Wheat Farmers to **Vote on Wheat Quotas Saturday**

"We have enough wheat in sight another kernel," the chairman said.

In national referendum, Saturday, May 2, wheat farmers will go to the this year's crop. Last year the nawhile Dickens county wheat farmers approved quotas by 99.3 percent.

"We are in desparate need of meat, foods and, instead add to our already her darkest hour of need," he said.

Total supply of wheat on July 1, 1942, is estimated at 1,423-million bushels of which 630-million bushels represents present carryover, while the 1942 crop is estimated at 793-million bushels.

"If we continue to raise the things we don't need and fail to raise the things we do need, we'll be doing farming as usual and that sort of farming went with Pearl Harbor," Mr. Rose said.

Purpose of wheat marketing quotas is to divide a limited market equally production from their crops, their among wheat producers. Marketing poultry, their dairy products and quotas also make possible more efficient use of transportation and storage facilities.



The half-pound per person, per week which will be allowed after May 5 will give every person the generous amount of one cup or 16 tablespoons of sugar a week. If you have been wondering just how you can stretch that cupfull out to make it last the longest you might try these suggestions made by Fae Bass, County Home Demonstration Agent. Fruits are one of the best natural sources of sugar. Use them often; and if they are cooked. they taste sweeter served hot than cold.

Honey is another of nature's sweeteners. Since honey gives approximately the same sweetness as sugar the sam eamount can be used to ge the desired sweetness. Use approxicup of honey in baked products such as cakes or quick breads. In substituting honey for sugar, reduce the liquid 1-4 cup for each cup of honey

using honey? HONEY CUSTARD

3 eggs 1-4 t nutmeg

2 c milk

1-4 c honey.

Heat the milk. Beat eggs lightly. Add honey and salt to eggs and mix. Add hot milk gradually to egg mixture, stirring constantly. Finish as custard pie, boiled custard or baked 1 egg beaten custard.
