now under reaming and setting 16 inch casing at a depth of about 1000 feet. Excitement is high in that section and representatives of several companies are on the ground trying to secure drilling blocks according to reliable reports which have reached us.—Bledso News.

Abernathy Test To Be Started During February

Work on a new oil test at Abernathy will begin sometime in February, according to Herman Schulz of Madison, Wisconsin, who is in Hale county now to attend to the details of the new well and who was in Plainview Monday on other business matters.

Mr. Schulz said that Frank Allen, the driller who went to 4,000 feet on the other test will be in charge of the drilling this time, no matter who takes over the proposition. He is expecting a noted geologist of a Fort Worth Company here this week to look over the proposition and he is expecting that a binding contract will be entered into soon with some reliable individual or firm.

Mr. McBride, of Pennsylvania is expected here before the end of the present month and he will take over either the Abernathy proposition or the Tullia project, perhaps both. He is certain he wants one of them.

Mr. Schulz says that whoever takes over the Abernathy well will fill it up to the 1300 foot level, where a flow of oil was encountered in the old hole. Mr. Allen said when that was struck that with a dry hole the well was good for 100 barrels of fine crude daily, and at a depth of 1,300 feet, such a production would have been good pay.

So the first thing that is to be done at Abernathy is to plug up the old hole and see what is there. And it may be that a shallow field with good pay can be brought in at once.

Mr. Schulz will remain the county until the drilling on a new test is started. All the leases at Abernathy are in his name and he has a considerable block of land leased near Tullia, "and we are going to have a test if I have to give them" all up," Mr. Schulz says.

Betsy Ross Trio To Be Here January 29th

"Now, original, unique, and fascinating." This terse sentence was recently used to aptly describe the program of the Betsy Ross Trio, a group of three gifted young ladies from the South, who offered a "different" program of charm and refinement attributed to Southern womanhood. It will be presented here on the evening of Saturday, January 29th, at High School Auditorium.

Perhaps the general education of this group lends dignity and artistic merit to their program. Each is a college woman who has achieved prominence in civic and literary club work throughout the country, aside from her work as an artist.

Ethyl Ross is a student and artist, with years of exhaustive study, research and training. She is recognized throughout the country as a successful dramatist, producer and musician. At the age of eighteen she was a graduate of the Cleveland School of Music. In her readings she is not an exponent of any system or school of technique, but gives you types and characters that she has made a close personal study of—to her they are real and she makes them live for her audience. During the years devoted to performing, Mrs. Ross found time to study law, and received her degree L. L. B. from Baldwin Wallace.

Edna Greer mastered the violin at an early age. Florida claims her as one of its most accomplished musicians and teachers of the violin. She took her B. M. degree in the Conservatory of Music at Florida State Women's College, and a B. S. degree from the same school. Rare natural talent, augmented by years of earnest study and experience in public work, makes Edna Greer an artist of the highest type. Her rich contralto voice and years of training in dancing and piano add wonderfully to the ensemble work.

Rose Gorham, sister of Mrs. Ross, is truly an artist from the tips of her toes to the crown of her dainty head. Whether it be voice, or in the dance, her art is supreme. Nature has endowed her with gifts rare and manifold. Her early training in the South has been followed up with the best teachers afforded in the East, both in voice and dancing. Her many years of public appearances and teaching have developed a breadth of charm and beauty in her performance seldom displayed by one artist.

Where possible to do so, they will present the quaint folk dances of former days and other nations delightfully given by Miss Gorham and Miss Greer. Costumed songs and interpretative readings of early periods in American history are most dramatically given. Outstanding in this part of the program will be the visualizing of the dramatic story of Betsy Ross.

Lesson for January 30

THE CHRISTIAN OVERCOMING TEMPTATION

LESSON TEXT—Luke 4:1-13; I Cor. 10:12, 13. GOLDEN TEXT—In that He Himself hath suffered being tempted, He is able to succor them that are tempted. PRIMARY TOPIC—Obeying God Always. JUNIOR TOPIC—How to Stand Against Temptation. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—How Christ Helps the Tempted YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—How to Overcome Temptation.

Christ's temptation was Messianic. No one has ever been tempted just like He was—led into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit to be tempted of the devil (Matt. 4:11). While we are not tempted as He was, the devil uses the same methods on us. This temptation was not:

1. A preparation for His work, but rather His first conflict. In His baptism we have the symbolic act of the dedication of Himself to the work of redemption through the cross—the making full a righteousness. 2. It was not to see if Christ would stand fast, nor to see if He would fall under the most crucial test. He could not have failed. 3. It was to show Christ as an object upon which we may rest our faith with unshaken confidence. He came as the second man, the head of the new race. The temptation therefore was a demonstration of the inseparableness of the divine and human natures in the incarnation.

