

Indications Point To Schools Nationwide Returning To Basics

Editor's Note: This is the first of two articles on current changes in American public schools. The following examines the trend toward more traditionalism in teaching techniques.

The district's trustees today are hearing the continuation of the evaluation of the multi-aged open area pilot program which features team teaching in an open area classroom.

Bryant W. Saxon, director of program development and research, said while administrators favor team teaching in open area classrooms, they do not sanction "huge expanses of space without any walls at all" which some schools utilize in an open area approach.

He asserts the district places a high priority on youngsters' learning the "three R's" even within the multi-aged framework which proponents tout as offering the child freedom of choice in what he studies.

Saxon said, however, the choices available to the child are of the teacher's chosing and "conform to the teaching of the basic skills that are known to be needed by the youngster."

On the subject of permissive education, he said, "We're as much against it as anybody could be."

Open classrooms and the new math have lost some of their appeal. Federal grants have switched from arts programs to reading. In some communities, parents are demanding - and

getting - alternative schools that stress educational basics: report cards and discipline.

"We took for granted that the results were going to be there if we changed," said Robert Wheeler, head of the Bureau of School Systems in the federal Office of Education. "It turns out that some of the innovations were not productive."

Some were productive. The one most frequently cited now by educators is the idea of providing a variety of educational alternatives for pupils and their

Interviews with dozens of educators - teachers, administrators, association officers and state and federal officials - also indicated no widespread retreat from the goal of better meeting the individual learning needs of children. It was the aim of much of the recent innovation.

But the signs of adjustment are many:

- Partitions were put up last year in the Forest Edge Elementary School in Reston, Va., an "open space" school built in 1971. The same thing was done in New Ipswich, N.H., and team teaching was dropped as well.

Enthusiasm has waned for the open classroom and its accent on allowing children to follow their learning instincts with little interference from teachers and curriculum goals. - There is a renewed stress

on computational arithmetic the old math - in elementary schools across the country. The new math and its emphasis on theory are being left to junior and senior high schools in many communities.

There is also an increasing emphasis on composition. grammar and spelling in many schools, a change that reflects, in part, the vocal complaints of college professors and admissions officers that many students cannot write English.







Spread an old sheet (or piece of fabric) wrong side up on the floor. On top of this, place your ironing board top side down. With chalk, mark around the board onto the fabric. Remove ironing board.

Measure out from this chalk outline about six inches. Make a second chalk outline. Cut on this line. Turn under a one-inch hem around raw edge and machine stitch in place, leaving small opening. Insert either a heavy drawstring or elastic. And — behold! — a new ironing board cover for pennies.





One readily can see the awkward position in which this places a countv and its officials. It is one of those "have not" situations which often lead to a "deprived" or "underprivileged" complex which afflicts



Take Close Look At Third Party Chances

WASHINGTON (KFS)-Only the coming months and years can tell us whether Washington's Feb. 13 to 16 Conservative Political Action Conference actually will lead to the formation of a new national conservative party. If the conference turned up considerable new party sentiment, it also turned up some good reasons to go slow.

Before elaborating, I must state that attended the conference, joining conservative strategist F. Clifton White on a panel to consider "The Republican Party: Does it have a future?" The moderator characterized our mild disagreement in funereal terms as a discussion "between those who think the Republican Party is dying and those who think it is dead," but notwithstanding bleak GOP prospects, many conservative leaders believe that the time is ripe for a new party. So do I.

For one thing, there is a vital question of timing. Many conservatives of both parties are already unhappy, angered by the Ford administration's delegation of domestic planning to Nelson Rockefeller, embittered by the left-liberal palace coup in Congress, and fearful of the White House-Congressional trend toward record spending and budget

But if they are mad now, their anger will triple by autumn if we have 10 per cent unemployment, chaotic left-liberal control of Congress and clearcut Rockefeller Kevin P.

domination of White House policymaking (one hardly can exaggerate visceral rightwing hostility to Rockefeller). Then the situation could really begin to ripen for an essential broad-based bipartisan movement into a new party. On the other hand, if the economy is regaining strength, the third party impetus will fade-at least for 1976. It seems wise to wait six to eight months.

