Know Texas

Texas has 200 miles of high tension electric transmission lines, an increase of about 2,250 since 1925.

Since 1925, towns an counties of Texas to the number of 297 have been added to the list having electric power and light.

With the opening of 1923 approximately 2,000 of the people and of about 52 per cent of the total population of the state had electric power and light available.

The state now has about 61,500 telephones, of which 42,850 are Bell telephones and 18,650 are independent and independent company telephones.

The total telephone mileage in the state is 440,276 miles, including both local and long distance.

There were 84,104 hunting licenses issued in Texas in 1927.

Hassel Writes Editor Of Tribune Before Death

Just before his death in a letter editorialist Hassel wrote Editor Graham a letter for the benefit of correcting newspaper reports. Hassel was sentenced to die for the murder of one person some time ago. The letter is taken from the State Line Tribune of February 16.

Mr. W. H. Graham, State Line Tribune, Farwell, Texas.

Dear Sir:

Your letter of the 23rd at hand and thanks to you for the favor of publishing an article in your paper for the benefit of correcting some newspaper reports. If you will be so kind to let me know how you feel about it and to trust them around to fit your way of thinking.

Yes, I have something to say that I would like the world to know. First of all I am not mad, but in my heart toward none and can say that the crime was not premeditated murder. Murder is murder, whether in the street in bed or in the electric chair in God's sight. But I forgive everyone and feel that God has forgiven me and He will forgive the men that saved my life if they will ask Him in earnest. I have prayed often for them. Would to God they would read and study some scriptures that I am going to give here: St. Matthew, 6th, 6th, and 7th chapters; St. John, 14th and 15th chapters, and I Cor., 15th chapter. Please read this as I write it.

Well I have made a clean confession to both God and man. While I did not read it exactly as I gave it to him, but God has forgiven me. This time spent behind the bars has been the happiest of my life. God has been my companion.

Second of all, I will say that I signed my statement without reading it and I was very much disappointed to know I loved my wife and children and have had great respect for women as anyone. I had a good religious mother and my sisters that are good religious women. I can't understand what happened and will say that the Lord knows my heart and knows that I am not guilty of the relations with the younger girl.

But God knows all things and He knows the pulpit one. They can't hide it from Him. They will have to get forgiveness for that for themselves. I can't do that for them. May the Lord have mercy on all.

