Promoting Character, Family Values and Acceptance – School Presentations Equip Community

This past week Sonora schools got a shot in the arm, as Jim Williams, family counselor and nation wide speaker, addressed teachers, students and parents on issues of developing and promoting character at school and home. Quick-witted and full of energy, Williams inspired his diverse audiences at six separate assemblies over the course of three days. Each audience heard a consistent message, from a different view point to reflect the diversity of ages and experiences of his audiences.

Williams began the series on Tuesday night, December 12 speaking to parents in the Elementary School library. His focus was family values and fostering parent/child relationships. He quoted statistics that show by age fourteen, ninety percent of what a child believes about the world and himself will already be established. Also,

children who have three to four good adult role models, plus a mom and a dad have a very high chance of becoming happy, successful adults. The importance of establishing values in the home, school and in the community through programs such as 4-H, scouting, and sports is paramount to the continued health of the community. Otherwise, children with no role models to teach respect, responsibility, honesty, self-esteem and kindness will fall through the cracks.

Presentations continued Wednesday the 13th and Thursday the 14th, as teachers learned skills to support students and each other, with a particular emphasis on the subject matter of Acceptance. Fourth grade students learned about "Gateway Drugs", such as alcohol, tobacco, and inhalants. Another powerful part of William's presentation addressed bully behavior.

Fifth and sixth graders also heard material on bully behavior at school as did the seventh and eighth graders. The older children were taught how to prevent and respond to sexual harassment and violence on campus. Williams cites that eighty-five percent of children will be either followers or bystanders in any of these given situations, while the remaining fifteen percent will act according to their core values of right and wrong. Williams stressed the importance of having strong character values and being able to stand up for them in the face of drug use and abusive behavior.

Williams teaches parenting courses, and provides training for teachers and guidance counselors throughout the country. He is also the author of "Parenting on Point" and has published a video series entitled "Proactive parenting". Further information about Williams and his

courses can be obtained from his website www.parentingonpoint.com. The benefit of bringing this type of professional training and education to Sonora schools and community is immeasurable. The overall health and growth of this community is significantly impacted by the positive investment made in the children and families today.

Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital Recognized By Office Of Rural Community Affairs

The Office of Rural Community Affairs honored Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital on December 13, 2006 at the Concho Valley Council of Governments meeting in San Angelo for having secured a \$9,280 grant from the Small Hospital Improvement Program.

Funds from the Small Hospital Improvement Grant are being used for continuing improvement in technologies. "These funds will be used toward the conversion of the hospital to an electronic

records format", stated Keith L. Butler, CEO. "Phase one of the project was completed in September with phase two beginning in March 2007."

Phase one replaced the financial package as well as integrating a laboratory Information System (LIS) and a Radiology Information System (RIS). Phase two, referred to as Chart-Link, will convert the documentation system to an electronic format. Chart-Link will tie together all departments in the hospital so

that paper records used for decades are replaced with an Electronic Health Record.

Once the projects are complete, Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital will have the most modern information system in the region.

"I commend the efforts of Lillian M. Hudspeth Memorial Hospital and their dedication to their rural Texas community," said ORCA Executive Director, Charles (Charlie) S. Stone.

DPS Troopers Urge Safer Holiday Driving

DPS will have all available troopers on Texas roadways during the Christmas and New Year's holidays. They'll be looking for drivers who are drunk, for speeders and for those who are not wearing safety belts.

"Slow down and live," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the Texas Dept. of Public

Safety. "Speeding is the number one killer on Texas roadways. Making sure you're driving the speed limit—or drastically reducing your speed in bad weather or in crowded road conditions—can mean the difference between life and death. We want to make sure you get to your destination safely."

The Christmas enforcement period will run from Friday, Dec. 22 through midnight on Monday, Dec. 25. The New Year's enforcement period will run from Friday, Dec. 29 through midnight on Monday, Jan. 1.

"Be sure to designate a driver if you're planning on consuming alcohol."

Sonora Caverns Offer Reward In Theft of 'Treasure'

The owners of the Caverns of Sonora in Southwest Texas are offering a reward for the return of a national treasure — part of a rare butterfly formation that took shape over thousands of years.

Robbed of their dazzling centerpiece, valued in excess of \$500,000, on the Tuesday before Thanksgiving, cave owners are offering a \$20,000 reward for its safe return.

They claim college-age visitors from the Houston area may have been responsible for the vandalism, which apparently involved the intentional distraction of a tour guide.

Sutton County Sheriff Joe Fincher declined comment on possible suspects.

"We're certainly continuing the investigation, and if it warrants, subjects will be arrested," Fincher said Thursday.

Also declining to discuss witness accounts and other evidence gathered in the past three weeks, the sheriff said, "we've got some subpoenas issued and we're going from there."

Fincher said he's eager to solve the criminal case.

"It's a pretty serious deal," Fincher said.

Cavern owners issued a statement late Wednesday expressing heartbreak over the loss of "one of America's greatest speleological treasures" to "an act of senseless destruction" on Nov. 21.

