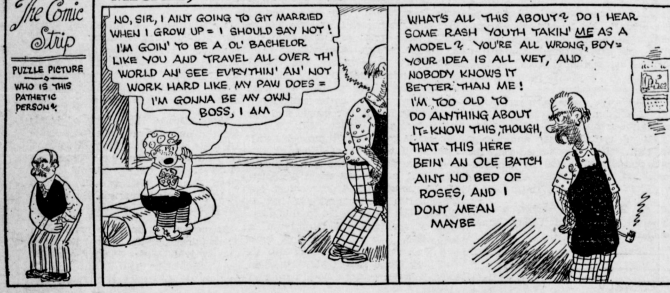

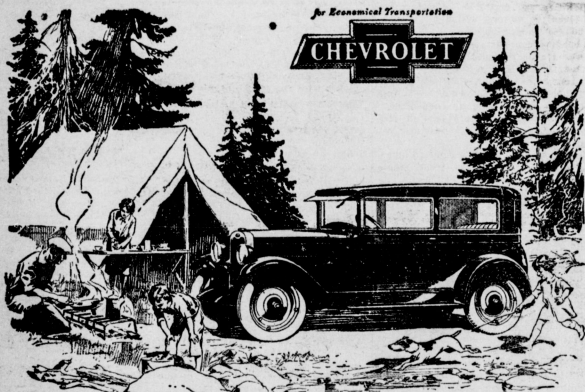

Brown county may be a little bit slow about public activities, but it has at last become tired of being cut off from the rest of the world during the rainy seasons and has voted a bond issue of sufficient size, with the Federal and State aid that will be received, to build a complete system of State highways and many miles of lateral feeders. The vote was 3 to 1 for the bonds.

Texas has the first unattended dial system telephone exchange in the Southwest. It is located at Pasadena, tonone and one-half miles east of the Houston city limits. The plant works automatically without the attention of any attendant. A second such plant is to be installed at Liston near Dallas.

NEW PAPER MONEY NEXT YEAR

With the advent of 1929 the new size of paper currency, smaller in size than the present bank notes, will be issued by the United States government. The new size is 6 1/4 x 9 1/8 inches, and has been brought about in the interest of efficiency and economy. But it will have many other advantages. The new "bills" will have new pictures on their faces and backs. They are printed by the intaglio method from specially engraved plates chromium plated; they will be more difficult to counterfeit or alter.

"Once the new year arrives," said Alvin W. Hall, Director of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington, D. C., tons of the new currency will move out of Washington by truck loads. When the banks request new currency, they will receive the new size, and the old notes will be taken out of circulation as fast as they come in.

The new size and designs of paper money are the result of years of careful planning, investigation and design. According to Mr. Hall, it is the first "thought-out" money in the history of the government. Heretofore there has been no harmony and many more varieties were printed than were necessary.

For example, the old \$10 note: Five designs were in circulation. One contained the portrait of A. J. Hendricks; one had the portrait of Michael Hilligas. (Neither men were well-known to the public). Another had the portrait of Andrew Jackson; still another that of Wm. McKinley; the fifth pictured a buffalo with a humped back. In the new line of bills all this has been changed. All notes of each denomination will be practically alike. On the ten dollar note, for example, in the place of five different pictures, each note will have the likeness of Alexander Hamilton on one side, and a picture of the Treasury building on the other side.

The various issues of the notes will have only technical differences—denoting gold, silver, etc.—that are of no special interest to the public in general. These differences will be indicated by certain printed matter on the faces of the bills, and a difference in the seal that is put on after the regular printing has been done.

The main idea of the new designs is that the picture of a famous man shall represent each denomination. There are eleven denominations of paper money now in circulation. In the new currency, the \$1 note has the portrait of George Washington as at present. On the back appears "ONE" in large letters, making the note raisers task difficult. Jefferson's portrait is on the face of the \$2 note while an engraving of Monticello is on the back. The new \$5 note has the portrait of Lincoln on the face and a picture of the Lincoln Memorial on the back. The \$20 note has Andrew Jackson's portrait on the face and an engraving of the White House on the back. The \$50 note has General Grant's portrait on the face and a picture of the Capitol on the back. The \$100 note will have the portrait of Benjamin Franklin on the face, and likely an engraving of Independence Hall on the back.

All the notes, up to the \$100 bill and except the \$1 note, will have the picture of buildings on their backs, making it hard to pass \$1 bills for higher notes by changing number. Above \$100, the notes have beautiful ornate designs on their backs. The \$500 note bears the likeness of McKinley; the \$1000 note has the portrait of Grover Cleveland; the \$5000 note has the portrait of Madison; and the \$10,000 note that of Salmon Chase.—Printers Album.

DEMAND FOR HATCHERY CHICKS INCREASED YEARLY
Hatching of chicks in Egypt has been conducted on a commercial basis for so many years that hens have completely abandoned the idea of wanting to sit on eggs, we are told. Whether or not hens in this country will ever reach that stage is hard to say, but certain it is that more and more farms each year are being stocked with chicks which first saw the light of day in an incubator.

Fifty years ago, hens did most of the hatching of chicks in this country. Thirty-four years ago the first shipment of baby chicks was made, and the hatchery industry became a reality. In the years since then, there have sprung up about 1000 hatcheries throughout the United States, selling annually a total of about 500,000,000 chicks. Although poultry raisers take many of these chicks, the larger part of them go to farms, because the farmer is finding it far more economical, more convenient and a much safer plan to purchase his chicks already hatched, than to try to hatch them himself.

