Will the U. S. Enter the War

Watch for this one.

It comes in a motion picture some of these days and the title is "Nostradamus."

Michel Nostradamus was a French astrologer who lived 1503 to 1568.

His prophecies on the happenings of the centuries which followed his time are something beyond understanding and when this great picture comes to town, don't miss it. Nostradamus predicted the world war of 1914 and its outcome. He predicted the war now in progress and his prophecies foresee its end and the outcome . . . the latter I won't reveal because that would destroy a major portion of the interest in his work.

Nostradamus believed and he proved to a major extent, that it is not hard to foretell what is to take place. His prophecies were not based upon gazings into a crystal ball, nor upon mysterious sources. He used mathematical formulae based upon his knowledge of astrology. And his works, yet preserved in the hidden archives of the British Museum, are the basis for this marvelous picture.

While there are those who will appreciate the picture as war propaganda aimed at urging the United States into the European conflict, and while the picture may have certain designs at making the U. S. war-conscious, it is nevertheless a stern reminder that the destiny of the world runs in cycles. And we are reminded by world events of the past quarter century that there is no such thing as strict isolation for us.

There are many who will scoff at prophets, but into the lives of each of us, at some time, there has come some contact with a strange incident that borders upon the super-natural. I believe to some people there come strange premonitions . . . premonitions of a prophetic nature that become actualities. We all realize that some people are more far-sighted than others. We know some are able to see down the road to the future farther than the rest of us. That faculty is one of the attributes of those men who are what we know as the successes in life, from a material standpoint.

Then, why is it not reasonable to believe that some possess to a greater extent the faculty of seeing into the future; the ability to foresee what is going to happen.

Nostradamus based his prophecies upon his mathematical calculations as they pertained to astrology. These undoubtedly were bolstered by ability to see the result upon the future of nations and peoples.

I saw only the preview of this picture and I believe it will prove one of the most interesting pictures we have seen in many a moon.

This is not a plug for the theatre business. It needs no plugging as most of you will know. All you want to know is what picture is on and what time the next show begins. But watch for "Nostradamus." I don't think you will be disappointed.

Army Worms Damaging Small Grains

A severe outbreak of the army worm on small grain has been reported in some of our neighboring counties. This worm varies in color from a blue-gray to a light brown color and stays near the base of the plant during the day time. At night it crawls up the plant and feeds upon the grain. This worm is capable of doing much damage to the grain at this time.

We have been authorized to use Federal grasshopper bait material in controlling these worms. We have a small supply on hand in the county and have access to more if we need it. Should you find these worms in your wheat notify Mack Woodrum, the local county agent in order that he may arrange for more bait material.

Vote on Wheat Marketing Quota May 31

Wheat producers in Dickens County will vote on the wheat marketing quota Saturday, May 29, which will be Saturday of next week. Voting boxes will be at Spur in the Bank, McAdoo at the school building, Dickens at the Court House, Afton at the Patton Springs school building, Croton at the Community House.

All wheat farmers whose seeded acres normal production amounts to 200 bushels or more, will be entitled to vote in this election. That is to say that if a farmer plants 30 acres and has a normal production of seven bushels, that would amount to 210 bushels, which entitles him to vote. But 30 acres at a normal production of six bushels would not reach the amount eligible to vote.

Without marketing quotas no wheat loans will be made and no penalties collected from non-cooperators. Also, with a quota the cooperator may sell or put it under a loan all wheat he may produce on his allotted acres. Without a quota parity payments stand a chance to be reduced since there is a big carryover and a large production coming up.
