Police, FBI uncover few clues in bank robbery

The possibility of capturing the bandit who got away with \$7,000 in bundled cash taken in the noon-time robbery Tuesday of the Western State Bank here appeared bleak today, Midland police Det. Capt. Sid Corley said this morning.

An unobtrusive customer, a man in his mid- to late 20s, strolled into the bank shortly after noon Tuesday, and took his place in line at teller's win-

dow No. 4 manned by an unwary he man did not openly wield a Laura Glass.

Moments later, the man unhurriedly left the bank lobby with 10 bundles of \$10, \$20 and \$50 bills in a white paper sack.

"I don't want to hurt anybody don't make me use it," reportedly told Mrs. Glass after telling her he was armed and wanted large bills from her teller window.

Mrs. Glass, 25, later told police that

"I haven't the faintest idea why he picked that particular teller," bank President Bill Mewhorter told reporters in one one of several press briefings he held in the two hours following the robbery.

The robbery is possibly the first in Midland's banking history, Maj. Wayne Gideon, assistant police chief,

The robber had already left the bank before the silent alarm was triggered.

A teller, identified as Reba Jo Waters, working the bank's enclosed drive-in window sighted the hold-up man driving off from the bank's parking lot in a late model green sedan, and caught the last three digits of the car's rear license tag. The tag's letters were blocked by the car's

But some clues, some apparent major ones, cropped up that afternoon while the Department of Public Safety troopers were setting up roadblocks along the Andrews Highway, other roadways in Midland and in Odessa. The bank is located at 1030 Andrews Hwy.

Police found an abandoned stolen sedan, matching the description of the get-away car, behind White's Auto

Store at the Village shopping center two hours after the robbery.

Acting on a tip, the police found a smouldering mass of clothing inside a large culvert at Wall and Midkiff

Police said remains of the burnt clothing may match witnesses' description of the bandit with the brown wavy hair and who was fitted with platform shoes.

Tax cut bill sent to Ford

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate completed congressional action today on a bill, opposed by President Ford, that would extend this year's tax cuts for another six months.

A voice vote in the Senate sent the measure to the White House a few hours after the congressional compromise bill had been accepted in the House by voice vote.

The final congressional approval came after House Speaker Carl Albert said chances are "pretty good" Congress will override the President, who has said he will veto

Albert said he had no advance vote count, but told reporters: "I sense ... sitting up there in the chair ... that quite a few Republicans would like to be re-elected next year."

Shortly after Albert's comments, the House briefly debated the bill. which lacks a tie to a federal spending

ceiling that Ford insists upon. Just before final debate began the House, by 232 to 178, denied Republican leaders an opportunity to attach the spending ceiling to the sixmonth measure, previously approved by a Senate-House conference committee.

Americans may see their taxes increase on Jan. 1 unless the lawmakers can override a presidential veto.

'The issue now is whether taxpayers get a big tax increase in January." House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Al Ullman, D-Ore., said Tuesday.

A quick veto could return the bill to Congress in time for an override attempt before the year-end recess, expected to begin later this week.

In what amounted to a test vote on whether the anticipated veto can be sustained, the House refused Tuesday night to rush the bill through to the Senate under a legislative shortcut

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate today confirmed President Ford's nomination of Judge John Paul Stevens of Chicago to be a Supreme

Stevens will fill the vacancy left by the retirement of Justice William O. Douglas on Nov. 12 because of ill

Ford's first appointee to the nation's highest court. Stevens won the unanimous endorsement of the Senate Judiciary Committee after

three days of hearings. Stevens' confirmation by the Senate brings the Supreme Court to full strength for the start of its new term Jan. 12 when the constitutionality of the death penalty and the free pressfair trial controversy will be among

the major issues confronting it. The Supreme Court may hold a special session later this week for the swearing in of Stevens.

Tax 'Christmas tree' missing

WASHINGTON - A frustrated Senate Finance Committee approved about two dozen specialinterest tax and tariff bills Tuesday, but without much hope that most of them will pass this year.

The possible beneficiaries range from the makers of Alpo dog food to the Encyclopedia Brittanica, from young doctors in Wyoming to a ship-building company in Sturgeon Bay, Wis.