The owners said they believe a group of visitors "knowingly distracted a tour guide with the intent of destroying the cavern's most famous formation, known as the Butterfly, a bladed helictite."

Owners said they're "working with local, county and state

officials to retrieve records related to visitors on the day the vandalism occurred.

A preliminary investigation revealed a visitor from the Houston area as a possible suspect."

In an interview, co-owner Seco Mayfield said the probe has focused on a group of 11 visitors, several of whom have been identified through campground records, credit cards and other means.

Although the site is a National Natural Landmark, it isn't covered by federal anti-vandalism laws because of its private ownership, Mayfield said. However, because of the estimated value of the loss, the vandalism may qualify as a felony theft under state law, Mayfield said.

The missing wing portion is 4 1/2 inches by 3 1/2 inches and could be reattached if not seriously damaged, Mayfield said.

"The Butterfly is our trademark," he said of the natural formation shaped by mineral deposits. "It's an integral part of our business."

Mayfield co-owns the caverns with his sister, Gerry Ingham, and each put up \$10,000 for the reward. The National Speleological Society and other groups have pledged to the reward fund.

"We want to find these people and try and convince them to give it back or tell us what happened to it," Mayfield said.

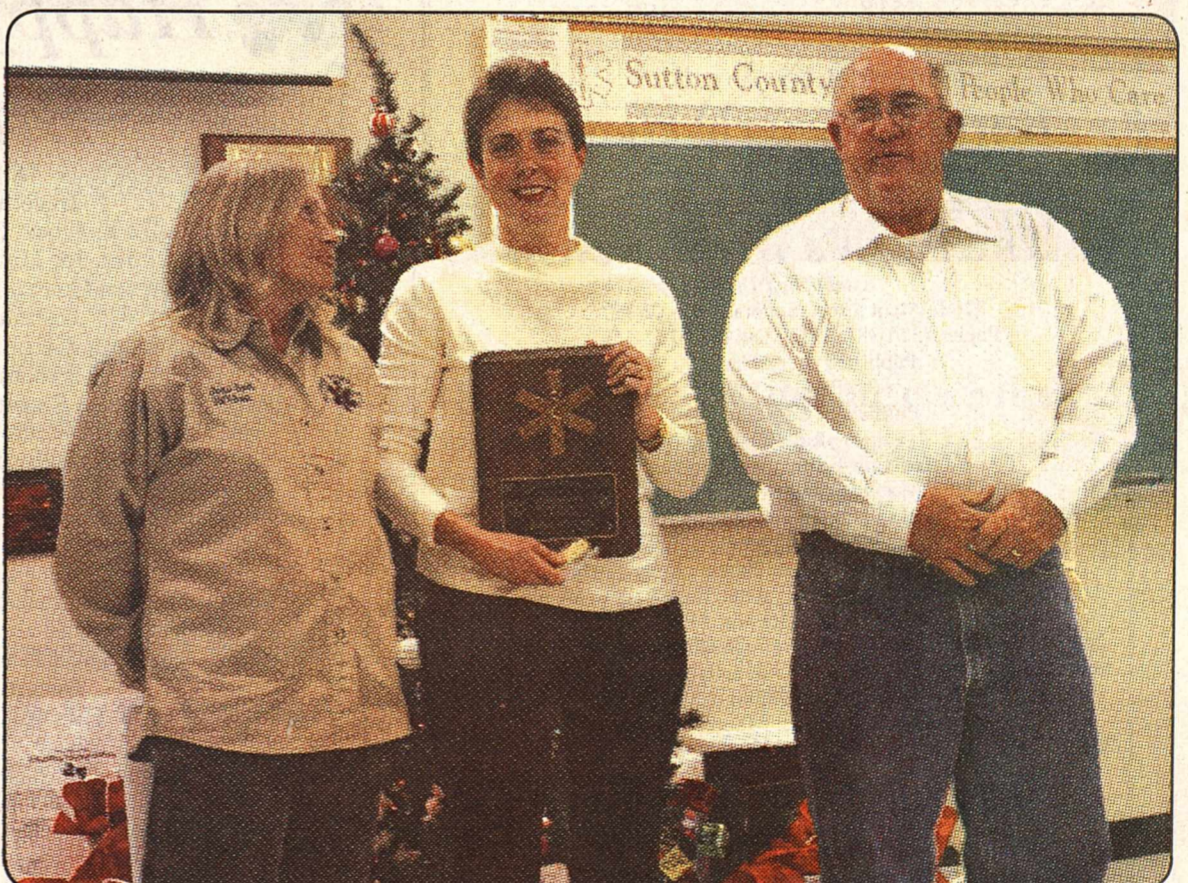

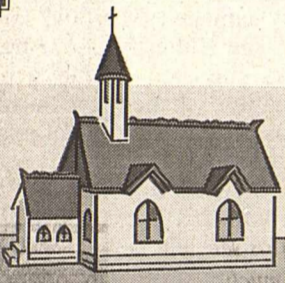

Last week's well-publicized immigration raid on the Swift & Co. meatpacking plant in Cactus, in the Texas Panhandle, serves as a troubling reminder that our immigration system is broken and needs to be fixed.

