According to the Channing Sun, Hartley county farmers are going quite entensively into the dairy business. During the past two weeks six car loads of dairy cows have been shipped into the county and purchased by the farmers.

Three car loads of these were shipped in by E. S. Collins, pres-ident of the First National Bank of Channing, and the other three loads were shipped in by indi-viduals and groups of farmers of the county.

There were approximately 180 cows in the six car loads and the farmers who are in the dairy business there, estimate that each cow will average a revenue of \$10 per month, and according to this estimate these cows will bring \$1,800 into the county
