CWA Administrator Is Commended

The following letter was received by O. C. Arthur from Howell Kidd, General Supervisor of Construction for the Civil Works Administration in Texas, showing how well the supervision of Mr. Arthur is being received in Austin:

"Mr. O. C. Arthur, Administrator Dickens County Board of Welfare and Employment, Spur, Texas.

"Dear Mr. Arthur: We have your letter of January 25th together with a report from our Mr. C. G. Gorton, District Supervisor, advising us of the good progress being made by you on our approved projects in your county.

"We are very much pleased indeed to know that you are handling our projects in the manner you are. In order that you may have a correct understanding of our position, will state when we approve projects in excess of your quota it is to be understood by the administrator that these projects are approved to create a reservoir of work for your men. Your report shows that you have six projects under way at this time, that you have a number of projects approved for which you do not have men to allot, and ask instructions from this office as to the proper procedure. You are advised it is our desire that you concentrate on the projects that you have already started and desist from starting any new projects, until such time as the projects now under construction have been completed. For your information, will state that for the last week we have discontinued approving projects, and will continue to do so until such time the projects now approved have been completed.

"We are very much pleased to note that all of your work is scattered in the four precincts. This evidences the fact to us that you have the interest of the county at whole at heart. Continue the good work, and call on us from time to time when we can serve you.

TAX COLLECTIONS REACH HIGHER PER CENT

H. P. Gibson, tax collector, for the Spur Independent School District reports that he collected 66% of the 1933 school taxes assessed. Good collections also were made on delinquent taxes for the school district.

Fred Arrington, deputy county tax collector, reports that 68% of the county taxes for 1933 were collected up to February 1. He also stated that the office had registered 1400 cars and 200 trucks, a much higher number than at this time last year. Car owners have until March 31 to register cars under a new law passed the past week by the legislature.

Last Day To Sign Cotton Contracts

Today (Thursday) is the last day to offer your cotton land to the federal government for 1934. This is an extension of fifteen days made by the Secretary of Agriculture. The average lint per acre must reach 75 pounds to rent the land to the government.

Dickens County farmers up to Saturday night, had signed 553 contracts offering 23,488 acres to the government at 3 1/2 cents per pound for the five year average lint production. This is still some 7,000 acres short of the amount estimated for Dickens County with three days left at that time.

Farmers who desire to sign a contract and have not done so are asked by the county agent to get in touch with their committee man today and put Dickens County over the top in co-operating with the government in their effort to obtain a higher price for the farmers' cotton.

Spur's Oldest Store Opens Close-Out Sale; In Business Here For More Than 24 Years



More than 24 years ago the Spurr Hardware & Furniture Company opened doors for business to the people of Spur country. This week the firm is starting a sale which is intended to close the career in business.

Saturday, October 30, 1909, L. H. (Bill) Perry arrived in Spur with several carloads of lumber and a large stock of hardware. This was two days before the first birthday of the town of Spur. He had contracted for the two lots on which the business is now located, he had met the terms of sale and had secured the privilege to unload his lumber and merchandise on the lots, but the lots were not sold until Monday, November 1, 1909. He immediately erected a tin building, put in part of the floor, and before the roof was on the building or the doors were swung, people began calling for hardware and business was begun about three o'clock in the afternoon of the same day the town was opened. This was just a few hours ahead of any other store starting business in our city. 24 years of excellent service rendered.

Mr. Perry was in business at Stephenville when he started his business in Spur. He and his twin brother started into drug business in Stephenville in 1885 and the business was known as Perry Bros. A hardware business was started a little later known as Perry Hardware. The brother looked after the drug business and Mr. Perry took charge of the hardware, it being more to his temperament. The hardware business was sold some years ago, but the drug store known as Perry Bros. was not sold until two years ago, making 37 years for it.

These two brothers have been closely associated with each other all their lives and have followed similar trends in business. The brother, T. H. Perry, at this time is postmaster at Stephenville, Texas, L. H. Perry is postmaster at Spur now, both brothers serving in the same capacity.