Texas businesses want and need to follow the law. Unfortunately, they lack a sensible and reliable system to verify an employee's legal status.

Employers are forced to navigate tricky waters each time they make a hire. Texas businesses must deal with complex immigration regulations; a glut of seemingly valid, but sometimes counterfeit, worker identification documents; and the threat of discrimination lawsuits if they ask the 'wrong' questions about employees' documents.

Enforcement alone will not fix our immigration system, and it has failed in the past. We can't just build walls around a broken system - we need to fix the system to make sure we achieve real security, restore law and order and have enough workers to continue growing our economy.

It is time for a serious solution to this serious challenge. It is time for Congress to act.

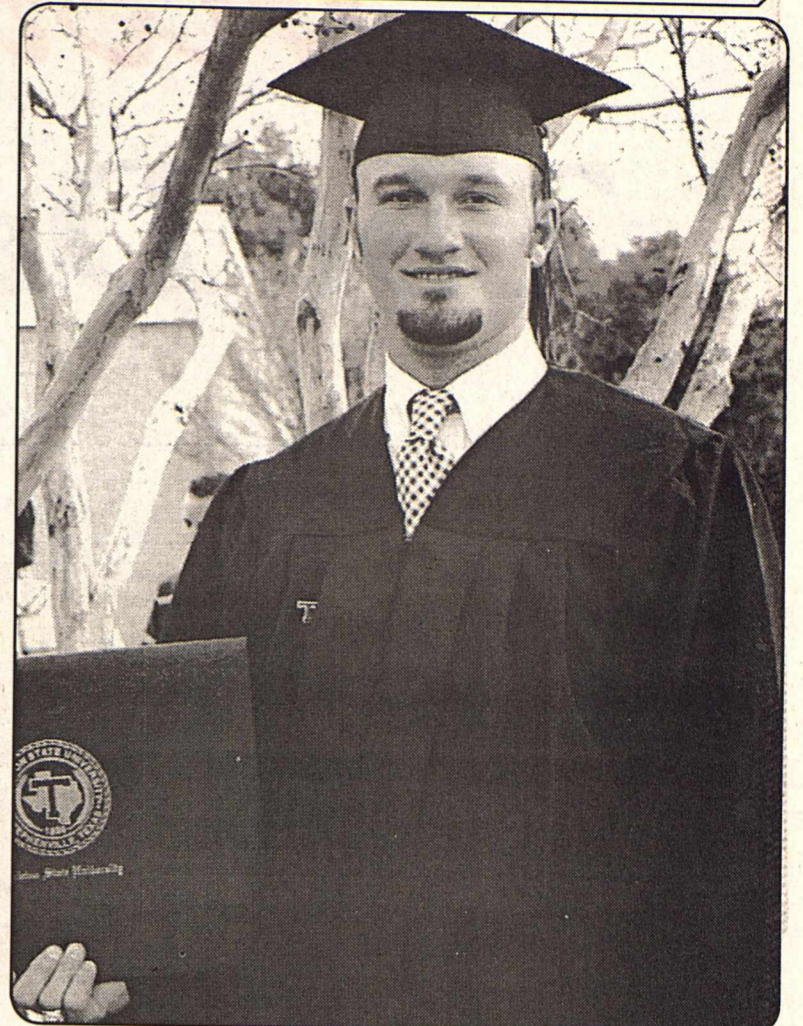

ASK THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

We would like to start out this column by thanking a few people who help make things run a lot smoother around here every year. Patricia Craig Johnson has donated on line computer service money for the past 2 years so that our one phone line isn't tied up by computer users, we deeply appreciate her donations and her ongoing interest in the society.

David and Betty Smith have been so much help these past few months. They are hard working snow-birds and we appreciate their help in the office and in decorating all the buildings in the Sutton County Historical Society Complex, which includes the Miers Home Museum, John & Mildred Cauthorn Memorial Building (Old Depot) and our offices. His helping assemble the tables and chairs and cabinets we recently purchased, so people could have real tables and chairs, instead of a card table and folding chairs to work on, makes a big difference in volunteer and researcher comfort. Rick and I both appreciate all they have been doing to help the community.

Marvin Shurley and Rick Bowen came in and helped us with the high decorations and did some repair work on the ceiling of the depot. Thank you so much for being a good VP Marvin, and for all the work you both have been doing down at the Ice House Museum. It is amazing how much of the building has been gutted, things are moving along quite well this year. All we need is a few more volunteers down there with hammers, saws and muscle and we might be able to finish gutting and start putting the place back together and getting it opened up.

And Margaret, thank you so much for the contributions this year they were deeply appre-

ciated. And all the rest of you who have been so generous and helped us to preserve the history of Sutton County in written records, archives, newspapers and stories, thank you all!

