"Trail Dust" as the evolved brain-wizard coulmn is called has begun a Sunday appearance in the Amarillo News-Globe, which the Times trusts is its first step toward national syndication. It has long since gained national attention and in 1934 was awarded first place as the best Texas column by newspaper men at the State Fair Press Meeting.

The best compliment the Times might pay Editor Meador is, "It is great; so well constructed and deep thoughted that it soars above the understanding of the average man—like you and me." It takes the master mind of the true Meador type to grasp its throb, which accounts for the delay in its syndication.

The League of Nations Losing

The League of Nations, the organization which the world had hoped would be able to send the Dove of Peace to every country and require the powerful nations to respect the rights of the weaker ones, seems to be on its last pegs.
