According to reports released by O. L. Kelley, chairman of Dickens County draft board, there are about two hundred young men from Dickens County now serving with the armed forces of the United States. More than likely these boys are scattered in the four corners of the earth. During the past three weeks the local draft board has been in session on regular and called meetings reclassifying men who previously has been classified in 1B, 2A, 2B, 3A, single men, 4A, and 4F. Classification of all these men will probably be completed by Wednesday, January 28. Classification regulations are not as lenient now as they were before war was declared. Each individual is classified according to information filed by the registrant and other that might be directly concerned with the registrant. No group may be deferred as a group. Every individual case must be decided according to the information furnished. Any registrant may appeal from the decision of the local board, but only information filed with the local board will be considered by the appeals board, therefore it is very necessary that every registrant furnish complete and accurate information to his local board. The local board will cooperate with any individual who desired to appeal from the decision of the local board. According to records of the local board office no appeals have been made.

### Called Into Service

A message received from Mrs. E. J. Cowan, of Lubbock, the first of the week stated her son, James Henry Cowan had been called into the Service of the United States Army. He has been stationed at Ingleside for several months doing engineering work. He is a graduate of the school of Engineering at the Texas Technological College and has taken post graduate work at the University of Texas. He stated he did not know where he will be stationed.

**Lesson 13—Future, Imperfect and Preterite Tenses**  
Buenos Días, Señoras, y Señoritas, Niños y Niñas.

In our last lesson we studied about the changes in time for the action words like hablar, comer, vivir, jugar, poder, tener, venir, and the other verbs. We saw how it was necessary to change a word from the present time or tense to the past when we spoke of a past action like Yo hablo hoy and Yo hablabla ayer, or Nosotros comemos en el café and Nosotros comiamos en el café antes (before). We must remember that the ending "ba" is used for the first conjugation or group of words and the ending "ia" for the second and third.

In addition to the present and past times of verbs, we also have the future. In English we use the word "shall" or "will" to indicate the future. In Spanish we always indicate time by the endings. The future time is the most regular and, consequently, the easiest to learn. The changes are the same for all verbs no matter to what conjugation or group they may belong, whether they are regular or irregular. The exceptions are very, very few. For the future we add the letter "e" when we say "yo" like Yo hablaré, I shall speak; Yo comeré, I shall eat, and Yo viviré, You will live. For "Nosotros" (we), the ending is "emos"; so we have Nosotros hablaremos, We shall speak, Nosotros comeremos, Nosotros etc.

In English when we speak of the past time we have two forms. We may say "I was speaking yesterday", or "I spoke yesterday". We have the two forms "was speaking" and "spoke". In Spanish we also have these two forms. The one we have already learned is where we say in English "was speaking". It is called imperfect because the action is not complete; the other is the preterite because it is one single, complete action. The preterite is not very difficult to learn because the first person plural, where we say "we" or in Spanish "nosotros", is always the same as the present which we have already learned. We can say "Nosotros hablamos hoy" or "Nosotros hablamos ayer." Vivir is the same; we can say "Nosotros vivimos ahora (now) or "Nosotros vivimos en San Antonio el año pasado (the past year.) This tense is also rather easy because the endings for the first and second persons are very regularly observed. For the first conjugation we use the letter "e" with an accent like "hablé", I spoke, "compré, I bought "llevé", I took (carried). For comer and vivir, we use the letter "i", also with an accent like "comí", I ate, "viví", I lived. There are some that are irregular. For example, the preterite of venir is "vine," for tener, it is "tuve", but the exceptions are few. When we come to the usted form, we use the ending "o", for verbs of the first group like hablar and "io" for the second and third groups like comer and vivir, both with the accent on the "o". You spoke is Usted habló, You ate Usted comió, and you lived, Usted vivió.

I am going to give you now a few sentences to learn. Go over them many times and change them from the present time to the past and also from the form of question to answer or vice versa.

1. Cuando el señor vivía en San Antonio, hablaba, mucho español.
2. ¿Tiene usted libros en la casa?
3. ¿Puede usted hablar español bien?
4. Me gusta mucho comprar libros en español porque me gusta mucho estudiar el idioma (the language).
5. ¿Cuándo viene usted a visitar la ciudad de Corpus Christi?