Mr. Perry was born near Tuskegee, Ala., and was five years of age when he came with his parents to Texas. The family first settled in Tarrant County seven miles north of Fort Worth. In 1880 they moved to Erath County where Mr. Perry lived until he moved his family to Spur in April, 1917. In 1900 he was married to Miss Eula Lavery at Carlsbad, New Mexico. They had gained acquaintance while Mrs. Perry was attending school in Stephenville. Their two children, Mrs. Roy L. Harkey, and James Hill Perry, live in Spur, the latter with his parents.

Mr. Perry is a great grandson of General Turner Hunt, who was with the Revolutionary War.

In talking of his quitting business, Mr. Perry stated that he is not closing out business because people had not been good to him, nor because he had it in for anybody. He said, "I have been in business a long time. I can get out now and not owe anybody anything. I feel it is a good time to quit. People have been exceptionally good to me and I am thankful for their kind consideration."

The entire stock of hardware and furniture is being offered to the public at greatly reduced prices.

Sheriff Arthur Is Some Busy Sheriff

Sheriff Arthur does his best to keep his work a secret to the public, but sometimes a few things leak out. He is a busy man. The last of the week he brought J. L. Nolan back from Red River County and he is now in jail at Dickens. Nolan is charged with wife desertion.

Saturday night the Sheriff returned from Fort Worth with John Ewers and W. M. Busby who have charges of forgery against them. They are in the county jail.

Ola Woodward, colored, was captured at Matador and the Sheriff came in with him the first of the week. He has a number of cases of stealing cotton charged against him.

Paul and Lloyd Mason were taken into custody Tuesday night, one in Baylor County and the other in Archer County and have charges of assault with intent to murder filed against them. Lon Haney was stabbed in an affray at Prairie Chapel Saturday night and the two Mason brothers are being held for the act.

Farmers May Sign Corn-Hog Contract

To the cotton farmer who has already reduced his cotton acreage by diversifying with other crops and livestock in previous years, and who feels the Government cotton program is unfair to him, the corn-hog contract may offer interesting possibilities, says G. J. Lane County Agent.

Suppose a farmer changed from an all-cotton farm system to half cotton and half feed a few years ago. He milks cows and feeds hogs and raises chickens for a steady year-round living, and takes his cotton money in the fall for paying the bigger bills. He makes the same percentage reduction in his 1934 cotton crop as the neighbor who still plants nearly the whole farm to cotton, but he will receive only half as much in the way of a Government cotton benefit check.

In many such instances it works out that the diversified farmer may sign a corn-hog contract to reduce corn acreage or hog production or both, and receive Government benefit checks that will total just as much or even more than those received by the all-cotton farmer. In addition the diversified farmer is in a much better position than the all-cotton farmer to use the extra feed which the farm can grow under the terms of the cotton and corn-hog contracts.

The corn-hog contract is open to every farmer in the county who produces a surplus of either corn or hogs and who can otherwise qualify, the county agent points out. The rush of the cotton campaign makes a farm-to-farm canvass of farmers in the interest of the corn-hog program an impossibility, but men who may be eligible to sign these contracts should investigate the plan, he suggests.

Up until Saturday, February 10th, 15 hog contracts had been signed up in Dickens County. 2,203 hogs were effected by these contracts, making a reduction of 550.

New Incubator At Hairgrove Hatchery

The Hairgrove Hatchery has just installed a new Robbins incubator system to take care of their many patrons during the spring hatching season. This new system is different and is said to be the most modern in every respect.

The incubator is in two units. One unit for starting the eggs which requires a different temperature and humidity than for hatching eggs. At the eighteenth day when the eggs are tested, they are put into the hatching unit which has the proper temperature and moisture to finish them. Various hatcheries over the country say this is the most successful method yet installed.

Neither unit of the incubator has to be opened to change or turn the eggs. This is done by a lever from the outside. Heat and moisture are controlled from the outside. Each unit has two separate automatic heating systems.