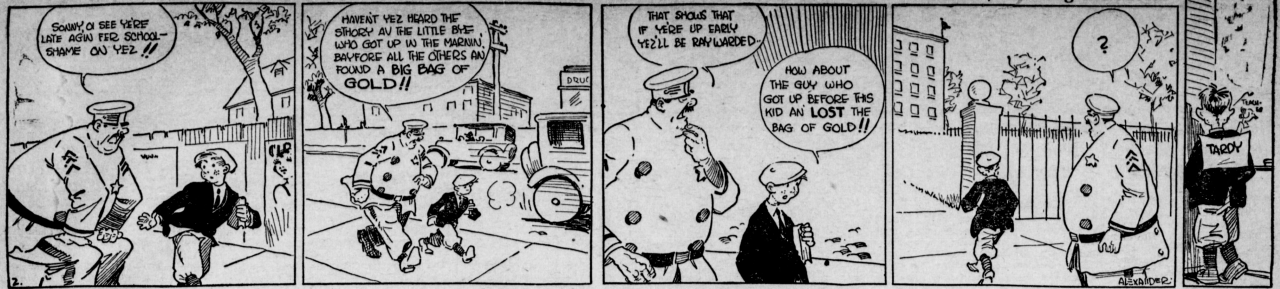

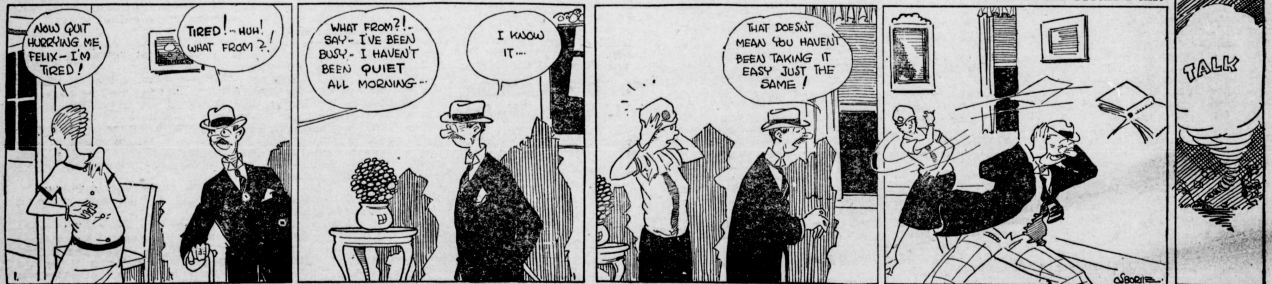

PROFITABLE TO TULIA MAN

Poultry and dairy cows are the most profitable property that one can get especially after he learns how to make a profit from them, says Bert Cole, Styisher county farmer who lives east of Tulia. In January 1927, Mr. Cole had 7 or 8 cows and from 700 to 800 hens. During that month he sold \$103.80 worth of eggs, hens and roosters, \$23.24; cream, \$61.87, making a total of \$193.91 for the month. With the same amount of poultry and cows he has increased his profits according to the following figures: Eggs \$221.61; roosters \$14.00; cream \$69.17, making a total earning of \$304.78 for January, 1928. Mr. Cole says that by learning how to equip the place and keep the hens and cows in good condition so as to produce more, he has increased his earnings \$110.87 with practically the same amount of cows and hens and probably less work. Cole believes that he can increase his earnings still more. Tulia Herald.

Looks Good to Visitors

Every part of Texas looks prosperous. Whether visitors enter the state at Texarkana and travel across it to El Paso, whether they come in at Texline and go out at Brownsville, wherever they go, there is an inviting look of prosperity and every indication of a thrifty and contented people.

One visitor from the north recently said to me: "Your state looks mighty good to me from circumstances in all directions to the center, but I can't understand why there is so much land uncultivated." I had to try to explain to him that Texas is just so big that it is almost impossible to fill it up, that it is easy to crowd a state like Indiana or Ohio with people, but not so with Texas.

Wood County Wants Two

Most Texas Counties would be satisfied to get one cotton mill built this year, but a group of bankers, merchants and businessmen in Wood County, recently an decided to start a movement to secure two textile mills for Wood County. A committee was appointed to select five directors to push the plan for securing the mills.

Making Clyde Grow

The Clyde Enterprise explains why that town is growing and the people there are all so contented. Here is the reason. There are ten times as many hogs and five times as many chickens in the country around the town as there was three years ago. "Yes, and there is not more than one-fifth of the money sent out of the country to buy things we ought to raise." Next year the Enterprise will likely be able to tell about the increased number of cows.

Floydada Wants College

Gunter College, after twenty-five years in Grayson county will be moved "out west" where colleges are not so crowded and there is more room for expansion. Floydada is making a strong bid for the school, which it would locate on two sections of land, of which 30 acres would be used for the campus, 200 acres for farm demonstrations and experimental work and 1,900 acres would be cut into 10 acre tracts, from which it is expected that revenue would come to care for the needs of the school.

Build Community House

The civic clubs of Pharr will unite to build a community house for all the clubs of the town and the use of any other organizations that may need a hall for their meetings. Such a building increases the "get-together" spirit of the town and the practical action it can be constructed with little difficulty.

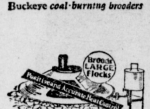

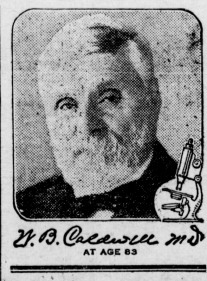

OTHER MIGHTY WORKS OF JESUS

LESSON TEXT—Mark 5:21-24; 25-43.
GOLDEN TEXT—Thy faith hath made thee whole.
PRIMARY TOPIC—Jesus the Great Healer.
JUNIOR TOPIC—The Hermitism of Jesus.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Jesus the Giver and Preserver of Life.
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Works of Faith.

The accounts of the raising of the damsel and the healing of the woman are so interwoven as almost to constitute one narrative. But since the persons are diverse and places separate, they should be treated separately.

