

THE DELINQUENT

those able to pay who did not want to pay because it was not good politics are defined by a very small percentage of the number of taxpayers delinquent. A study of furteen Texas counties of various sizes and located in different sections of the state disclosed the amazing fact that five percent of the total persons who owe delinquent taxes in those counties owe 35 per cent of the total amount delinquent. In Bexar county, which Mr. Jay says is probably typical of all of the more populous counties of the state, six per cent of the delinquent. Mr. Jay says is probably typical of all of the more populous counties of the state, six per cent of the delinquent taxpayers owe 46 per cent of the total taxes delinquent. In Gonzales county four per cent of the delinquents owe 34 per cent of the total; in La Salle county one per cent of the delinquent owe 46 per cent of the total; in Limestone County three per cent of the delinquents owe 28 per cent of the total; in Tom Green county five per cent of the total, and so on. These figures and similar ones have been widely printed in Texas during the past few weeks and as a result steps are being taken in many counties to investigate local conditions and to insist on the tax collectors making a greater effort to collect from persons who owe delinquent taxes and are able to pay. Mr. Jay expresses belief that unquestionably the major part of the delinquent taxes in the state is due to deliberate evasion of payments by persons in a position to pay. 

A LETTER
FROM THE VALLEY
The following is letter written by the fillings over the radio about the ereint storm, but these reports were only from the air. The aviator who are sister, Mrs. L. R. Higgins, both of Spur, describing something of the great storm which passed over the lower Rio Grande Valley last week. She owns a farmr there, and Mr. Hoep finer is her farm supervisor and the world walled and sughters. Dub is a son of Mrs. Johnson. The story is as follows:

The storm struck here about ten the kitchen roof was off, The men thought every one was killed, but soon is. Did you hear the aviator who saw some one making signs to us through the only window left. We got hammers and some lumber lying right against the south porch. We just barely could get in the Jitney between the tree limbs. The men grabbed lumber of any description and began to nail it over the screen on the south

east porch and knowing the wind would shift to the east. They just nailed it like bars, but it saved the pressure of the wind from the screens. They just had time to get in and nail their door again when here it came from the east as expected. The car was on the east side of the house. WE SAT THERE 12 HOURS securely locked in that jitney by the fallen trees. The men continued to nail and brace all night on the inside. About six o'clock in the morning

the wind changed again to the south-east and we had a REAL STORM. I mean the kind you have read about that would blister your face and take your breath. It lifted those two large trees that were holding the car and threw them a mile away. The men saw our predicament as it was day-light and risked the house giving away to get me. By all holding together in a wad we made it to the house again. Imagine the sound and the sensation of the house you are standing in just being rent apart like you would tear up a goods box. We knew the house would go this time, and funny as it seems, more trees had accumulated around that lucky jitney, and having the break on and being in gear it looked safe acris. But we applied to the second secon

gain. But we couldn't all get in.

I told Dub if he would get in the
jitney, after locking the north door,
Mr. Hoepfner and I would try to make it with the two girls to another house about half a mile away, a large house we thought with a cellar. So we tried that. (Don't think we were arguing or contemplating one with the other. I guess I was giving orders and through pure consternation, the men really minding me). It took only a minute to carry this out. All of us were wet as the Devil anyway, so we didn't have to worry about keeping dry. We saw Dub into the car and we started with the two little girls. All during the horror of the day before and the ontire wight. and the entire night we had failed to think of what a rain was falling and the deeply plowed condition of every foot of land around us. Also, we had to drift with the storm as we couldn't turn back. We went four in a breast, Hoepfner holding to me with one hand and his least child with the other, I held the other girl and of course they were clinging to us. We found the mud was to our knees and then the water was so deep. The big waves would hit us just like the ocean waves. We were all washed down twice, but held together Twice we stopped to hold to fruit trees to catch our breath, but we couldn't

talk, not even turn our heads. We were going through the edge of an orchard, the only way. Honestly, the grape fruit and oranges came near beating us to death. The wind (so we read) was 90 miles per hour. The deep water and the debris drift-ed us for about a mile. Firally we came to the bar pit joining the con-crete highway. We were then wading water to our exemplits. It had been all the time from waist deep to our arms. I lost my sinces first thing, and never could walk barefooted. I thought the least girl fainted once. When Hoepfner felt her relax he stopped but never turned me loose. By peering irto her fare we thought she was dead. He just justed forward in the same manner as we had been going and pretty soon the girl came to and

segan to fight. began to fight.
There we were by this time to the bargit. Couldn't turn back and the water swimming. I couldn't swim, or never had. One clild fainting, the other one could sum a little bit, but it had taken every bit of our strength to get that far. We stood for a few minutes in silence. Finally I made the sign to move on. Hoepfner held back, but for miles in every direction back, but for miles in every direction it was the same. We couldn't think of sitting down, we would have drowned. Rube, you rememger how the Trinity looked in a flood, same here

with drifts coming all around you. I hissed in Hoepfner's car, "Coward, rat". I knew that would get him, so it worked. He fairly threw us into the stream, all holding together as best we could, Eleanor swimming fine with one hand and helping me with the other. Of course, Hoepfner is a fine swimmer, but with a fainting child in one armr and a woman in the other he was nothing to brag about and he knew it. But I am tall. I waded as long as I could. Then I held my breath and walked steadily on, hitting the bottom all the time and waded over my head. Of course, there wasn't but a few steps like this until I could touch ground again and

But the hardest time we had was when we reached the pavement. We hadn't realized how much the mud had held us down. The little girl would just stay suspended in the air with her daddy holding her by the arm. She weighed only 50 pounds. We had another half mile of this. Imagine our feeling to get to the house and find it all blown down except two rooms. Every out house on the place down and the roof blown from what house there was left.




