## Fall Hunting Season Opens in Texas and N. M.

Hunting season on bears opened last Monday in the state of New Mexico, but on account of the excessive high license charged non-residents it is not probable many citizens of Texas will indulge in that sport across the border line. The bear season in Texas, for both the north and south zones, will open November 16th, closing December 31. This is also the season for hunting deer. The limit on bears is one, and on deer is two bucks, female killing prohibited.

Hunting deer with dogs is positively forbidden, as is also the use of any kind of call, other than the rattling of deer horns. It is also unlawful to hunt or shoot any kind of protected game between one-half hour after sunset and one-half hour before sunrise. Trapping game birds is unlawful, as is also hunting with light after dark.

Deer hunting in New Mexico is permissible for only 10 days, November 10 to 20.

During the months of October, November and December squirrels may be killed with the exception of certain counties as provided by law. Ten squirrels in any one day is the limit.

The wild turkey season is from November 16 to December 31, during which time three birds are the limit.

The hunting season for wild ducks of all kinds (except wild wood ducks), wild geese, wild brant, wild coot or mud hen and wild snipe opens October 16 and runs until January 31, inclusive, in the north zone, in the south zone the season opens November 1. The limit of wild geese and brant of all kinds is four in any one day and not more than 12 in any one week of seven days. The limit of wild ducks of all kinds is 25 in any one day and not more than 50 in any one week of seven days.

November 1 to December 31 is the open season on quail in New Mexico, in Texas the quail season is from December 1 to January 1.

## Date of Hassel's Execution to be Set in January

George J. Hassel, murderer of his wife and eight stepchildren at Farwell last December, must die, the court of criminal appeals said Wednesday when they denied his attorney's motion for a rehearing in the case.

As the case now stands Hassel will be sentenced at the January term of district court at Farwell and the date of his electrocution set. Those paying the death penalty for crime in Texas are electrocuted at the state penitentiary.

It is understood that the only other course open to Hassel to escape the death penalty would be an insanity plea. W. H. Russell, attorney for Hassel, has informed Farwell people that he will make no further effort in the defense of Hassel, and that if an insanity plea is made it will come from some of the condemned man's relatives.

## Gupton and Stidham Start Feeding Calves

C. D. Gupton and M. S. Stidham received 100 head of full blood Hereford heifer calves from the Steel ranch Monday. They were placed in the feed lots at the Stidham acreage northwest of town Monday night and the feeding program was started. They expect to feed them on corn, maize, kafir and cotton seed meal. They have a fine bunch of about 200 head of shoats to run with the calves.

We are glad to see so much interest being taken in the cattle feeding business here. This is a great place to produce grain and hay, and the cattle are not hard to get hold of, as there are several good ranches in easy reach. Cattle and hogs are bringing good prices.

## Smallpox Rings Up Another Record

Smallpox rings up another high record this year in Texas according to Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, who calls attention to the fact that for the period from Jan. 1st to June 30th, there were 2,059 cases of this disease reported to the state department of health, this being 161 cases more than number reported for the entire year 1926.

"As outbreaks of smallpox occur only in unvaccinated communities," Dr. Anderson stated, "the responsibility for such outbreaks should rest squarely upon the shoulders of these communities. It is a known fact that the only cases of smallpox reported in communities having a consistent vaccination program, are isolated cases of unvaccinated individuals. Everyone knows that vaccination is a prevention of smallpox, and this fact is not even a debatable question at the present time, owing to the preponderance of evidence showing its truth."

"The only people who are opposing vaccination against smallpox at the present time, are those who are ignorant and un-informed on the subject, and those who are doing it through viciousness. While it is true that during the Civil War and early in the use of this immunization, some fatalities resulted from faulty methods of manufacturing vaccine and its administration, eliminates the former dangers of infection."

