TO THE VOTERS OF PRECINCT 1

I want to take this means of expressing my thanks to you for the nice vote you gave me in the first Primary. I want to thank each of my opponents for the nice race we had together.

I expect to see each and every one of you during this month and ask your consideration for a second term on my records in the past. I will be more than glad to have you talk with me about the duties of the office. If I have not handled the office as you think I should have I want you to feel free to tell me what you would like to have done.

When I made the race two years ago, I promised to be as economical as I could, bearing in mind the onward progress of our county and the condition of our county funds. For your information I will say that 24% of the road money for 1937 was spent in Precinct 1.

During my term of office we have not been able to use any of the road tax money because your road tax money is being used to pay off script warrants. We have had to maintain registration fund.

Dickens County has on deposit about \$50,000 but only a small part of it is available for road purposes.

During the last campaign the Delinquent tax collector question seemed to be an issue. I will be glad to talk with you about the matter and explain the circumstances under which I had to work.

Last year Mr. Hutchison agreed with the court to take a one year extension on his old contracts and give the people one year longer to pay their delinquent taxes. In doing this Mr. Hutchison did not receive any additional taxes to collect and will not receive any more commission than the original contract called for.

I did not get to start grading roads this year until about May 1st, because the people wanted to lease the equipment for terracing.

I will be able to get over every road in Precinct 1 by the last of September and have them in good shape to move a crop.

Please take in consideration I thought you wanted a business administration and that is what I have earnestly tried to give you.

If elected I will continue to try to get as much for the county dollar as I would for my own dollar. I have tried to be fair to the county as a whole to my precinct, and to each separate community.

Thanking you for your past favors and kind consideration. I would like to serve you another term as your commissioner.

A PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT H. J. R. No. 20

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.
