Red Cross In Dickens County

In the largest relief operation of its kind ever undertaken, the American Red Cross in the last year distributed among distressed families 104,000,000 garments and 10,400,000 barrels of flour, processed from government surpluses. According to D. L. Granberry, chairman of the local chapter, the benefits from this program have been felt in nearly every county in the United States. Altogether, the chapter leader added, the food and clothing needs of 25,000,000 individuals, representing a fifth of the country's entire population, were partially met by the Herculean distribution task.

Of the total amounts distributed 2360 sacks of flour and 2076 ready-made garments were sent into Dickens county by the National Organization. In addition this county was allotted 3000 yards of piece goods which were made into clothing by beneficiaries able to sew for themselves.

With a spirit comparable to war time enthusiasm, 600,000 volunteer workers helped in the nation-wide program, performed at a cost of \$685,000 to the Red Cross. Without the service of volunteers in this and the thousands of other communities benefited by the operation, such a task would have been impossible, Chairman Granberry said.

"In this county alone," the chapter official declared, "cloth and clothing with an estimated value of \$1038.00

They are Robert Montgomery, affable expert at flip humor and Sally Eilers, who sky rocketed to stardom after her outstanding hit in "Bad Girl."

have been received through the National Red Cross and distributed by the local chapter. When it is considered that all but a bare half dozen of the 3,072 counties in the United States requested and received flour or cotton goods, some idea of the immensity of the program may be gained. In my opinion, it would have been impossible for the distribution to have been made had it not been for the ever ready American Red Cross which was assigned to the job by the government.

"Cooperation throughout the program was community wide and is evidence that all organizations and persons can unite in Red Cross to meet perplexing situations. The cotton distribution was under the direction of D. L. Granberry who gave careful thought to meeting each problem as it developed. The flour distribution was handled by Granberry and a committee of volunteers who made an effort to reach every needy family in the county.

"The success of the entire operation," Mr. Granberry said, "is due to the fact that Red Cross with its 3,700 chapters, covering every section of the United States, stands ready to go into action when needed. The annual Roll Call, conducted as it is every year between Armistice Day and Thanksgiving, provides the income necessary to keep the organization ready to function quickly when emergencies arise. The regular programs of safety and health education are continued through the response to the invitation for annual membership enrollment. Between November 11 and 30 every local citizen will be extended an opportunity to join."

SPUR HIGH BULLDOGS DEFEAT CROSBYTON IN DISTRICT GAME, 7-6

(JEP) Coach Thad Murley's Spur High Bulldogs came from behind in the closing minutes of the game last Friday afternoon and emerged victors over Crosbyton 7 to 6 in their annual football game. Spur is now in undisputed lead for the championship of this quadrant of district 2. One more game, that with Post on Armistice Day at Spur will decide the championship.

Crosbyton held the advantage in the first half and put over their touchdown in the second quarter. At the opening of the second half, Suits received the kick off, passed to Harry Martin who returned the ball 60 yards to Crosbyton's 20 yard line. Spur made a first down but lost the ball when the referee called an incomplete pass over the goal line and the ball went to Crosbyton on their 20 yard line. In the closing minutes of play Spur started a drive in mid-field Scoggins moved from tackle to fullback. Scoggins carried the ball on every play except twice, four first downs in succession were made, placing the ball on Crosbyton's one foot line. Scoggins in three attempts made it over left tackle for the touchdown. Scoggins made the extra point on a right tackle plunge with ten seconds left to play.

Captain Morgan, Harry Martin, Herman Bostic, Bingham, Teague, Suits, McCombs and Scoggins were the leaders in their teams march toward a district championship. Wren of Crosbyton, was the best halfback to show in Spur in years and was responsible for a large number of his teams first downs. He was ably assisted by his team mates with their blocking. Blackwood Flour noy and Simpson were the stars in Crosbyton's line.

SPORTS EYE

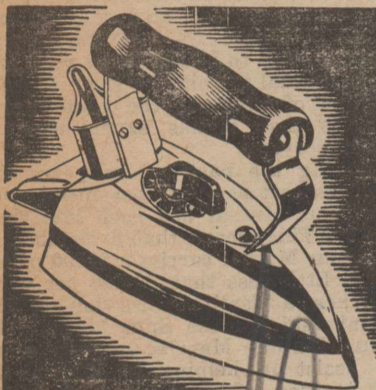

As the Board of Education should not consent to bear the expense of paying the teachers to teach long hours, it was decided that they should conduct a free dispensary of candy, soda and cigarettes for the mid-morning and afternoon refreshments.

