



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a, which shall read as follows:

tion 11a. In addition to the bonds "Section 11a. In addition to the bonds we enumerated in Section 11 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of exas, the Permanent University Fund may e invested in such other securities, including bonds, preferred stocks and common stocks, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may deem to be proper investment for said fund; provided, however, that not more than fifty per cent (50%) of the said fund shall be invested at any given time in stocks, nor shall more than one per cent (1%) of the said fund nvested in securities issued by any one corporation, nor shall more than five cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States h have paid dividends for ten (10) contive years or longer immediately prior the date of purchase and which, except bank stocks and insurance stocks, are ted upon an exchange registered with e Securities and Exchange Commission its successors. This amendment shall be

> New Asphalt Machine Halves Highway Costs

A machine which rips up de eriorated asphalt pavements and uses the old material to lay down a new, pavement simultaneously has been developed by the joint efforts of an oil company and an allied firm. The mechanical monster permits roads to be rebuilt speedily and is expected to save up to 50 per cent in highway repair costs. The broken-up pavement which formerly was hauled away and discarded, is pulverized and mixed with a special asphalt softener developed by the oil company. The south zone opener will be November 15: The season in that zone will close December 21, with the season three days shorter than the north zone because south zone hunters in twelve counties will have a special threeday whitewing dove season, Sep-

tember 14, 16 and 18. The Executive Secretary said field reports indicate sufficient birds to provide a good harvest without endangering the brood stood stock, under the curtailed regulationh.

"Texas_still will have a pretty, generous dove hunting season," he said. "I am confident Texas sportsmen will understand that the game that is not killed this fall will survive to assure their favorite sport in future seasons." The daily limit for mourning doves is 10. The possession limit is also 10.

Hunters bagging whitewings during the special season must! count their mourning doves in their bag. Thus, if they shoot three mourning doves they may take only seven whitewings.

GOOD HEALTH L WHY IS CANCER TREATMENT

Answer to Question No. 1:

1. The Sloan-Kettering Institute points out that, since cancer is like a terrible weed, the destruction of the disorderly growth of cancer cells follows gardening methods: pulling out the weeds (surgery); burning out the weeds (irradiation); altering the soil (changing body fluids by giving steroid hormones); killing the weed in the soil (giving treatment to kill cancer cells, yet leaving normal cells unharmed); exploding weeds with chemicals (use of chemicals which explode cancer cells). Every gardener knows weeds are easiest to destroy when they first appear. The same is true of cancer.

Answer to Question No. 2:

2. It used to be that pneumonia can be discasse of pneumonia can be discassed from the hospital in five days. Although hospital costs have risen, because modern hospitals, adapted to high standards of medical eare, are expensive to operate, this reduction in the length of hospital stay has actually lessened the expense of illness.

Answer to Question No. 3:

3. Authorities say 40 per cent of all days lost from work are due to colds. Assuming a 57 a day loss in earnings or productive capacity, colds cost \$420,-000,000 a year on this basis alone. In. addition, they often lead to more expensive and more serious illnesses.

His comment followed announcement by the Federal Fish & Wildlife Service that the Texas mourning dove season would be reduced from 45 to 40 days for most of the state, with the daily shooting period cut from sunup to sundown, to noon to sundown. The Fish & Wildlife Service,

which makes the final decision on all migratory birds, followed the season opening dates for mourning doves as recommended by the Game Commission, pursuant to a popular poll of Texas sports-

The opening in the north zone which comprises about threefourths of Texas, will be September 1, as usual, and will end October 10. The south zone opener will be November 15. The season in that zone will close December 21, with the season three days shorter than the north zone because south zone hunters in twelve counties will have a special threeday whitewing dove season, September 14, 16 and 18.


The Executive Secretary said field reports indicate sufficient birds to provide a good harvest vithout endangering the brood stood stock, under the curtailed egulationh.

Texas\_still will have a pretty generous dove hunting season," he said.