We talked about hotels on Main St. and Patricia Craig Johnson was kind enough to send me a little information for the files on the Texas Star Hotel that I thought you might enjoy:

The Texas Star Hotel was a wooden structure on the corner of Main Street and Water Avenue where the Mercantile Building now stands. Patricia didn't know who initially built it, but in 1892 Emory Gibbons and his wife, Margaret Jane Davenport Gibbons, purchased it and moved from their home on the Verde River in Bandera to operate it. They also bought a house near the hotel. Emory was a retired Texas Ranger and a Confederate Veteran. Margaret Jane was from the Davenports of Uvalde, who settled in that area in 1852. Emory and Margaret were the parents of twelve children. The five who were not married made the move to the bustling, dusty, young town of Sonora. One daughter, Viola, was 14 years old. She, no doubt, helped in the hotel and in the dining room.

Will (William John) Fields, a young stockman, was frequently in town. He was originally from Manor, TX, ten miles east of Austin. He came to Sutton County in 1889 to look after the stock and land of his father, Dr. J. D. Fields, who practiced medicine in Manor. The Fields ranch started just east of Sonora.

It is not known how Will and Viola met. Will may have taken his meals at the Texas Star or have seen Viola at some get-together. Being so new, raw, and removed from traditional entertainment, the community of Sonora worked very hard at providing a busy social life for all its young folks. Picnics, hay-rides, parties, dances, and bicycle outings were reported weekly in the

early newspapers.

In 1893 the Texas Star burned to the ground. Emory and Margaret remained in Sonora after the fire. They still owned their land on the Verde River and Emory visited often, expressing his desire to return there to live.

Will and Viola were married on August 29, 1894 in the home of Emory and Margaret. Will was 26 years old and Viola was 16. Sometime after their marriage Emory and Margaret sold the land where the hotel had been.

In February of 1897 the Bandera Enterprise printed this item, "Our old friend and fellow townsman, Mr. E. Gibbons is again on the Bandera side of the hills. His family moved back to the old ranch on the Verde. Miss Adah is teaching school on East Verde; Graham has flew into the farm and is linking to it like he had never been elsewhere, while the old gentleman does as he pleases, and peddles chickens and turkeys and other country produce."

W. J. Fields, as Will was called later, and Viola Gibbons Fields are the grandparents of: Alvis Johnson, R. W. Johnson (deceased), John David Fields, Betty Fields Smith, Francine Fields Hardeman, Fred Fields (deceased), Johnny Fields DVM, Herbert (Corky) Fields, Jr. (deceased) and Tryon Fields - also George M. Hopkins, Mary Elizabeth Hopkins Hill, and Wallace Hopkins (deceased) - all born in Denton, TX.

We appreciate her input on the Star Hotel, the people who owned it and their descendants.

The Old Depot is rented on the 21st and 29th, and we would appreciate it if people would respect the renters privacy and not wander the grounds during rentals. You are welcome to wander any other time and sit and enjoy the lights and beauty of our little park. Folks we are always happy to let groups use our grounds for school functions etc., but please call ahead and book them first so there is no conflict with renters. Thank You!

Twelfth Annual Sacred Places Tour

Ten historic places of worship and one historic cemetery will be open to visitors on Saturday, January 27 for Galveston Historical Foundation's annual Sacred Places Tour. The event will begin at 9 a.m. with a talk by Joe Opperman, internationally renowned preservation architect and Galveston native, at St. Joseph's Church, 2202 Avenue K. The tour begins at 10 a.m. and runs through 4:30 p.m.

The popular tour, which in 2005 featured the ecclesiastical works of Galveston architect Nicholas J. Clayton, and in 2006 featured Galveston's historic African American churches, benefits GHF's ongoing restoration of St. Joseph's Church, the oldest wooden church building in Galveston and the oldest German Catholic church in Texas.

Advance tickets for the tour are \$7 (\$6 for GHF members) and may be purchased by phone (409) 762-3933, online at www.galvestonhistory.org or in person at the Heritage Visitors Center, 2328 Broadway. Pre-reserved group rates are \$5 per person for 20 or more tickets. On the day of the tour tickets may be purchased for \$8 at St. Joseph's Church, 2202 Avenue K.

Rentals cover the utility bills but there is never much left over for any large projects on the buildings or grounds.

DIABETES DURING THE HOLIDAYS

Do you ever find yourself dreading the holidays? It's the time of year we usually end up gaining weight and our blood sugar (glucose) levels can get out of control. This year, let's enjoy the holidays and keep control over our glucose levels. Here are a few tips that may help you overcome your dread of holiday foods:

- Make up Your Mind. You have a choice about what you can eat! You are in control, and

you don't need to be pressured by everyone around you. Decide early what you are going to do. Remember, it is possible to follow a lower-carbohydrate meal plan during the holidays. Choose lower-carbohydrate foods you are familiar with, the ones you know keep your glucose levels in control. You'll usually find plenty of holiday-season protein sources in: turkey, ham, seafood and low fat, low sodium deli meats and cheeses.

- Stick with the Old Standards. As for vegetables, many people prepare veggie trays, salads and non starchy vegetables such as greens. Of course, you'll have too many carbohydrate choices to choose from. The key to success is portion control and meal planning with carbohydrate choices that count.

- Don't Arrive Hungry. Restricting your food intake during the holidays can backfire on you. Have a snack before you go to your party, like a yogurt and fruit or a plate of raw vegetables and low fat cheese; something that will stick to your ribs a bit better than walking in to a party

hungry and wanting to eat everything in sight.