H. P. GIBSON IN CHARGE PRODUCTION CREDIT ASSN.

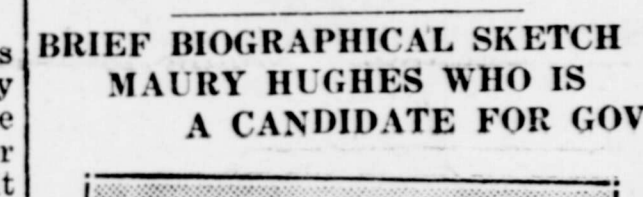

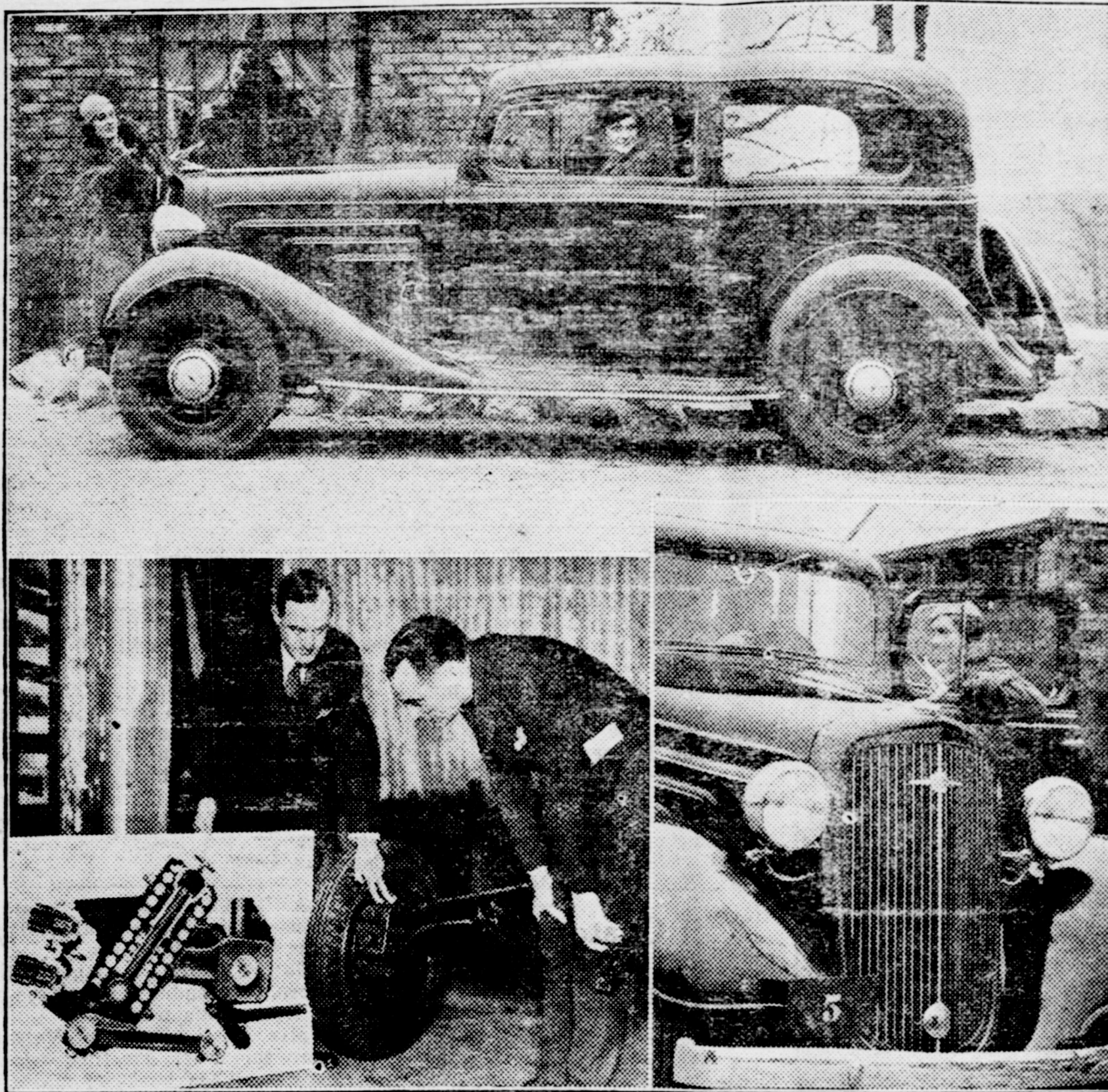

New "Knee-Action" Chevrolet Gives Passengers Ride Like a Glide

Holler, Chevrolet's general sales manager, is shown at the left holding a chart which shows the internal construction of the system. The radiator of the new car has added beauty through its graceful and sharply pointed design. Smartness has been the theme in every line of this year's Chevrolet.

The driver and passengers in the new 1934 Chevrolet get a ride like the glide of an airplane. One of the main factors in improving the riding qualities of the new car to such a great extent is the "Knee-Action"—or independently sprung front wheels, to use the technical term.

When the new Chevrolet strikes an irregularity in the road, both front and rear move up and down with the same frequency—there is no inclination on the part of the rear end of the car to leap into the air and throw the passengers forward and upward.

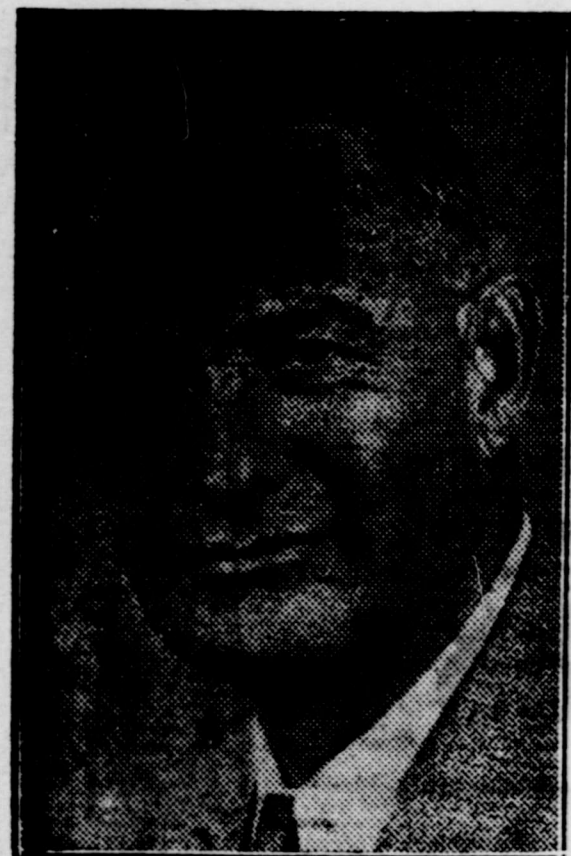

DEMONSTRATOR BEGINS YARD IMPROVEMENT

"We have moved the trees from the lawn, rearranged the walk and set the grass," reported Mrs. D. B. Embrey, yard improvement demonstrator in the McAdoo home demonstration club. "We are following the planting plan for our yard drawn by the home demonstration agent. We are planning to set the shrubs for the foundation planting soon, not later than the middle of March. We are using blooming and berried shrubs with privet for the foundation plantings. We have two Arizona Cypress that we put out last year and shall group the others with them."

Yard improvement is not one of the major demonstrations in home demonstration work in the county this year but several women are making improvements following a study of their yard needs with the home agent. Planting plans providing for foundation plantings, lawns and trees were drawn and are being followed in the improvements made.

CLUB GIRLS MAKE TILE

"We have made 33 feet of concrete hollow tile since our last club meeting," reported Marcelle Miller, garden demonstrator for the McAdoo 4-H club. "We made a form and went

right to work. I got so I could make them without breaking. We are letting them cure by keeping them covered with damp sacks before we lay them in the ground."

Each garden demonstrator in the girls' clubs is to make and lay at least 25 feet of hollow tile in the family garden. She plans, with her mother and the home demonstration agent, the garden for the family and keeps a record of the vegetables produced and canned from the garden. The garden is planned to provide vegetables to use fresh and canned and should include at least two vegetables new to the family.
