WASHINGTON, May 26 .- The cross examination of Secretary Daniels by the senate naval investigating commit. evening: tee, concluded today, was marked by heated clashes between the naval secestary and Senator Pittman, democrat, (Schubert)-Lerma Baten. Nevada, on one hand and Chairman Hale on the other. Sear Admiral Sims, whose charges against the navy department brought about the investiga tion, will take the stand in rebuttal to morrow. Chairman Hale indicated that the admiral would be the last witness and that his statment would be brief.

During a verbal tilt with Senator Hale, Secretary Daniels threatened to carry to the full senate naval commit tee a protest against the chairman's conduct of the inquiry. 

SCHOOLS OF MONTANA BEST IN THE NATION. ACCORDING TO REPORT

NEW YORK, May 26 .- The state of Montana has the best all-round public hool system in the United States, acording to the results of a comparative study of the state school systems made ublic today by the Russell Sage Forn-The report assigns second place the schools of California, third place to those of Arizona, fourth to New Jersey and fifth place to the state of Wash

These findings are contained in a re port by the department of education of undation. The volume is entitled 'An Index Number for State School Systems," and the author is Dr. Leonard P. Ayers, Director of the Foundasion's department of education. Other findings of the report are that

the school system of the United States a whole has doubled in efficiency suring the last 50 years, having an infex number or rating of 26 in 1870 and one of 52 at the present time. Since these index numbers are figured on the basis of 100, the school system of the country has now an effectiveness or efficiency of only 52 per cent, according to the report.

The figures for the individual states as given by the Foundation show that during the past 30 years the West has been coming up educationally while the East has been going down. During this ime the greatest increase among all states has been made by Utah while the state to which is attributed the reatest falling off in relative standing Maryland. In the East the only state that has gained instead of losing is New Jersey. In the West the state that has the best and most consistently high record is California.

Among the interesting results of the study is the conclusion that the school)ysterns of the United States' territorpossessions, such as Hawaii, the Canal Zone, and Porto Rico, have higher ratings than those of many of the 48 states. That of Hawaii is reported better than those, of the majority of the American states. Ten Southern states have records poorer than that of Porto

CONTROL OF SUGAR PRICES.

TO CONTROL the wholesale and retail price of sugar in Dal las, an agreement has been reached between the U. S. district attorney's office there and and the wholesale grocers. This district attorney, R. E. Taylor, of the northern district of Texas, makes the following statement, that should be of general interest in Texas:

"The wholesale grocers of the city of Dallas, heretofore insisting on their right to fix the selling price of sugar on the basis of a reasonable margin of profit above the daily replacement value of such sugar, have agreed with the United States district for the northern district of Texas to abandon their contention and to hereafter comply with the ruling of the department of justice that such profits should be limited to one cent per pound above the cost price, as defined by the department of justice. It is believed their example will be followed by other wholesalers, with the effect of at least retarding the pyramiding of sugar prices, and, possibly, of contributing to some reduction in price in this territory, which will largely depend on the attitude of the retail grocers, who will be vigorously prosecuted if they refuse to limit themselves to the profit of two cents per pound, as fixed by the department of justice."