Jairus' Daughter Raised from the Dead (vv. 22-24 and 35-42).
1. Jairus' urgent mission (v. 22-23). His only daughter (Luke 8:42), was his only child, lay dying. In this time of utter helplessness he came to Jesus for he had faith in His ability to raise her up. In the providence of God, sorrow, sickness and death are often used to bring needy men and women into contact with Jesus. He showed the proper attitude toward Jesus, "he fell at his feet" (v. 22).
2. Jesus goes with Jairus (v. 24). Jairus believed that if Jesus would lay His hand upon his daughter she would live. Such faith always gets a response from Jesus.
3. News of his daughter's death (v. 35).
The messenger who brought the news of her death suggested that Jesus should be excused from going further, as it was now too late.
4. Jairus' faith strengthened (v. 36).
As soon as Jesus heard the words spoken concerning the death of his girl, he said to the father, "Be not afraid, only believe."
5. The mourners rebuked (v. 37-39).
He now dismissed the crowd and allowed only three of His disciples and the parents of the damsel to enter this chamber of death with Him.
6. Jairus' faith rewarded (v. 41-43).
He took the damsel by the hand and issued the command for her to arise. The expression "Talitha cumi" in the Aramaic seems to be freely expressed, "Wake up, little girl." She straightway arose and walked and partook of food.

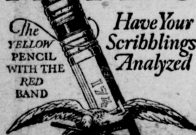

INDUSTRY HELPS AGRICULTURE
BUILD UP THE SMALL TOWN

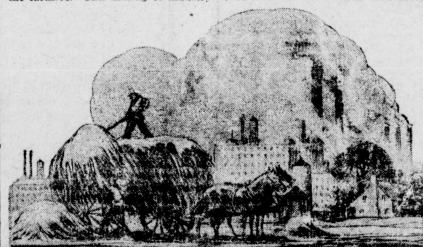
Decentralization of Manufacturing Brings Markets for Products Closer to the Farm—Gives Employment and Better Standards of Living to Rural Communities.

By T. R. PRESTON
President, American Bankers Association

NO class of people has been more diligent in trying to understand the agricultural problem than the bankers of this country. The agricultural problem is a real problem and demands the best thought of everyone. This country cannot continue along happy lines with only sections of the country prosperous. Prosperity must be passed around if anybody is long to enjoy it. This question cannot be solved by the farmers alone, but the majority opinion is that there is no legislative remedy for agriculture. It is an economic question pure and simple and must be worked out accordingly.

A few years ago it was contended that agriculture did not have sufficient credit facilities. That proposition was often made a political question. I do not presume there are many who will question the fact that agriculture now has ample credit facilities.

Mixing Farms and Factories
It is a fact that no community and no state has ever become great purely from agriculture. It is not to the interest of New York and other great centers to see the small communities and the agricultural sections losing their wealth and importance. In the end it will react upon them to their disadvantage. There seems to me a real remedy for these small communities and also for agriculture. This remedy, which is the mixing of industry with agriculture, is now being applied in many localities with satisfactory results. Industry and agriculture are better balanced in Ohio, North Carolina and Pennsylvania than in any other states of the Union, and in these states there is no serious agricultural problem and we hear little complaint from the farmers. This mixing of industry

and agriculture is called by some decentralization of industry. I would not suggest that manufacturing institutions move from the cities to the small villages, but I do think it would be better for this country for future industries to be placed in these small villages rather than to be further congested in the great centers. This would in part also be a solution of our labor problem. The bringing of industry to small villages increases the market for agricultural products, gives employment to surplus labor, vicariously the standard of living, increases public revenue, reduces taxes and vastly increases educational facilities.

Two Striking Examples
I believe I can give you two striking examples from my own state to prove this proposition, and I mention these because I am more familiar with conditions there than elsewhere. Twelve years ago Kingsport, Tennessee, had a population of about one thousand. Great industries like a large camera company, a big cement plant and a number of other industries were located there partly through the influence of an outstanding New York business man. In a little more

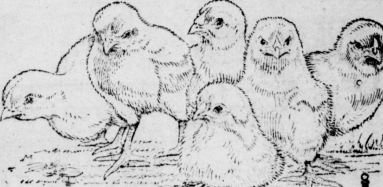