Secondly, conservatives face impor-tant internal divisions on economic policy appeal to the neoconservative constituency of South, West and blue-collar areas. These voters, who constitute an increasing bloc of self-identified "conservatives" in current polls, are conservative on taxation and spending matters, but favorable towards "activist" economics that safeguard the jobs and spending power of the average American. In ideological terms, neo-conservatives already are urging traditionalists to modify free-market and laissez-faire theory that is partly obsolescent in an economy where federal, state and local government spending accounts for 35 to 40 per cent of the Gross National Product. And in practical terms, old line conservative economies won't sell in a slumping

Left to themselves, many of the conservatives who gathered in Washington would be all too willing to play McGoverns of the Right-to wrap themselves in divisive fringe issues. Evidence of this emerged in the final hours of the Feb. 13 to 16 conference when the assembled ideologies passed resolutions opposing the Equal Bights Amendment, favoring 'right to life" and calling for the reestablishment of the House Internal Security Committee. Although many delegates realized that an abortion stand ould be counterproductive - University of Missouri economist Thomas Ireland circulated an excellent paper arguing that such divisive collateral issues could actually abort the success of any new third party!-the convention acted anyway. Positions of this sort dangerously narrow the potential "conservative"

Lastly, third-party planning is dangerously focused on Ronald Reagan, whose friends say he prefers the GOP primary route. This could change, because despite the optimism of Reagan's strategists, there is no evidence that he can win 1976 GOP primaries. On the contrary, polls show that Gerald Ford definitely is stronger; and in many Northern states, even Nelson Rockefeller runs ahead of Reagan. Because Ford and Rockefeller are incumbents, the situation has changed from 1973, when Reagan was the rank and file GOP favorite. Even so, Reagan may not be willing to face the possibility that his future might lie in a third party of fusion with George

For all these reasons, formation of a third party will not be easy. While I think it eventually will come, there probably will be a number of false starts and miscarriages before that day arrives.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

WASHINGTON - It now can be revealed that CIA agents have trained the elite units which guard favored foreign monarchs, premiers and dictators.

This has given the CIA contacts close to the seat of power, according to our sources, in such countries as Ethiopia, Indonesia, Jordan, Laos, Somalia, South Korea, South Vietnam and Thailand.

The CIA has been training palace guards for more than two decades. In the process, the CIA has quietly developed some bodyguards into informants and used others to influence the policy-

Thailand is typical. The crack, 60man protective force, which guards King Bhumibol Adulyadej and Queen Sirikit, is directed by a trusted CIA trainee. He is Lt. Gen. Vitoon Yasawad, who also led the CIA's irregulars in Laos until the 1973 ceasefire.

"Whoever controls the palace guard in Thailand, controls the crown," one Asia-wise, ex-CIA operative told us. He claimed the CIA has run the palace guard in Bangkok since the 1950s.

Once, high government officials escaped one of Thailand's periodic coups and sought sanctuary in the basement of a CIA agent, our sources recall.

Fletcher Prouty, a former Air Force officer who had been attached to the CIA. described how the CIA saved former Prime Minister Sirit Thanarat in an even more dashing exploit. The prime minister was recuperating in a Tokyo hospital, Prouty told us, when a coup began to develop back in Bangkok.

The CIA rushed the ailing field marshal home in a U. S. military plane and the CIA-trained bodyguards responded with such a bristling display of efficiency that the coup was averted.

Yasawad's present protective force is

armed with Thai-made, German designed rapid-fire rifles and are skilled at handling explosives.

They were trained not far from the big U. S. base at Korat, which became a CIA subcenter during the Vietnam War and is still a major intelligence outpost.

Yasawad has acknowledged only the existence of his special 60-man protective force, which is called SWATS for Special Weapons and Tactics. He has denied any CIA connection with his elite pricious" and "arbitrary.