As to hours that school should hold session—from 10:00 to 11:00 in the morning, a two hour recess at noon, and with dismissal at 2:30 p. m.

The passing mark agreed upon by most pupils was 45%, although every one thought it satisfactory that no final exams be given.

It was thought that all teachers be under twenty-five and unmarried.

At the beginning of the school year, the student will indicate what schedule he wishes to pursue, and a special course will be arranged for him.

School should open in the fall with the first frost, and close at the first signs of spring.

As this type of school does not seem to be in view for us, let us strive to gain it for our children.

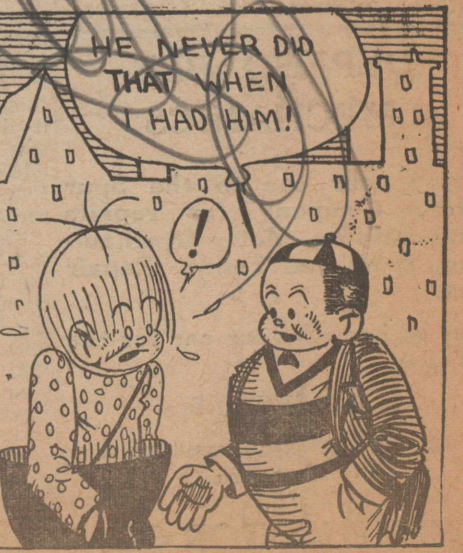

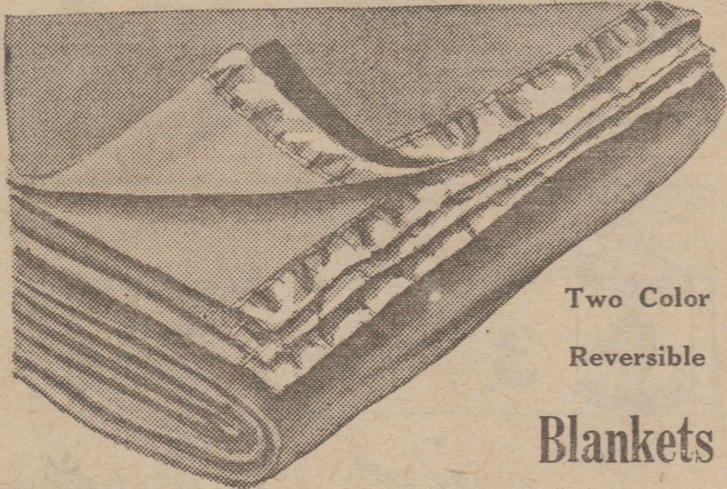

Births and Deaths Asked To Be Reported

If you are a patriotic citizen, not to mention your official relation to your State, county and home town,

the following will appeal to you: In every state in the Union except Texas, the census bureau recognizes the human records, birth and death rates are computed and published. In order to overcome this condition and relieve Texas of this

stigma a test of registration was made. It was found that death registration had reached the standard and in the future Texas will be shown all the favors shown other states as a matter of mortality. This result was a high compliment to the Undertakers, coffin dealers and others who had charge of the burial of the dead during the time included in this investigation.

There is attached a list of the births about which a request as to the certificate has been directed to the State Bureau, but the corresponding birth certificate can not be found filed, as the law requires.

Dickens County: Jesse N. Stewart reports Gary A. Stewart, born 6-2-32, 841. Mrs. A. C. Dixon reports Elcie M. Dixon, born 9-21-32, 277.

