Money Received on **Road Bonds**

E. H. Boedeker, County Judge, reported the last of the week that quite a nice little sum of money was received from the State Highway Department on bond refunding for Dickens County. The last Legislature passed a bill which practically cut the bond refunding amount for Dickens County to about half its original amount. However, the amount received last week which was \$1,433.25 was in addition to the regular amount. This was to apply on refunding the bonds voted by the county to build what is now highway No. 70 (formerly 18) and No. 80 (formerly 24) The state took over these highways and used the road beds built by bonds voted by the county back in 1917.

The Senate passed a bill to eliminate all of the refunding act, but the House stood pat and a compromise was made whereby about half of the first funds are now being paid to the counties having road bonds prior to the year 1939. It meant a loss to Dickens County of about \$6,000.00.

School Children to **Model Airplanes**

Texas school children today receivcivilian defense.

Dr. L. A. Woods, State Superintendent of Schools, said the request came from the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics through the U.S. Office of Education, with notation that the planes be built to scale in order to make them adaptable for such military training purposes as reocgnitation, range estimation, and determination of cones of fire.

The project involves the construcion of approximately 50 types of planes, including those of the United Nation and of the Axis countries, The models are to be constructed according to plans and specifications to e furnished by the Bureau of Aeronautics. The smallest model will have a wing span of 5 1-2 inches, the largest 25 inches, while the majority of the models will have less than a 12inch wing span. Models will be constructed of wood such as white pine, poplar and bass.



THE average price increase for a moderate cost adequate diet for a family of four, for one week, has increased 24 per cent in the past year, according to the National Dairy Council. The foods chosen were based on dietary standards set up by the Bureau of Home Economics, United States Department of Agriculture. The prices were from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, United States Department of Labor, Washington, D. C.

Average price increases of each the latest retail prices in 51 cities compared to the same period of the previous year. The smallest price increase, 9 per cent, was for flour and cereals. Milk was the next smallest with an increase of only 15 per cent. The price increase for fats varied from 16 to 63 per cent with an average of 32 per cent. Among all fats butter with 16 per cent showed the lowest increase.





Many farmers will be liable for filing income tax returns and payyear. The term "farmers" includes livestock raisers, fruit and truck

Farmers may maintain their records and file their returns of income on accounting. A consistent method must however, be employed. If a cash basis quired to be filled out and filed in conjunction with Form 1040.

than those constituiting capital expenand raising livestock (except the value of farm produce grown upon the farm of seed, minor repairs to farm buildings (other than the dwelling of the farmer); small tools used up in the course of a year or two; fuel and oil used for farm work; repairs and maintenance of farm machinery; hired laborers and hired machines, and cost of commercial fertilizers the benefit of which is of short duration.

The cost of farm machinery, equipment and farm buildings; amounts ex pended in the development of farms orchards and ranches, as well as the amounts expended in the restoration over a period of years, are capital expenditures.

Losses incurred in the operation of farms as business enterprises are deductible from gross income. If livestock has been purchased for any purpose, and afterwards dies from dis ease, exposure of injury, or is killed by order of the authorities of State or the United States, the actua purchase price of such livestock, less any depreciation allowable as a deduction in respect of such perished livestock, may be deducted as a loss in the loss is not compensated for by insurance or otherwise.





When we say "nosotros", we add the "mos" like "Nosotros hablemos", "Nosotros comamos", and "Nosotros vivamos."



West Texas Utilities Organizes Employees

Nearly a thousand West Texas Utilities Company employees in 166 dollars—as well as kilowatts.

Results of a survey were announced by District Manager K. K. Francis cent of all W. T. Uers. already are buying bonds and stamps.

The company recently announced purchase of \$50,000 in U.S. defense bonds subscribed on 2 pro rata basis in the various communities it serves.

It also has announced that no payroll deductions would be made since it appeared unnecessary inasmuch as such a large percentage of employees had made their plans to buy bonds and stamps and that the organization would be far above the average in "real support" of the defense program in all the communities served.

The announcement was accompanied by a rush to selling agenices to "catch up" on bond unrchases. One employee, it was learned, drew savings of \$375 from the bank, investing the entire amount in the bonds.

"Including the loyal support of the communities are getting organized to men and women of our organization, help lick the Japs and the Germs with and the \$50,000 subscription by the company, we are indeed proud of the part taken by our West Texas Utilities in the defense program and challenge in which it was learned that 79 per any similar institution, even a fraction of its size, to surpass our record," Mr. Francis said.


