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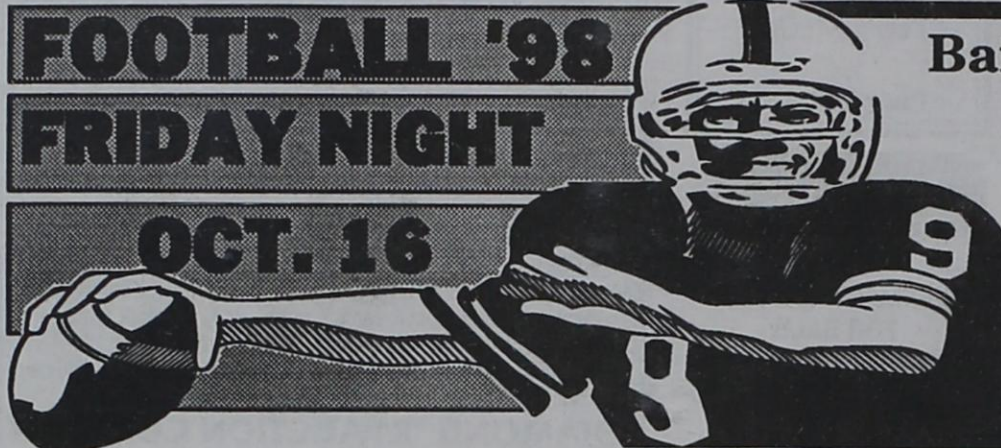

Baird Bears Win First District Game Over Miles Bulldogs, 24-14

The Baird Bears sent the Miles Bulldogs to the pound when they defeated them in the first district contest of the 1998 season.

Miles won the coin toss and the Bulldogs elected to receive. With great coverage by the Bears' kick-off team and a good kick by Ryon Vestal, the ball was downed at the 3 yd. line. The Bears' defense, consisting of Jeremy Riney, Dusty Barron, Ryon Vestal, Lee Harle, Justin Rivera, Jason Gomez, Robert Mendez, Coleman Vestal, Junior Gomez, John Horner, Logan Russell, Clay Smith, and Kyle Hogue, was holding Miles until 3rd and 9

yd. play, when the Bulldogs broke with a long run. Dusty Barron made a touchdown saving tackle and caused a fumble that was recovered by Logan Russell.

Bears took over on the Miles' 40 yd. line. With great blocking by J.J. Carrillo, Ty Wilson, Dustin Watson, Jonathan Parr, Coleman Vestal, and good downfield blocking by receivers Logan Russell and Jeremy Gonzales, Jeremy Riney broke a run down to the 12 yd. line on the first down. It then took 4 plays for the Bears to get in the endzone with a 2 yd. run by Lee Harle. Score: 6-0, PAT failed.

Baird's 2nd kick-off resulted in great coverage by the kick-off team, with Robert Mendez making the tackle at the Miles' 12 yd. line. Neither the Bulldogs nor the Bears could generate much defense as they traded punts, and after another Miles punt, which netted only 24 yds., the Bears took over on the Bulldogs' 38 yd. line. The Bears marched to the 15 yd. line, where on 3rd down and 5 Lee Harle hit Jeremy Gonzales on a slant pattern for 1st and goal when Gonzales was tackled at the 2 yd. line. It took only 1 play

as Jeremy Riney scored, thanks to great blocking by Carrillo and Wilson, to make it 12-0 Baird. The Bears made the 2 point conversion on a Lee Harle keeper, making it 14-0 Bears.

Starting the 2nd quarter, both teams traded punts as both defenses stiffened up. On Baird's 2nd punt, the Bulldogs took over on their own 44 yd. line and drove 56 yds. on 8 plays to make the 14-7 Bears.

The Bears couldn't muster a steady drive and were forced to punt. The Bulldogs then drove to the Bears' 15 yd. line, but the Bears' defense stiffened and the Bulldogs turned the ball over on downs. With 1:50 to play in the 2nd quarter, the Bears were driving at midfield, but a Baird fumble gave the Bulldogs the ball with 1:01 left in the half. Miles then broke a long run down to the Baird 5 yd. line. The Baird defense looked as if it was holding its own as they pushed the Bulldogs back to the 10 yd. line, but on 3rd and 10 yds. to go, they completed a pass in the endzone to make it 14-13. The PAT was good, bringing the score to 14-14 at half time. The 2nd half kick-

off was received by the Bears, but 3 plays and out forced them to punt. The Bulldogs fumbled on the 1st play, and the Bears recovered on the Miles' 30 yd. line. Bears couldn't convert a touchdown, but settled for a 35 yd. field goal by Ryon Vestal. Score: 17-14 Baird.