- Avoid Mindless Eating. Scoops of nuts, chips and cookies are hard to avoid if you're standing right next to them! Try selecting more single serving foods rather than eating by the handful.

- Don't Drink on an Empty Stomach. Having diabetes means you should think about your alcohol consumption all yearlong. Too much alcohol will disrupt your blood sugar control. It's best to drink alcohol with food; it will slow the effects of the alcohol.

- Burn those Calories. Exercise is critical all year long and can be especially helpful during the holiday season. Exercise is also a great stress reliever and it also helps you burn off those extra calories you might have consumed. Keep decorating your house, park your car further away from the store entrance; just keep moving! Volunteer Some Holiday Cheer

HOUSTON —To give is better than to receive – but volunteering can accomplish both in one fell swoop, says a Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) psychiatry expert.

Volunteering not only helps those in need but also returns the favor by improving the giver's psychological state, according to Dr. James Lomax, professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at BCM in Houston.

"Generally people feel better if they are doing something for others," said Lomax. "They feel that they are more valuable as volunteering tends to give them an increased sense of meaningfulness of life."

The discovery of mirror neurons, brain cells that fire when an individual performs a task as well as when an individual watches another doing the same task, suggests that the human mind is wired to be empathetic with other people.

"There is a kind of resonance that takes place with people's emotions," said Lomax, whose research interests include the relationship between psychiatry, religion and spirituality. "If you do something that others then feel grateful for and respond positively to, it usually creates positive emotions in the person that is giving as well as in the person receiving."

Volunteering may also prevent post-holiday blues. The holiday season can spread joy but also bring disappointment, spurred either by overemphasis on materialism or by family stressors. Volunteering can introduce a different perspective to the season and keep expectations realistic, even for children. "You shouldn't make your children feel badly about being excited about presents, but you should help them find other sources of gratification and pleasure," said Lomax.

Wrapping and delivering gifts or food to less fortunate families, for instance, instills a therapeutic sense of community and generosity, said Lomax, rendering volunteer service a unique gift that gives back.

Rep. Bonilla Loses Texas Run-off Vote

(AP) Former congressman Ciro Rodriguez defeated seven-term Republican Henry Bonilla in a Texas run-off election Tuesday, adding another Democrat to Congress.

With nearly all precincts reporting in the state's largest district, Rodriguez had 54 percent to Bonilla's 45 percent.

Bonilla has called Rodriguez to concede, the incumbent's spokesman Phil Ricks said.

They were the top vote-getters in a special election held Nov. 7, but neither got 50 percent, prompting the runoff.

"I thought it would be, in all honesty, would be a lot closer than it was in the end," Rodriguez said at his campaign party. "I can assure you I'm going to be reaching out and working with everyone. When you get

elected, you represent everyone in the district."

Bonilla was seeking an eighth term in Washington, while Rodriguez was hoping to return after a two-year absence. He served from 1997-2005 in another district but was ousted in the March 2004 Democratic primary by Henry Cuellar, a Laredo Democrat. Rodriguez lost again to Cuellar in this year's primary.

The Supreme Court ruled in June that a 2003 reconfiguration of Bonilla's district was unconstitutional because it diluted minority votes, and a three-judge panel redrew the district in August to restore Hispanics that had been shunted into another district.

Bonilla blamed his loss on the Supreme Court ruling, telling

ing supporters, "We just couldn't score again and again."

"But that's OK. This is a different time now," he said. "I can tell you I've had 14 years as a member of the House of Representatives, and I count my blessings."

The new district stretches from San Antonio south to the Mexican border and almost to El Paso in the west.

Rodriguez, Bonilla and six others ran in a free-for-all special election Nov. 7. The goal of the six Democrats was to keep Bonilla below 50 percent and force him into a runoff. It worked, with Rodriguez in second place.

Dr. William Wilson opens Sonora practice Jan. 2

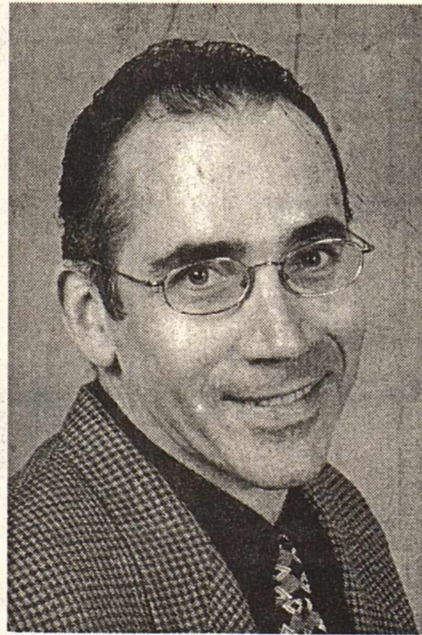
William Wilson, M.D. will open a private practice in the Sonora Medical Clinic on Jan. 2, 2007.

