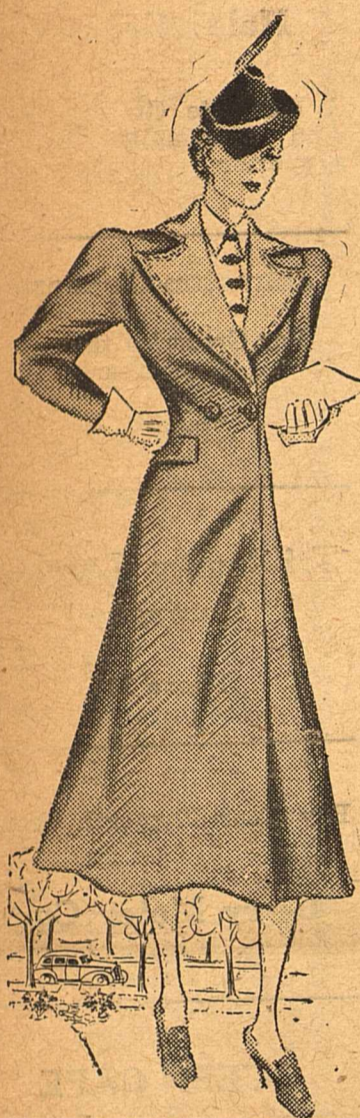

District Quotas For CCC Camps Are Released

Recent changes in regulations governing eligibility for selection into the Civilian Conservation Corps has been received from the Department of Labor by Adam R. Johnson, Director, Texas Relief Commission.

"A youth may now be selected who has an honorable discharge and has only been out six months, providing other rules are met, while in the past he would have to wait a year," stated Mr. Johnson. "This will enable hundreds of boys to enroll in October, who otherwise could not have been accepted until January."

U. S. Constitution Has a Birthday

It will have been 150 years next Friday since the Constitution of the United States was signed by the various delegates who sat in convention to bring it into existence. After that act the document was submitted to the various states for ratification or rejection, and as there were only 13 states at the time the Constitution had received the approval of nine states to make it become effective.

The President of the United States has issued a proclamation that this week, September 12 to 18, be designated as Constitutional Week in America and that the American People try to inform themselves more in regard to what the Constitution of our country is. It is recognized as the guiding rule of our country as no other law can be passed unless it is in accordance with those principles set out in the Constitution.

The preamble to the Constitution is practically an outline to the government of the United States, and every citizen should be able to give this preamble from memory. It is as follows:

"We, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

Camp schedule was drawn up by the camp committee to be submitted to the Council Executive Board at

their meeting in Lubbock on September 14th. The schedule announced by Marshall Mason, Camp Chairman, is as follows:

Four camps at Camp Post, May 29 to June 25. Foreign Camps, Northern New Mexico, Aug. 11 to 20th. Sea Scout Cruise, Galveston, June (dates not set). Eagle and Life Scout camp 21 days June 27-July 17 to Yellowstone National Park.