The commtitee's problem is that it lacked the usual Christmas tree to which to attach these ornaments - a veto-proof bill of the kind usually saved for December as a vehicle for specialinterest amendments as Congress rushes to

"All this year I've had a little bill and you've said, 'Wait until December,'" Sen. Bob Packwood (R-Ore.) complained to Finance Committee chairman Russell B. Long (D-La.), who had just told him his "little bill" might have to wait a little longer.

"It's not my fault the House doesn't send us more bills," Long replied in defense. The House

has to orginate all revenue bills. The committee finally decided that this year it

The first, a bill to continue through June 30, 1978, the present suspension of tariffs on spun silk yarn, will be festooned with just "noncontroversial" amendments likely to be passed without objection before Congress adjourns, probably Friday.

The other two, to which will be added those of Tuesday's amendments likely to arouse opposition, would speed certain federal payments to the Virgin Islands and would give tax-exempt status to bonds floated to build an Idaho dam whose electric power will be bought by the Idaho Power Company.

The committee approved the amendments by unrecorded voice vote, but in almost no case was there opposition. Among those adopted were: -A redefinition of the word "grain." as it is

used in one part of the tariff laws, so that it includes soybeans. Proposed by Sen Carl T. Curtis (R-Neb.). This would save Allen products Co. of Allentown, Pa., maker of Alpo, a little more than \$100,000 a year in duty on meat it imports mixed with grain. Imported meat with at least 6 per cent grain is duty-free.

-An amendment by Sen. Lloyd M. Bentsen would have three small Christmas trees instead (D-Tex.) that would settle a dispute between

Encyclopedia Brittanica and the Internal Revenue Service over how fast Brittanica can write off the research and other similar costs of preparing an encyclopedia. Under Bentsen's proposal, the IRS could insist on slow write-offs in the future, but could not challenge the fast write-offs Brittanica has taken in the past.

-Sen. Clifford P. Hansen's (R-Wyo.) amendment exempting from taxation the money his state gives medical students to pay their tuition if they promise to return to Wyoming to

-Another redefinition, this one by Sen. Gaylord Nelson (D-Wis.), under which the city of Sturgeon Bay could issue tax-free municipal bonds for construction of a drydock it would

lease to the Manitowoc Co., which builds ships. The law already allows the issuance of such tax-exempt bonds for "docks," and Nelson argued that docks should be construed to mean

dry docks as well as all other kinds. Long at first objected. "There's a great big difference between a dock and a dry dock." he said. "A dock, that's just a place you can bring a

ship up to." Then he relented, "I'm just trying to help everybody get what can be chieved," he said.

Sirica knocks down planned postage rate increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - The cost of mailing a letter will remain at 10 cents indefinitely under a court ruling that could mark the end of Saturday mail delivery.

U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica on Tuesday blocked postal rate increases scheduled for Dec. 28, including a rise in the first-class letter rate from 10 to 13 cents. Postal officials say they will appeal.

The decision is the latest in a series of blows to the financially troubled

Postal Service. The service, which had expected to lose \$1.4 billion this fiscal year even with the higher rates, says it will have a \$2.6-billion deficit without them.

Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar has said the Postal Service might not be able to afford continuation of Saturday delivery even with an increase in postal rates. He indicated further fiscal problems could lead to an early halt in Saturday

After Bailar made that statement he received a bill for workmen's compensation payments \$161 million higher than expected. That was before Sirica's decision.

The court decision will cost the Postal Service nearly \$7 million every day the higher rates are delayed, a spokesman said.

If Sirica's ruling is upheld on appeal, the Postal Service must once again file for new rates with the Postal Rate Commission. The new

rates could be put into effect no sooner than 90 days after the filing.

The Postal Service spokesman said a delay of 90 days would cost about \$600 million and accelerate the deficit rate, which already is at a record

In halting the Postal Service's planned Dec. 28 increase, Sirica ruled that required steps prior to a rate hike were not taken.