I. The Temptation of Christ (Luke 4:1-13). 1. The place (v. 1). The wilderness of Judaea. The first man, Adam, was tempted in a garden with the most pleasant surroundings. The second man, Jesus Christ, was tempted in a barren wilderness surrounded by wild beasts (Mark 1:13). 2. The method (vv. 2-12). Christ as the world's Redeemer sustained a three-fold relationship—Son of Man, the Messiah and Son of God, therefore Satan made each one a ground of attack.

(1) As Son of Man (vv. 2-4). Satan made his first assault upon Him as a man by appealing to the instinct of hunger. Satan urged Him to use His divine power and convert a stone into bread. Hunger is natural and sinless. Real human life experiences hunger. The temptation was in satisfying a right hunger in a wrong way. To have yielded in this case though His hunger was desperate, would have been to renounce the human limitations which He had taken for our sins. In the incarnation He became identified with humanity, so He chose to abide in fellowship with man.

(2) As Messiah (vv. 5-8). Here the temptation was to grasp His rightful dominions by false means. The devil offered to surrender unto Him the world if He would adopt his methods—worship him. The force of this temptation was in the fact that the kingdoms of the world are Christ's by God's covenant with Him. God's method by which Jesus was to possess the world was the sacrificial death on the cross.

(3) As Son of God (vv. 9-12). Here Satan tries to induce Christ to presume upon God's care. He quotes a Messianic Psalm to induce Him to so act. To do the spectacular thing in order to get notice is to fall into Satan's temptation. For Jesus to have placed Himself in danger in order to get God's special help in delivering Him would have been to sin.

(4) Christ's defense (vv. 4, 8, 12). It was the Word of God. He met and repulsed the enemy with "It is written." Our defense is God's Word (5) The Issue (v. 13). Satan was vanquished.

II. The Temptation of Believers (I Cor. 10:12, 13). 1. Temptation is to be expected (v. 12).

From the appearance of Satan in the Garden of Eden on down through the ages men and women have been assailed by the tempter. These facts are God's admonitions unto us upon whom the ends of the world are come. Caution is always necessary. Overweaning self-confidence is most perilous to those who rest in the security of their divine election while neglecting a life of holiness.

2. Divine help available (v. 13). All temptations which come to us are those which are common to the race. No one should surmise that his temptation is peculiar. God is faithful and will not allow the temptation to go beyond the ability of the one tempted. He will provide a way of escape.

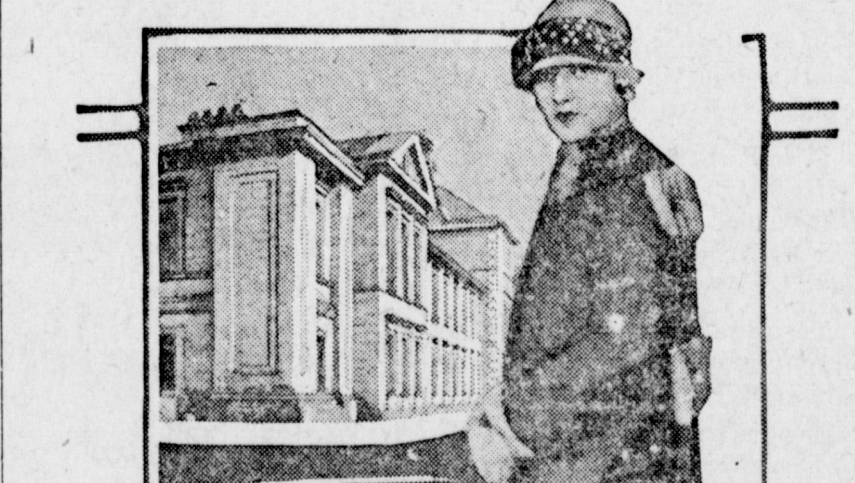

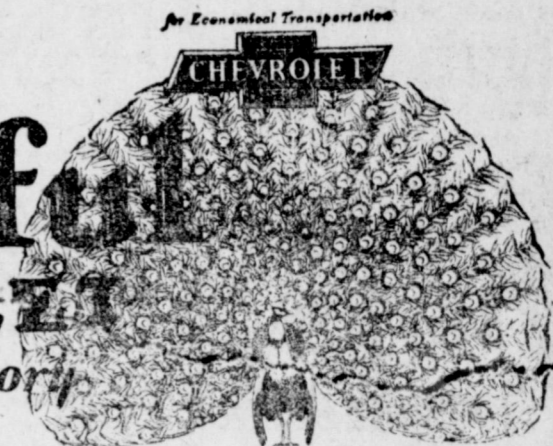