The Bears then kicked off to the Bulldogs where they pinned the 'Dogs to their own 12 yd. line. Bulldogs went 3 plays and out as the 3rd quarter was winding down. The Bears took the punt at midfield. Fine blocking by the offensive line and downfield blocking by the Baird receivers allowed Justin Rivera to race 53 yds. for a touchdown on the 2nd play of the 4th quarter, carrying 2 Miles' defenders with him into the endzone. The PAT was good. 24-14 Baird.

On the first offensive play of the next series, the Bulldogs went to the air, but the pass was picked off by Logan Russell at the Bears' 35 yd. line. As the Bears were leading 24-14, they settled in to grind it out on the ground and eat up some clock, but they were forced to punt.

The Bulldogs again went to the air, getting (Continued on Back)

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Texas Farm Bureau Friends Of AG-FUND Endorse Stenholm

The Texas Farm Bureau Friends of Agriculture Fund (AG-FUND), Inc. has endorsed the re-election of District 17 U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford) in the November 3 general election.

"Political candidates are evaluated on a local level, with county Farm Bureau committees within the districts making recommendations for AGFUND endorsement," TFB and AGFUND President Bob Stallman, said. "Congressman Stenholm's commitment to agriculture has won him the support of AG-FUND."

Stenholm's experience as a cotton farmer and livestock producer has given him special insight into issues facing Texas farmers and ranchers. That, combined with bachelor's and master's degrees in agriculture education from Texas Tech University, has made him an effective member of the House Agriculture Committee since 1979. During the 105th Congress, Rep. Stenholm served as ranking member of the fall

Agriculture Committee.

In 1980, Stenholm founded the Conservative Democratic Forum, called "Boll Weevils." Stenholm co-chairs the budget committee of the Forum's successors, known as "Blue Dogs," which was in the vanguard of the movement to balance the federal budget and restate the Consumer Price Index to accurately reflect inflation.

AGFUND is Texas Farm Bureau's political action fund. It is a legal entity separate from the Texas Farm Bureau and may endorse and contribute financially to political candidates. AGFUND is funded only by voluntary contributions from TFB members.



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School Bus Safety: It's Important To Every Texan

For 1.3 million Texas school children, the day ends and begins with a trip on a school bus. That translates to more than 1.7 million miles Texas children log on school buses every day of the school year. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) says that school buses are the safest form of highway transportation, and that point will be brought home later this month as the nation and Texas observe School Bus Safety Week October 18-24.

According to NHTSA, the greatest risk these children face is not while they ride on the bus, but as they board or leave it. That should be a wake

up call to everyone, particularly motorists, that our children's lives are in our hands.

How many times has it happened? A school bus, with red lights flashing, is waiting for a child to board or exit. A driver hurries past. That's clearly against the law, but it happens too frequently.

We've all heard the excuses: "I was late for work." "It's inconvenient." "I didn't know I had to stop." "Nobody else stopped. Why should I?"

Let's look at these excuses for a moment. Being late for work is certainly a hassle, but you'll be even later when the police stop to ticket you for not yielding to a school bus. And while it's true, traffic flows better when there are fewer interruptions, the inconvenience of stopping for a bus waiting for a child to board or leave is worth the life it will save.

Since it's possible some Texans may not be up on the law, here it is in a nutshell. From either direction, if you

approach a school bus with flashing red lights, you must stop and not pass until the bus has started moving, the bus driver signals you to pass or the red lights are no longer flashing. The law doesn't require drivers to stop if the school bus is on a different roadway.

And as for the excuse that others don't observe the law, that's probably not a good thing to tell a police officer. A ticket is still in your future.

At the Texas Department of Transportation, we invest in making our transportation system safe. That's why we work with school districts and neighborhoods to con-

trol traffic around and near schools. We install school crossing signs, reduced speed zone signs, school bus loading signs and provide school bus driver training programs. We believe helping protect our school children is part of our mission.

But we can't do it alone. Just by following some simple rules, drivers, parents, teachers, even children themselves, can make school bus safety a priority.

Driver should remember to:

- Slow down. Always follow the speed limit when traveling through neighborhoods and school zones.

- Be attentive. Watch for children walking in the street or bicy-

cling to school. And be cautious of children playing and congregating near bus stops.

- Be alert. Children arriving late for the bus may dart into the street without looking for traffic.

Parents, teachers and children must also accept responsibility for ensuring school bus safety. Children should be taught to:

- Be on time for the school bus and wait for it in a safe place, away from traffic.

- Board the school single file. No shoving or pushing allowed.

- Stay seated while the school bus is in motion, and keep their hands, arm and heads inside the bus at all times.

Children should also be warned to stay out of the school bus danger zones. Those are the areas where it is difficult for the driver to see, usually 10 feet in front of, around and behind the bus. Teach children to walk away from the bus after leaving, and cross only at intersections when it's permissible.

Keeping our school children safe isn't

hard, but it requires everyone because school zone safety is everybody's responsibility.

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
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Baird '48 Study Club