A 1970 law orders the Postal Service to get approval of its board of

governors for any new rates before filing for the increase with the Postal Rate Commission. The Postal Service only discussed the general outline of new rates with the governors, Sirica

"The board must have before it for its consideration at the time it approves the request, the specific rate and fees to be requested, together with supporting data and documentation." Sirica said.

In addition to invalidating the

higher postal rates, Sirica also struck down the Postal Service's plan to raise fees on Jan. 3 on a number of other services, including registered, insured, C.O.D. and certified mail, special delivery and money orders.

Sirica said the Postal Service failed to file with the rate commission for changes in the fees.

Quinlan investigation revealed

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) - A newly revealed investigation to determine if someone tried to kill Karen Anne Quinlan before she lapsed into a coma could complicate her parents' battle to allow her to die

COURT PAPERS filed Tuesday in Rock Island, Ill., disclosed that Miss Quinlan, 21, had a lump on the back of her head and several bruises on the lower part of her body the night she was

admitted to a hospital, last April 15. The New York Post, which broke the story before the court papers were filed, quoted unnamed sources as saying authorities also are trying to determine if a pimp and an "older woman" who worked at a massage parlor may

have somehow been involved. The investigators also want to know whether Miss Quinlan was illegally supplied with the barbiturates and tranquilizers reportedly found in her blood and in urine tests the night she was admitted to the hospital, the newspaper said.

A JUDGE last month rejected a request from the young woman's parents that would have allowed doctors to disconnect the machinery that has kept Miss Quinlan alive for eight months.

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Chairman steps down for awhile

UNITED NATIONS. Ambassador Ivor Richard gave up the chair of the U.N. Security-Council during debate on Iceland's complaint that two British vessels rammed an Icelandic ship in a dispute over fishing grounds.

A rule of the council provides that a president may take that action whenever he "deems that for the proper fulfilment of the responsibilities of the presidency he should not preside ...during the consideration of a particular question with which the member he represents is directly

Miss Quinlan's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Quinlan, argue the young woman is in a vegetative state, with no chance of recovery, and have taken the case to New Jersey's Supreme Court. A hearing is scheduled for Jan. 26.

William F. Hyland, New Jersey's attorney general, said he wants to see if foul play was involved in producing the coma.

"There was no apparent explanation for the existence of certain bruises on her body,' Hyland said. "The existence of the bruises created an additional responsibility for me to inquire further as to how and why they had been sustained or inflicted."

THE PAPERS, filed in Illinois in an attempt to secure the return of a witness, referred to possible violations of the law, including 'atrocious assault and battery and assault with intent to kill.

Despite the information in the court papers. however, Hyland said, "We don't know if we have a crime, we have no suspects, we don't

Should criminal charges result from the investigation, sources said, they would pose serious complications to the outcome of the parents' suit. A key question would be whether any assailant of Miss Quinlan would become subject to a murder charge if she were allowed to

IN A 1974 CASE in California, Andrew D. Lyons was convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the shooting death of Samuel Allen Jr. The defense argued that the shooting didn't cause Allen's death because the victim's heart beat until it was removed for a transplant.

A judge ruled, however, that Allen was dead at the time of the transplant, that he had died of brain damage caused by the gunshot.

THE INTERVENTION of outside forces would be even more of an issue in the Quinlan case since she is considered to be alive by all medical and legal standards. Whether a court would jeopardize an eventual defendant's case by allowing her to die is a tough legal question.

The court papers filed in Illinois, issued by a New Jersey judge, summoned William Zywot to testify before a grand jury investigating the newest aspect of the case.

Zywot, who was with Miss Quinlan the night she lapsed into a coma, said through his attorney Tuesday that he would appear in Trenton later

ZYWOT, 22, was with Miss Quinlan between April 3 and April 15, the court papers said. Authorities have said Miss Quinlan, Zywot and others occupied a bungalow in rural Sussex

County during that time. Zywot was one of three men with Miss Quinlan at a Sussex County bar hours before she fell into

Authorities investigating the case would not comment on the newspaper reports linking the

pimp and "older woman" to the case. The Post said the two were once employed at the Holiday Sauna, a massage parlor in Rockaway Township, N.J., that was razed last April after it was damaged in a fire that also destroyed a nearby store,

THE PIMP is the main target of the state's

investigation, the Post said. An attorney for Miss Quinlan's parents said he sees no relevance to an investigation into what may have caused the coma.