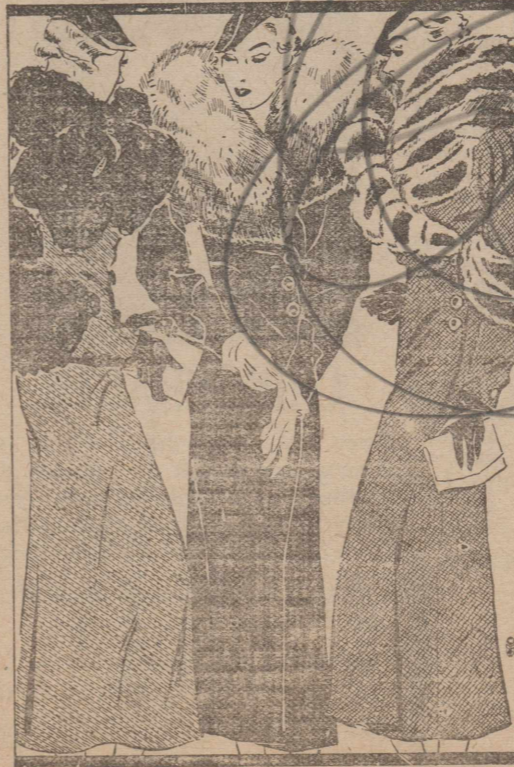
These births may have occurred in other years or in other counties or there may be an error in the name, in such event if this information is furnished the State Bureau immediately that record may be cleared up before the investigation is finished, otherwise the births must stand charged against your county as a violation of the 1927 Vital Statistic Law. Such a violation is a misdemeanor that carries a fine of not less than \$5,000 nor more than \$50, for the medical attendant at every birth must file a certificate with the registrar at the time of birth. These violations appear as a reflection on your county and the list is given you believing that as a citizen you will do everything to locate these births and secure the complete enforcement of the law.

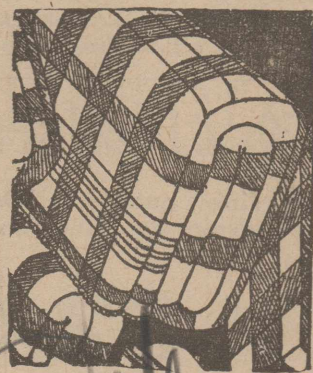

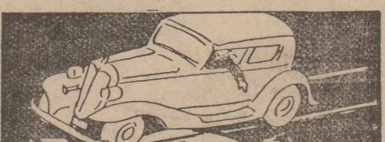

Watch Out For Scarlet Fever

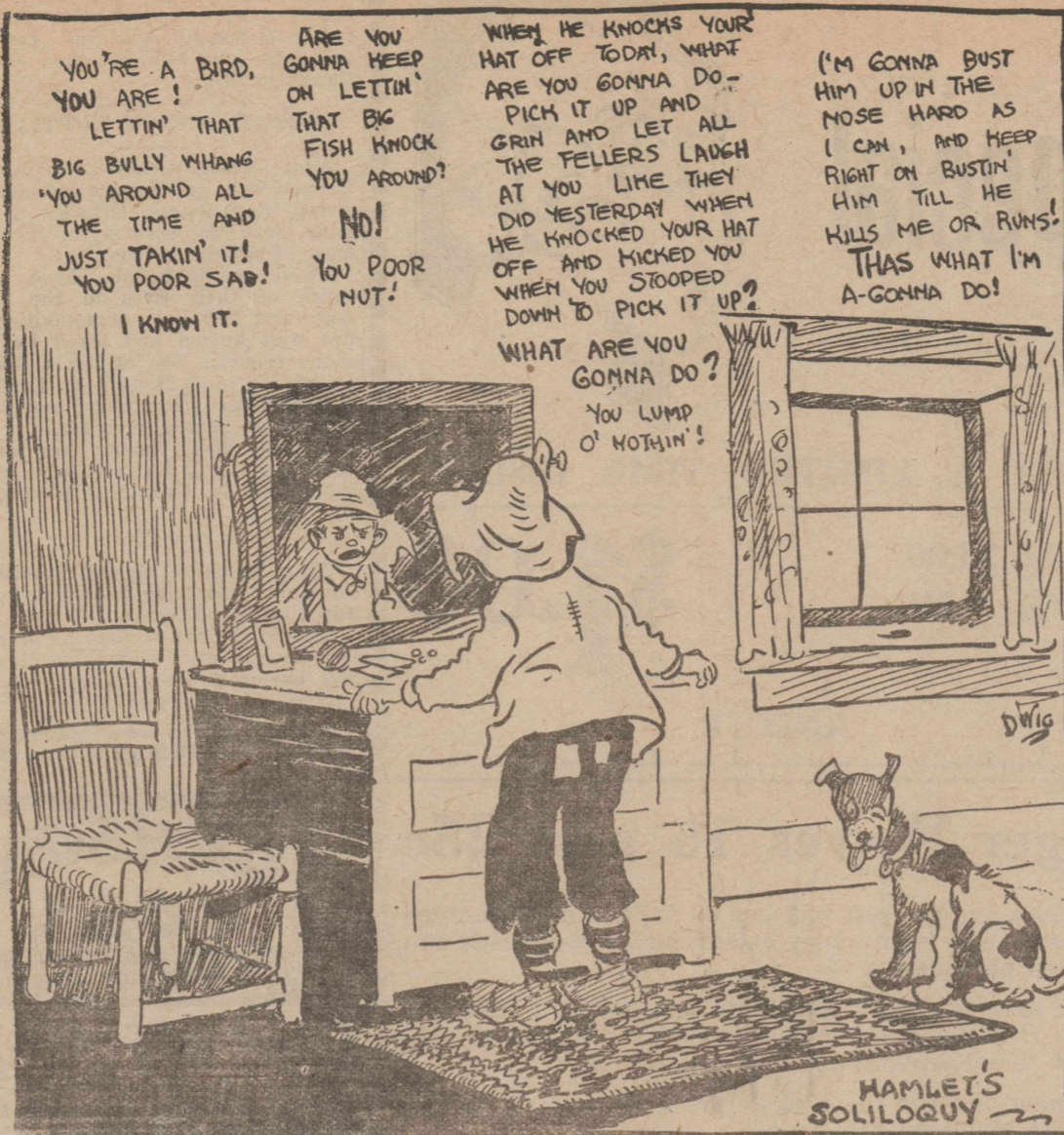
The State Department of Health has just issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, as the number of cases usually increases during the fall months. Last year over twenty-six hundred cases were reported in Texas. The majority of deaths occur from October through February.

Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may catch scarlet fever, but children under 15 years are most likely to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under 5 years, and for babies. Do not let your children

take any chances with scarlet fever.

Call the doctor as soon as the symptoms appear.

If your child is going to have scarlet fever, the first signs you may notice are that he seems tired, restless and out of sorts. Usually, there is a sore throat, chill, vomiting, or convulsion. The child has fever. His skin is dry and hot. His tongue is furred, and, under this white covering it is red and swollen. In ordinary cases, these early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash. Little flat red points, close together, appear first on the neck and chest. Soon the rash is over most of the body and brilliant in color.

The doctor is required by law to report the case to the local health officer. Do your part by following carefully the quarantine instructions which the health officer will give you. Children who have had scarlet fever, or who have been exposed, must not return to school until permission is given by the health officer and physician. A severe or fatal case of scarlet fever may develop from contact with some one who has only a light attack.

BAPTISTS TO CELEBRATE CENTURY OF WORK

The Baptist General Convention of Texas which will hold its eighty-fifth annual session at Fort Worth beginning November 7th, will this year celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the beginning of Baptist work in Texas. The convention program will give large space to "Our Century of Progress," and will present the story of the first Baptist organization in Texas. This church was organized in Illinois and moved to Texas as a unit, crossing the Sabine river in November 1833.

Dr. J. Howard Williams, General Secretary of the Convention, announces that Texas Baptists will celebrate their "Century of Progress" with a great Mission Offering amounting to \$134,000.00. Some \$50,000.00 of this fund has already been paid in, and Dr. Williams expressed himself as being very hopeful that Texas Baptists would raise the remaining \$85,000.00 within the next two weeks.

During this fall Texas Baptists have held 107 Associational meetings all over Texas, with record attendance in almost every instance, demonstrating the progress of the past century. When the first organized group of Baptists came into Texas one hundred years ago, there were less than fifty Baptists in the state. At this time there are more than five hundred thousand white Baptists and a total of more than a million of all races according to Dr. Williams.

At the Fort Worth meeting, representatives from various mission fields will speak of the work Baptists are doing there, and the Convention will receive reports from the

after the Crimean and Solferino engagements and in 1863 assembled a committee at Geneva to study the problem of neutralizing aid to the wounded in the war. The solution was found in the Treaty of Geneva which was ratified by twelve nations in 1864. Today more than a half hundred countries are banded together in this cause. There also exists an International Red Cross Society with headquarters in Paris. It is headed by John Barton Payne, American Red Cross Chairman.

"The United States, although observing the formation of the Geneva group, was extremely backward in becoming affiliated with the movement. Not until Clara Barton had spent many years of tireless effort to the founding of the Red Cross in the United States did the government finally recognize the widespread need for such a society.