On Capitol Hill, Speaker Carl Albert has warned his colleagues privately that the United States must launch an emergency program to develop energy on the scale of the Manhattan Project which developed the atomic bomb. But he has been unable to persuade the various House committees, which have jurisdiction over the various phases of the en-

ergy problem, to work together for a common solution. The House, meanwhile, ttok a 10-day holiday and the Senate wants to put off action on the President's energy package for three months.

Ford: Wooing The Republican Left!

WASHINGTON - In his frantic quest for enough senators to save the oil import tax, President Ford has totally reversed the old Nixon "hardcore" legislative strategy — with early results causing conservative Republicans to mutter I told you so. To President Nixon, liberal

Republicans were untouchables, scarcely more respectable than newsmen and not to be treated with deference. But President Ford last week invited 13 liberal Republican senators belonging to the Wednesday Group for dinner - a White House first. That repudiated Nixon's strategy of

building a bipartisan "Hardcore" in Congress and neglecting liberals of both parties. Facing far worse congressional problems than Nixon ever encountered, Mr. Ford seeks support anywhere he can find it. Besides he has always attempted to gloss over ideological differences among Republicans.

So, camaraderie prevailed for over three hours that night with liberal Republican senators at Mr. Ford's dinner table even though most oppose his oil import tax. Sen. Charles Percy of Illinois, a foremost untouchable of Nixon days, opened the discussion by expressing satisfaction in a President who would seek opinions not in tune with his own.

Such opinions were quickly offered. With Sen. Jacob Javits of New York



leading the way, Eastern senators complained that the import tax impact on heating oil prices was unfair to their region. The President replied he intended to "tilt" the impact - more on gasoline, less on heating fuel. Javits and the other Easterners commended Mr. Ford's flexibility (though Sen. Ted Stevens of Alaska interjected that to much "tilt" on gasoline would lose his present sup-

The dinner encouraged the White House to hope that, though it believed only five of the 13 Wednesdayers opposed the Democratic bill suspending the Ford import tax, the number of "no" votes had been expanded. In fact, only four of the Wednesdayers - one less than expected - voted against it the next

Almost as disappointing was only one Southern Democrat, Sen. Russell Long of Louisiana, opposing the tariff suspension. At a White House breakfast for Southern senators, Sen. John B. McClellan of Arkansas sounded so helpful

would vote against the bill and perhaps a Republican leader but —to the anguish bring other Southerners along with him. They were wrong. To conservative Republicans, the

overwhelming Senate defeat establishes Mr. Ford's folly. Their argument: in wooing liberal Republicans, the President has sought the unattainable while alienating attainable Dixiecrats.

In truth, however, Mr. Ford lacks the rapport with old line Southerners enjoyed by Nixon. Thus, he can never command similar loyalty. Moreover, the White House still is seeking additional Wednesday Group support on the crucial vote to sustain Mr. Ford's veto of the import suspension bill. His strategists hope for turn-arounds by Maryland's two senators, Charles Mathias and J. Glenn Beall, Javits himself and perhaps other Wednesdayers once Mr. Ford spells out his "tilt" away from higher-priced heating fuel.

Whatever happens to the oil tariff, the Ford White House intends to continue treating the liberals as bona fide Republicans believing the policy eventually will pay dividends. So, Secretary of State Henry Kissinger will go to Capitol Hill this week for a private luncheon with the Wednesday groups of both the House and Senate. Like last Tuesday night's dinner, that never could have happened in the Nixon era.

Despite Ron Ziegler's assurances that Richard M. Nixon is through with politics, the former President recently

that presidential aides were sure he showed he not only regards himself as of some Republican politicians -apparently intends to play that role.

On Jan. 28, five days after Rep. John Jarman of Oklahoma switched from Democratic to Republican, he received a telephone call (through the White House switchboard, according to Jarman's office) from Nixon in San Clemente. Nixon commended Jarman's conversion, welcomed him into the Republican party and wished him well there.

Jarman seemed proud to get the call. But as he told the story around the Republican cloakroom, some of his new colleagues winced. Believing the Republican label will be tough enough to run on in 1976, they dread further identification of it with the tragically disgraced former President.