"Vaccination against smallpox is compulsory in Germany, beginning at birth, and seven-year periods thereafter. The records show that Germany has had only 40 cases of smallpox during the last ten years. During the last 15 years, there have been more than 700,000 cases of this disease reported in the United States. Any person with common reasoning power should be able to see that vaccination prevents."

## "What I Expected" Says Hassel When Appeal Was Denied

The same nonchalance that with the exception of a few brief intervals has characterized the incarceration of George J. Hassel in the Hale county jail was displayed Wednesday when he was notified that the court of criminal appeals had denied his motion for rehearing of its action in affirming the death sentence. "That's just what I expected," was his comment of the decision.

Hassel was convicted of murdering his wife and nine stepchildren on a farm near Farwell. Denying the rehearing, the court held that the trial was unprejudiced and that Hassel was not proved insane.

This morning when interviewed by a Herald representative, Hassel repeated his statement that he expected the decision rendered by the court of criminal appeals. He was busy making rugs, an occupation that he has found useful to while away the weary hours, and seemed not the least perturbed by his impending doom.

A certain grim humor characterized his few brief statements. "I am ready," he said. "In fact I would go by myself if the state would buy my ticket. I am better off than you fellows are, for at least I know when and where my time is coming, and that is more than you can say." With that he went on with his rug weaving.

Sheriff Sam Faith, under whose charge Hassel has been kept for the past several months, stated that he expects papers which are necessary to send Hassel back to Farwell for sentence to be here in about fifteen days. At Farwell he will be sentenced and taken to Huntsville. The execution will probably take place in about 30 days after his sentence is passed. It will fall on Friday near midnight. —Plainview Herald.

WHILE the Santa Fe is itself a large employer of labor—its payroll in 1926 totalled \$107,000,000, and its employes number more than 75,000—indirectly as a buyer of materials and supplies it helps to furnish employment to many more. Such purchases last year exceeded \$64,000,000. In addition it bought over \$12,000,000 of new cars and locomotives.

Its largest class of material was fuel, which totalled \$24,360,000. This consisted of about 2,267,000 tons of coal, and 507,800,000 gallons of fuel oil. The use of coal or oil on any division is determined primarily by which is the cheaper fuel in that locality.

The second largest class of purchases was iron and steel products, for which the expenditure was approximately \$19,750,000. This included an expenditure of \$9,500,000 for 152,700 tons of rail, frogs, switches, and fastenings. \$1,500,000 went for wheels, axles, and tires, and \$306,000 for flues and tubes for locomotives. Bridges, turntables, structural steel, forgings, and fabricated, unfabricated, and pressed steel took nearly \$3,000,000. Steel and iron are basic necessities in railroading.

Purchases of forest products totalled \$6,412,000, which included over 3,000,000 cross ties, and large quantities of lumber and timbers. The Santa Fe cresotses its ties and much of its timbers, otherwise greater quantities would be needed each year.

Folders, report blanks, notices, tickets, tariffs, and various items in the stationery line required \$1,225,000, electrical materials \$660,000, lubricating oil and grease, illuminating oils, waste, etc., \$1,180,000, and air brake material \$617,600.

These purchases were necessary to maintain the railroad properly and to give satisfactory service to the public. They were covered by 130,000 invoices and were made from 3,347 individuals and firms. Note the wide spread of this buying.

Thus the Santa Fe and all railroads are an important factor in maintaining the prosperity of our country through the employment arising from these large purchases of supplies, as well as the millions directly disbursed among their own employes for services.

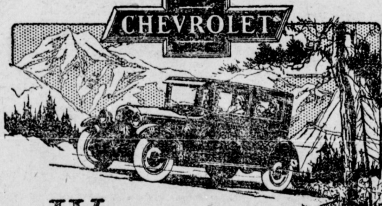

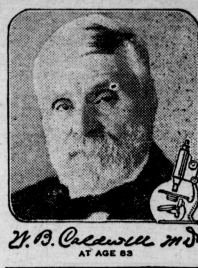