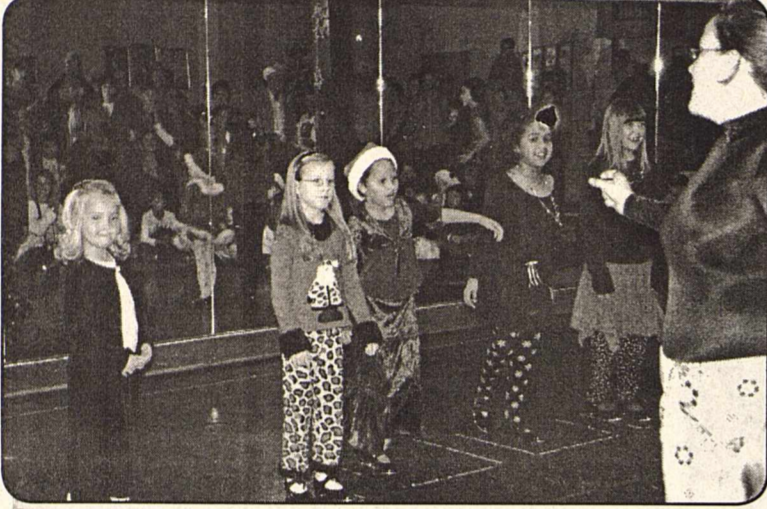
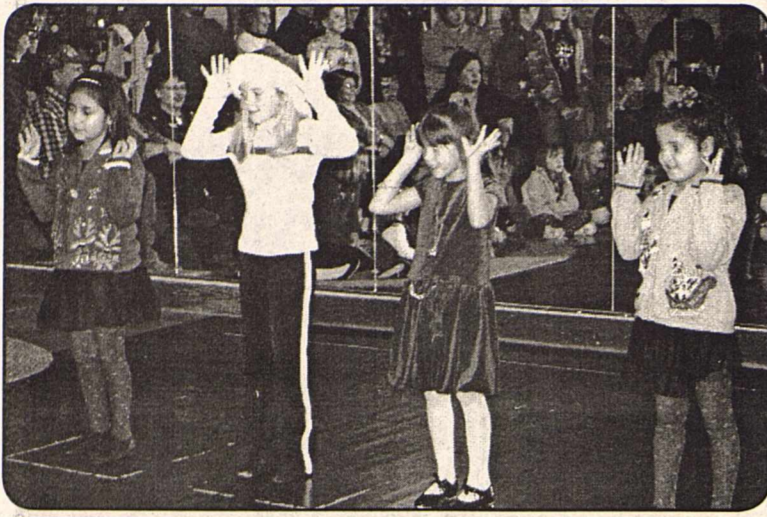

Underwater Tactics: Turning Cold Weather Into Hot Fishing

If it's not snow or freezing rain, it's bone-chilling air temperatures and icy winds that make a day on the water nearly insufferable. But just because you're uncomfortable, it doesn't mean that the bass are. Sure, it's December, it's cold outside and I'm sure you still have some holiday shopping to do, but bass are still in the lake. If they want to make it through the winter they will have to eat.

As the water temperature drops, bass follow the migrating shad out to deeper water (deep being anywhere from 30 to 40 feet in clear, deep lakes or six to eight feet in murky, shallow ones). Use your electronics and find the balls of shad. There's sure to be some bass nearby, holding up in vertical, deep cover. Typically, bass will be easier to find down lake on outside channel swings, bluff faces and points with vertical drops.

Since bass are cold blooded, the colder water has slowed them down - so you should slow down, too. This ties in directly to your bait selection, the most important aspect to catching bass in the cold. Just because the bass are following migrating shad that doesn't mean that's all they will eat. Fish biologists have discovered that a bass prefers a bait about three inches long and about an inch in diameter. That jig that you spent all summer pitching into the bushes will do just fine. But instead of relying on the oldest known fishing lure by itself, I

like to dress mine up with the newest technological advancement in fishing bait.

On a 3/8-ounce jig, I trim the skirt just past the hook to keep it from having too large a profile since I want to put a large trailer on it. I rig a Berkley Gulp! Bat Wing Frog as the trailer. These two baits are meant to be fished slow - the perfect presentation for a cold-blooded bass in wintertime. I cut the front of the bait off just behind the eye and thread it onto the jig hook. The legs on the Bat Wing Frog flutter like crazy on the fall and with the slightest movements.

The Gulp! trailer isn't made of plastic so it actually breathes underwater and disperses scent like no other bait ever made. And the slower you fish it, the more scent builds up in an area, expanding the strike zone by drawing in sluggish fish in search of an easy meal that might have not been interested otherwise.

There's no secret to catching bass in the middle of winter. Just like any other time of year, you have to figure out the right pattern. And once you figure out where they are, slow down your presentation. The fishing can be good enough to make you forget all about the plummeting temperatures.

Securing a Better Future: Pre-K Paves the Way

In the past few decades Texas has shifted from a primarily industrial economy to one focused more on knowledge and technology. As a result, the workforce demands more highly skilled and educated workers. Unfortunately, Texas has experienced a decline in the number of skilled workers as well as those enrolling in higher education.