"Surrounded by less than fifty forward-looking citizens, Miss Barton was selected as the organization's first president when the Red Cross came into being after receiving governmental sanction in 1881. Today there are nearly four million Senior memberships and seven million Junior enrollments.

"Accomplishments of the Red Cross during and since the World War are well known. Its peace-time program, reaching into practically every county in the United States, has kept alive the organization's voluntary spirit toward mankind."

When this nation last year found itself still in the grip of economic disorder, it will be recalled that it was the Red Cross that Congress turned to distribute surplus commodities which in a twelve-month period benefited 25,000,000 individuals, or approximately a fifth of the country's entire population.

All its activities, which include its health services, disaster work, First Aid and Life Saving, War Service, and the Junior Red Cross, have become indispensable in the thousands of communities this agency serves.

In the last three years, tasks of

this organization have been extremely heavy. While it is a semi-governmental agency, the Red Cross is entirely dependent upon enrollment of memberships. This year's Roll Call will be held between Armistice Day and Thanksgiving in its 3,700 local chapters. Community leaders, heading up the membership campaign, will invite every adult citizen to become a part of this humanitarian society during the Roll Call period.

Red Cross Occupies An Essential Place In Life Of Nation

In an announcement today of plans being formulated for the annual Roll Call of the American Red Cross, O. C. Arthur, Roll Call Chairman of the chapter which serves this community, traced the growth of an organization whose origin and development hold as dramatic and interesting story as was ever told. Springing from a desire to render voluntary service to humanity, this agency now is looked upon as an essential part of the life of the nation.

Carrying on as a pioneer in its field, the Red Cross accepts its assignments and adjusts its work to

meet changing conditions, always looking beyond any abnormal swing in the nation's economic pendulum.

Reviewing milestones in the organization's history, the chapter chairman explained that the Red Cross was born on the battlefield. His account of its founding follows.

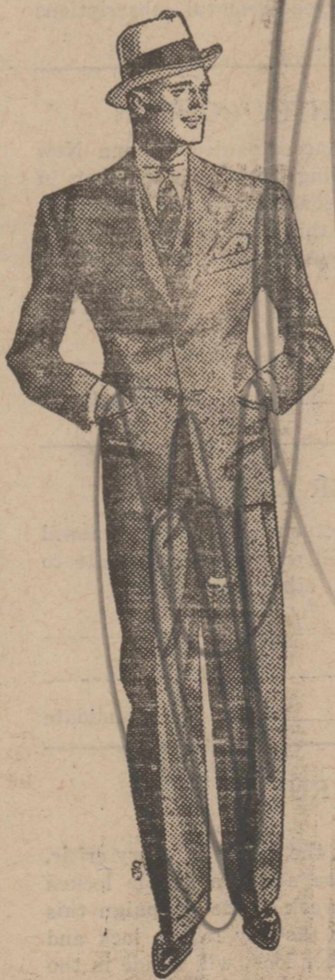
"Moved by the horrors of the Battle of Solferino in 1859, Henry Dunant, a young Swiss idealist, and a small band of villagers he had summoned, braved the danger of gunfire in a determined effort to give voluntary succor to victims of the ferocious encounter," the Roll Call chairman declared in describing the origin of the Red Cross. "Later Dunant wrote a stirring volume on the barbaric practices among nations toward fallen warriors. Although other influences helped to crystallize sentiment for such a movement, the original aims and purposes of the Red Cross sprang from Dunant's emotions and from a sympathetic reaction which his writ-

ings captured.

"Prior to its inception in this country, in the work of Florence Nightingale during the Crimean war was born the principles of modern nursing. Thousands of lives were saved on the battlefields when she and her devoted followers nursed many back to recovery and brought order and sanitary practices out of chaos and gross neglect.

"European leaders set about to correct this wartime evil a few years

Americanus emydosaurian, a large terrapin, is in Spur this week and is being exhibited on the lot just north of the Spur Bakery. "Old Whooppee" is estimated by scientists to be about 1,000 years old, and was more than 500 years old when Columbus discovered America. She was captured March 4, 1929, on the O'Brien Ranch in Maverick County, Texas. It is not known just where "Whooppee" first discovered America, but from point of captivity she is a Texas product. She is owned by C. E. Miller, formerly of Lawton, Okla., and has the pleasure of visiting all the important cities and towns in the Southwest.