In order to further this idea, and to insure better quality in chicks, reliable hatcherymen throughout the nation recently combined into an organization to promote better relations between hatcherymen and farmers. These hatcheries, operating under the slogan, "Hatchery Chicks for Greater Profits," are pledged to produce better quality chicks, and to use only sound business methods into their dealings with customers.

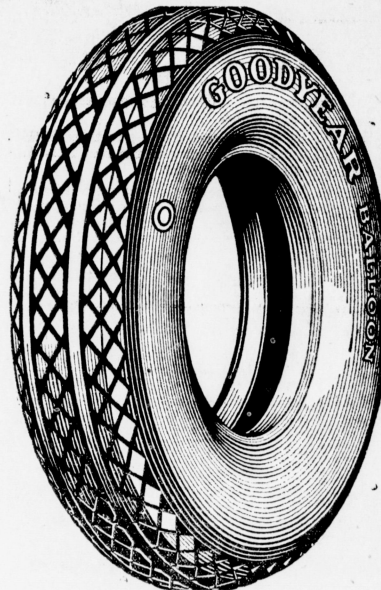

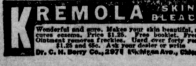

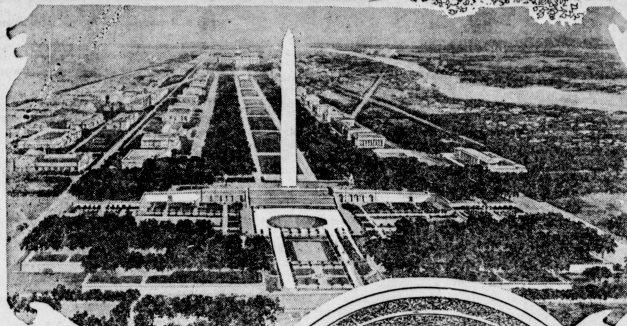

For when President John Adams transferred the seat of government from the old-established and gay Philadelphia to this raw wilderness town, he found it a place of thirty or forty nuts scattered around in the woods and swamps and the beginnings of the public buildings, described by a congressman in Adams' party as follows: "One wing of the capitol only has been erected, which, with the President's house, a mile distant, both constructed with white sandstone, were shining objects in dismal contrast with the scene around them. Instead of recognizing the avenues and streets portrayed in the plan of the city, not one was visible, unless we except a path leading to the new wilderness. The Pennsylvania avenue, leading, as laid down on paper, from the capitol to the President's Mansion, was then nearly the whole distance a deep morass, covered with alder bushes, which were cut through the width of the intended avenue during the then ensuing winter."

ITH the federal building program for our national capital now under way at full speed and every indication that it will be carried forward uninterruptedly to completion, it is the great celebration in 1932 of the two hundredth anniversary of the birth of George Washington, the century-old dream of Pierre L'Enfant, is nearing its realization. Few Americans know anything more about L'Enfant than a somewhat vague idea associating his name with the phrase "the founder of Washington." Yet had the advice of this young French engineer been followed, the United States of America would have now the most beautiful and impressive capital city in the world. Even though the nation allowed him to die a disappointed man, his goal unachieved, yet he dreamed and planned to such good purpose that not even a hundred years of blindness to beauty and neglect of the opprobrium of hand had been sufficient to dim his vision splendid, and the United States may yet have the wonderful capital that he planned for it.



Pierre Charles L'Enfant was born August 2, 1754, somewhere in sunny France. He was a lieutenant in the French army in 1777 when he came to this country to offer his services to the Continental congress. By his ability he rose to the rank of captain and then to major. He planned and built Fort Mifflin and Fort Mifflin, fought through the remainder of the war, was wounded at the battle of Savannah, taken prisoner by Sir Henry Clinton in 1780 and paroled three years later. With the war at an end, L'Enfant decided to remain in this country and continue his career as an engineer and architect. The city of New York presented him with a testimonial for his services and his reputation was so high that President Washington selected him in 1791 to carry out the new city plan which was planned on the banks of the Potomac, declaring that "Major L'Enfant is well qualified for the work as any man living." To this honor Jefferson, secretary of state, added the endorsement, "I am happy the President has left the planning of the city in such good hands."

But it was cursed and degraded by defacement of important buildings intersected themselves into the plan; streets cut off into the Land of Nod and disappeared. L'Enfant's pet fantasy, the Mall, lay fallow, though he had planned so wisely that nothing can prevent its flowering into consummation whenever congress so will. The distortion of the original idea had become such a system by 1801 that a congressional commission, headed by Senator James McMillan, of Michigan, and Senator Stephen H. Hays, of Utah, wherever it had been departed from, and embodied its preliminary attempt in legislation which still rules.

Ever since then the task of unifying and strengthening Washington has been carried indefatigably on, and succeeded more and more friendly and attentive. The present plan, put into operation some two years ago by the public buildings commission, headed by Senator Samuel C. Pomeroy, of Utah, and having an initial fund of \$5,000,000 at its disposal, follows closely the plan of L'Enfant. The outstanding feature in it is the Mall or Monument Gardens, extending from the Washington monument to the capitol and flanked by new federal buildings. And if this plan is completed as it is hoped it will be, in time for the George Washington celebration in 1932, some of the honor paid that great American then will be shared by the young French engineer whom he backed in his effort to give this country a capital city beautiful.

VISITORS TO CARLSBAD CAVERN SHOW INCREASE

Carlsbad, N. M., Nov. 5.—Eight hundred and three automobiles, each averaging 2-7 persons per car, transported the 2,203 visitors to Carlsbad cavern in October, 1928, compared with 519 automobiles and 1,461 visitors for the same month, 1927.