The need for change is urgent. On its current path, Texas will see its economy shift from a diverse and strong economy to one leading to increased poverty rates, decreased household incomes, losses in tax revenue, and increases in the demand for health, criminal, and social services.

In addition, the educational gap continues to grow. Ethnic minority groups continue to graduate from high school and college at lower rates. We must do everything we can to ensure all children have the skills necessary to graduate and go on to college. If not, we will have a less educated workforce and a weaker economy in the future.

An upgrade in the Texas education system is one solution to the labor quality problems facing Texas, and high quality pre-k programs such as child care, Head Start, and public pre-kindergarten are one of the

most cost-effective educational investments we can make as a state.

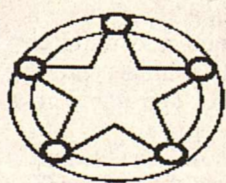
A recent study conducted by the Bush School of Government and Public Policy at Texas A&M University concluded that, even under very conservative assumptions, the benefits of voluntary, universally accessible, high-quality pre-kindergarten in Texas greatly outweighs the cost, and for every \$1 invested, at least \$3.50 is returned to Texas communities.

For the past four years, Texas has been at the forefront of developing a high quality pre-k model for the children and families of Texas. The State Center for Early Childhood Development has implemented the Texas Early Education Model (TEEM) in dozens of communities and thousands of classrooms across the state. Child Care, Head Start, and pre-kindergarten programs work together in an unprecedented collaborative manner in order to improve the school readiness of children. This proven model is expected to once again be expanded this upcoming legislative session in order for more communities to benefit from the model.

Of Texas Christmas Past

There once was a golden era in Texas in which the celebration of Christmas did not focus on costly gifts, or trendy items on sale in shopping malls across the state. It was a time when news coverage of the Christmas season didn't consist of stories about credit card debt, or hunting down the perfect gift for that special someone.

Christmas in Texas in the 1800s was not an easy time by any means, and some Texans had more resources than others. Yet despite the challenges of frontier living, the pioneering men, women and children of that day left behind a proud legacy of hearty spirit and resourcefulness.

In "The Book of Texas Days," Ron Stone writes: "life was never easy in frontier Texas, so Christmas was a great celebration." It was customary for frontier families to decorate their Christmas trees with traditional homemade fare. Near the coast, shells were painted red and green, then hung on trees. One historian noted that Christmas trees were plentiful — everywhere but in West Texas.

In an incredible compilation of stories about Christmas in 19th century Texas, famed Texas author Walter Prescott Webb compiled a list of anecdotes for his 1941 article, "Christmas and New Year in Texas," for the Southwestern Historical Quarterly.

In those days, many gifts were handmade, reflecting the economic conditions of the givers. His stories include a scene from a German orphanage near New Braunfels in 1849: "For eight weeks the girls had all sewed

on the clothes for the boys, and knitted socks, and still they had to work up to the last night."

Nearly two decades later, the price of cotton was high, and gifts reflected the resulting prosperity. In 1868, boys on a Bosque farm received brass-toed, red-topped boots and the first wool hats they'd ever seen, according to Dr. John Frazier, a Fort Worth physician who had been one of those lucky Bosque farm boys.

Webb's stories depict the Christmas spirit of the time — painting a picture of New Year's Eve-style revelry, complete with firecracker displays. And Charles F. Taylor, a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence, describes a raucous 1839 Christmas Eve in Nacogdoches this way:

"... tomorrow's Christmas ... Fiddles groan under a heavy weight of oppression, and heeltaps suffer to the tune of 'We Won't Go Home 'Till Morning,' and now and then the discharge of firearms at a distance ..."

Of course, the Christmas feast often reflected the economic and geographic conditions these early Texans faced.

Especially in early days, conditions could be fairly primitive. Christmas dinner in 1828 on the Gulf Coast for Mr. D. W. C. Baker consisted of "some hominy, beat in a wooden mortar, and the fresh milk."

But 50 years later, a very different table was set for Captain Jack Elgin, who celebrated Christmas with a surveying party in West Texas. He recalled:

"No prince, potentate, or magnate ever sat down to such a feast. I think we had fourteen varieties of meat. ... We had buffalo, antelope, deer, bear, rab-

bit, prairie dog, possum, and possibly other animals that I do not recall; turkey, goose, brant, ducks, prairie-chicken, curlew, quail, and other birds."

In a lovely recollection of the holiday spirit in 1841, newspaper editor Charles De Morse wrote in "The Standard" of Clarksville about Christmas in Austin when Texas was an independent Republic:

"The day welcome to all, is close at hand, and we are all ready for it ... bright wide-awake Texas, whose people are always ready for whatever may come.

"The toy shops will be gay with bright lights and contrivances for extracting dimes, quarters and half dollars of the children ..."

"... and tomorrow, the era which the Saviour came to bring about, 'Good will to man and womankind,' will come to us with pleasant temperature, freedom from business cares, and a general appreciation that it is a day for relaxation, for smiling countenances, and hearty greetings."

In that same spirit, may our holiday in Texas this year include warm remembrance of Christmases past.

