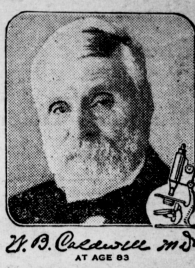

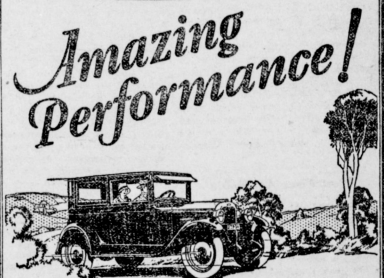

500 Cars Grapes Pass Through Clovis Each Day

The shipment of grapes from California to eastern points is now on. An average of five train loads are passing through Clovis daily. These trains are made up from 90 to 100 cars. Practically all the refrigerator cars are reiced at the Railways Ice Co. here. Manager Baird stating today that in the neighborhood of 300 tons of ice are being put into the cars each day. This is considerably more than the daily output of the plant, however, the excess output over the production is taken care of from the enormous storage which the company is prepared to take care of at its plant in Clovis. The ice is put in storage during the months when business on the Santa Fe is not so heavy.

The grape shipment business from California has grown into an enormous industry. During 1925 the Santa Fe handled 27,010 cars through Clovis; in 1926, 21,000 cars were hauled through here, and this season railroad men say that the business will equal or possibly exceed that of last year.

That's just what we have been telling you all the time. If California can produce grapes, cantaloupes and all kinds of fruit

and vegetables and ship them across the United States to market and make good money on their \$3,000 per acre land, what's the matter we can't make a living on the same kind of crops, with our land priced as low as \$75 per acre (irrigated land)? We can grow the grapes right here in Muleshoe territory. Why not do it?

In view of the fact that the monthly output has consistently exceeded the production schedule—the August volume being nearly 2,000 units over schedule—Chevrolet officials were satisfied that this year's output would approach on million cars.