'Seven of the finest physicians in the country testified they ruled out a physical trauma causing the injury." said Paul W. Armstrong. who filed a brief Tuesday in state Supreme Court asserting the parents have a constitutional right to let their daughter die.

Armstrong said he and several doctors examined Miss Quinlan's hospital records, including a nurse's report describing the lump on her head and the bruises on her lower body. But nothing was found to indicate the coma was caused by a beating, he said.

DR. ROBERT MORSE, Miss Quinlan's neurologist at St. Clare's Hopital in Denville. testified at a week-long trial in Morristown that the exact cause of Karen's coma had not been determined.

He said the most likely cause of her brain damage was a lack of oxygen after respiratory failure. He said there were no signs of a head injury that could have caused the coma.

Morse said blood tests made at Newton Memorial Hospital indicated Miss Quinlan had ingested barbiturates and alcohol prior to lapsing into the coma. He said it could not be determined how much of each substance had been consumed or exactly when they had been

IT IS POSSIBLE, though there is no proof, that the mixture of drugs and alcohol induced the respiratory failure and coma, he said.

Nude mice may aid research on leprosy

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) - Nude mice-freaks of nature born without hair or thymus glands-may help scientists solve mysteries about leprosy, Dr. David Drutz of the University of Texas Health Science Center says.

Although Norwegian scientist Dr. Armauer Hansen isolated the leprosy bacteria 102 years ago, researchers have had little luck studying the

disease under laboratory conditions. The bacilli apparently cannot be grown on artificial surfaces and host model animals tested so far have been disappointing.

But Drutz said Tuesday, "The possibilities for research with the nude mouse are nothing less than astounding

It is the first time such mice have been used in leprosy research in this country, he said Drutz says the low tolerance for

disease of the mice might make them an ideal leprosy research model. "If someone sneezes, the mice die,

Nude mice are raised in isolated, germ-free colonies. 'As an animal model, the nude mouse looks enormously promising," Dr. Drutz said. "It's an immunological freak. It can't tell self from non-self, and ordinarily that's a lethal defect. Thus in the nude mouse, leprosy bacilli conceivably can grow and bloom unhampered.'

Appeals court upholds Rodriquez conviction

AUSTIN - The conviction of Frank Rodriquez in a Midland County court for delivery of heroin has been upheld by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals which found no reversible error. The opinion concludes there could have been no conflict of interest on the part of Rodriquez's court-appointed attorne.y because he was representing a possible witness in the Rodriquez case in a workmen's compensation claim.

The possible witness. Elmer Don Culp. yas never subpoensed or called as a witness. The state's undercover officer had testified that he, in company with Culp, met Rodriquez and made arrangements to buy

Judge W. A. Morrison, who wrote the opinion, also held that the trial court did not err when it refused to allow Rodriquez to discharge his_ court-appointed attorney and hire one

was set for trial. Morrison, wrote back, has long been the rule" that the defendent's right to select his own counsel should not be manipulated in a way that would obstruct justice and the orderly procedure of the court.

Both John Culver, D-Nev., and Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., said Tuesday they would oppose Bush because his past service as GOP party chairman and his interest in the vice presidency create the appearance of par-

Leahy also said that "informal nose counts" showed it was unlikely the Bush nomination would be defeated either in committee or on the Senate

Chairman Frank Church of the Senate intelligence committee, Bush's most vocal opponent, also acknowledged to a reporter he would not be able to block Bush's confirmation.

Armed Services Chairman John Stennis, D-Miss., told reporters he was hopeful action on the nomination could be completed before the Senate begins its Christmas recess on Friday.

Church, D-Idaho, and Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., both with avowed presidential ambitions of their own, urged Tuestay that Bush be ruled out as a vice presidential candidate in 1976 before he is confirmed to head the CfA Otherwise, Church said, Bush would be "hopelessly compromised" in his dealings with President Ford.