TCEQ Encourages Consumers to Recycle Used Electronics this Holiday Season

An estimated 1.3 million computers could be recycled annually.

Every holiday season, millions of Texans receive new home electronics. But as quickly as the latest television, computer, digital camera, cellular phone, video game console, or mp3 player is unwrapped, the older model is quickly discarded—usually in a closet or an attic.

"In this season of giving, we want to encourage consumers to donate their used electronic items, instead of throwing them away," said Matt Baker, division director of the Small Business and Environmental Assistance division at the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ). "Often these products are still in perfectly good working condition, and can be recycled for reuse, or disassembled and sold for parts."

Based on a study by the National Recycling Coalition, about 1.5 million computers are taken out of service in Texas annually, and only an estimated 162,000 are recycled, leaving more than 1.3 million units that aren't recycled. "Even if your

computer is several years old, it is still valuable," said Baker. "An average personal computer typically contains 40 percent steel, 30 to 40 percent plastic, 10 percent aluminum and 10 percent other metals, including copper, gold, silver, cadmium, and platinum—all recyclable," said Baker.

To find a recycler near you, the TCEQ has published an updated version of its statewide computer and electronics recycler locator guide, located in the "Hot Topics" column of the TCEQ home page, <http://www.tceq.state.tx.us/>.

In addition, take-back programs are also being offered by some makers of computers and mp3 players, to promote recycling. Contact your manufacturer for details. Local charitable associations and nonprofit organizations are also in need of "almost new," working electronics including computers, televisions, video game consoles and digital cameras. Often these groups have a year-round necessity, and can find a new home for your used electronics.

Faulty Doctor Rating System to be Suspended

In response to complaints from the nation's largest state medical association, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Texas has agreed to suspend its controversial new physician rating system.

"We are pleased that Blue Cross listened to physicians' deep concerns about this program and are confident we can convince the company to replace it with a system that ensures patients and businesses have access to accurate and useful information to help them make appropriate health care decisions," said TMA President Ladon W. Homer, MD.

"Transparency" is the latest buzzword in health care. But in

our profession, firmly dedicated to the patient-physician relationship, transparency has been the standard for centuries. The health plans have the most information to hide — which physicians are and are not in their networks, what their plans actually cover, and where their premium dollars actually go." A recent statewide poll of 1,005 Texans conducted by TMA found that 72 percent of Texans feel our health care system puts insurance profits ahead of patient care. "Our state legislature needs to pass reforms to stop health insurance abuse and gimmicks that are sacrificing our state's public health for corporate insurance company profits," Dr. Homer said.

AUSTIN - The public relations war over a proposal to build 19 new coal-fired plants is getting hotter with the next state legislative session around the corner.

The Texas Association of Business stumped at the Capitol Dec. 15 in favor of the plants and a mix of other power-generation options, such as more nuclear power capacity and less reliance on natural gas. Energy needs for residential customers, businesses and government are growing faster than power can be generated by the current grid of power plants, said Bill Hammond, executive director of the Texas Association of Business.

Hammond mentioned Texas could face rolling blackouts in the next few years if power needs aren't addressed. Other groups, such as Public Citizen Texas, are emphasizing the degrading effects on public health and the environment if the state grants coal plant permits that don't require the cleaner, coal gasification process that results in minimal emissions.

Judge orders speaker to reply

An Austin state district judge ordered House Speaker Tom Craddick to provide the court with information that may show whether one of his office calendars contains what is "public information" under the law. Plaintiff Cris Feldman of Austin is suing for access to Craddick's 2003 political calendar and the first half of his 2004 political calendar.

The inclusive dates cover the period during which Republicans battled with Democrats over redistricting.

State District Judge Margaret Cooper set a deadline of Jan. 12 for Craddick to comply with her order.

Lawmaker files cleanup

bills State Rep. William "Bill" Callegari, R-Houston, has filed legislation to do away with language in state law that created three state agencies. Those agencies no longer have a function, he said. H.B. 386 would repeal the portion of the Water Code that created Texas Deepwater Port Authority; H.B. 387 similarly wipes off the Texas National Research Laboratory Commission, which had to do with landing the long-defunct superconducting super collider project; and H.B. 388 would repeal the enabling legislation that launched the Ogallala Water Import Authority. Callegari also filed a fourth piece of legislation, H.B. 385, repealing a 1935 law that authorized the Commission of Control for the Texas Centennial Celebrations to condemn property for the use of the state. Strayhorn unloads re: foster care

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn's term of office ends in January, but she's still at work. On Dec. 14, Strayhorn released "Texas Health Care Claims Study: A Special Report on Foster Children," which she said raises red flags concerning the state's foster care system. Among the many red flags, Strayhorn said, are Medicaid claims from 2004 and 2005 that show foster children are being prescribed powerful, mind-altering psychotropic drugs at an alarming rate. She pointed out that Texas spent \$39 million on 436,480 prescriptions for nearly 24,000 foster children in fiscal 2004. "Given the distressing findings contained in this report, I hope the state will not delay in adopting recommendations, which have been crafted to help mend this broken system," Strayhorn said in a news release.






