NEFF TOLD TERRELL OF CRITICISMS

In a letter dated May 7, 1932, Pat M. Neff as a member of the State Railroad Commission, told C. V. Terrell, Chairman of the Commission and now candidate for re-election, why he (Neff) criticised him. There were thirteen criticisms stated in the letter. Some of them are as follows:

Mr. Neff says, "I criticised you in 1930 for issuing your oil prorator orders, because these orders prorated out of business the small operators. The legislature later passed a law in keeping with my criticism."

"I criticised you in 1930 for issuing some 3,000 truck permits without any restrictions or regulations as to size of truck, or size or load, when the law gave the commission authority to prescribe both."

"I criticised you for adding to our list of employees 90 new places and filling them with appointees of your own, when their services were not needed, thereby unnecessarily adding heavier burdens to the already over-taxed citizens of Texas."

"I criticised you for having made contracts to pay certain persons \$100 per day, others \$75 per day, and still others \$35 per day, together with all expenses, hotel bills and such, to work for the Commission. These appointees are now, and have been since last year, on our payroll. The time in which we live cry out against such governmental extravagances. The State should not be hijacked in the name of the law."

"I criticised you for employing and continuing to keep on the payroll, employees who have the habit of getting drunk. One of your employees plead guilty some months ago to a grand jury indictment, charging him with driving in a state car while drunk; yet he continues on the payroll and works in behalf of your election."

Considering the above statements, we wonder if it will not be best for our people to support Lee Satterwhite for the office of Railroad Commissioner this time. He is an able man, a West Texas man, served honorably in the State Legislature and was Speaker of the House. Terrell has been in office 10 years and, with the policies of high handed expenses which he uses, it might be best to try a new man.

PRIMARY ELECTION SUPERVISORS

The Election Law (Article 2942) authorizes "any one-fifth of the candidates whose names appear on the official ballot," on or before the day preceding the election, to agree in writing, signed by them upon two supervisors of election. The two persons so selected are required to take the oath as election officers, along with the presiding judge of elections before the opening of the polls. They must be qualified voters of the county and election precinct in which they serve and subject to none of the following disqualifications:

1. Must not be a holder of an office of profit or trust under the United States or this State, or in any city or town in Texas (except a notary public), nor have held such an office within the last thirty days;
2. Must not be a candidate for office;
3. Must have paid poll tax.

While the election is being held they are required to remain in view of the ballot boxes until the count is completed. When any voter permanently disabled from marking his own ballot is assisted by the presiding judge of election, the are required to be present to see that the ballot is marked in accordance with the wishes of the voter, but such supervisors must remain silent except in cases of irregularity or violation of the law while so in attendance. It is also made their duty to see that each ballot is correctly called, and if they note any fraud or irregularity whatever in the conduct of the election, they are required to report it to the next grand jury.
