There are four ways of start ing a good farm poultry flock, D. Hsbandry department, A \& M. College, pointed out in a recent farm flock.
"First,"
"First," he said, "by buying the flock; second, by buying a few good breeders and raising the flock; third, by buying hatchng eggs or baby chicks; fourth "The best way, in pullets. The best way, in my way of ing eggs or better still baby ing eggs or better still baby
chicks and start off with an entirely new flock. The old hens or scrub poultry that may be
running around about the farm place should be sold early in May and the pouitry house thoroughy cleaned from diseases and parasites. Leave it open and
vacant for a couple of months while brooding the baby chicks, then disinfect it and it should be found virtually free of poul-
try diseases and parasites. The ground outside the building should be broken up if possible and a good crop of green stuff
allowed to grow in order to kill the parasites that may be on the surface of ground."

Poultry Possibilities.
Poultry ranks high among the products of the United States, and is gaining every year. poultry produced on every farm pouitry produced on every farm
keeping poultry in California was over $\$ 600$ per farm. If California can profit by raising poultry and buy eommercial feeds shipped from the East, can't the farmers of Bailey county do equally as well if not better with the mass production of feeds we have?
It don't cost much to get a start of poultry. You can buy baby chix at from $\$ 10$ to $\$ 15$ per hundred, depending on the time of season, or if you have a flock of good hens you can have your eggs hatched for $\$ 3.50$ per $100-$ eggs, and with proper care taken of eggs and fertility of eggs you can depend on from 60 to 90 per cent hatches. The male
birds can be sold as early broilbirds can be sold as early broilers at a good price, enough to pay for the cost and raising of the pullets to maturity. Or the males may be caponized at broil
ers andfat maturity from 7 to 12 months old will weigh from 6 to 14 pounds. according to breed bring 30 to 45 cents per pounc on foot. You can see if you don't intend to sell as broilers or fryers it pays to caponize. Capons develop faster and takes less feed to mature. In other words you can take what would ordinarily make a $25 \mathrm{c}, 50 \mathrm{c}$ roaster and make a $\$ 2.50$ to $\$ 5.00 \mathrm{ca}-$ pon. The operation is very simple