Jackson, who stopped short of declaring that he would note against Bush, said he was concerned that Bush would have to resign from the CIA after only a short time in office if he were named to the GOP ticket by

While refusing to rule out a vice presidential candidacy, Bush said his chances of being named as Ford's running mate "would be insignificant and they would be diminished further when I keep my word and stay out of

Bush also inssted that his political career as a congressman and chairman of the Republican party had not affected his ability to perform in two foreign policy posts - U.S. ambassador to he United Nations and chief U.S. reresentative in Peking.

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

He explained, however, that he believes that some of the abuses committed by the CIA in the past were "outrageous and morally offensive." He said a presidential order to assassinate a foreign leader would be one issue on which he would be forced to resign if he could not change the president's mind. This is the kind of man George Bush really is.

As to politics, Bush said he could not "in all honesty" promise to refuse an offer of the Republican vice presidential nomination in order to assure his confirmation as CIA chief. But he promised he would not seek public. office while serving in the office for which he has been nominated.

We have now obtained access to Northrop's expense logs. These show the company spent thousands of dollars renting lodges, leasing shooting rights, fixing goose blinds and wining-dining military guests. The same, guests often played a role in awarding defense contracts.

On a sample weekend, for example, Northrop spent \$1,821.36 to entertain its guest hunters. This was the bill for 'entertainment' alone for the November 1-3, 1973 weekend.

Until the early 1970s, Northrop housed the hunters at public hotels. But the guests began to get nervous that they might be spotted. This was the reason the company began leasing lodges where more privacy could be

Turkish tragedy deepens; Soviets stand to benefit

By ROWLAND EVANS And ROBERT NOVAK

WASHINGTON - The impasse between the United States and Turkey, instead of being resolved with a loosening of the arms embargo, has now worsened to the point where restoration of anything close to intimacy between the two old allies is utterly ruled out - an ominous development in the strategic Eastern Mediterranean.

Without public acknowledgement, private negotiations, begun after Congress in October repealed the most objectionable part of the Turkish arms embargo, are now mired deep in Washington-Ankara sludge. Some officials here doubt the U.S. can ever again become chief arms supplier for its faithful ally.

That would mean finding other ways to keep Turkey viable as eastern anchor of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). One possible way: make other NATO members responsible for supplying Turkey's army, thereby ending the long special relationship between Washington and

Any possible "Natoizing" of the Turkish army is for the future. For now, this much is tragically certain: Turkey will never fully recover from the blow to its pride and arms by the congressional embargo, implying permanent loss of this country's towering influence with the Eastern Mediterranean's key power.

American diplomats hoped the embargo's repeal would, partly restore U.S. prestige and encourage Turkey to permit active use of U.S. anti-Soviet espionage bases. Such



hope flattened the moment the new negotiations opened Oct. 28. What came through to U.S. negotiators with thundering clarity was this impossible Turkish demand: a U.S. pledge that the flow of American arms would never be interrupted again, either insultingly by

congressional edict or otherwise. The demand invokes Catch-22. No such pledge could be given under the U.S. constitutional system. Even if it could, the U.S. would pledge nothing without a prior understanding that the Turkish government would pull back some troops from Cyprus and return some territory seized during Turkey's 1974 invasion. Turkey refuses to do

The impasse is described by one U.S. official: "We've gotten ourselves caught in a Catch-22 situation. They want something we wouldn't give. even if we could, without getting something from them they won't give

So deep is the impasse that Turkey has suggested a radical transformation of its underlying relationship with Washington along lines of the U.S. Spanish bases. agreement. Instead of the U.S. having base rights given it by an ally, the U.S. would negotiate a long-term treaty with Turkey guaranteeing annual rental payments for American use of the bases as in the case of Spain. Once the treaty had been confirmed by the Senate, U.S. payments to Turkey could not be interrupted by congressional em-

But the relationship between allies (Turkey and the U.S.) and non-allies (Spain and the U.S.) is profoundly different. NATO commits the U.S. to come to the defense of Turkey in case of Communist attack. Spain, with no such commitment from Washington, has every right to charge money for

U.S. bases. Consequently U.S. officials flatly reject such a transformation of the U.S.-Turkish' relationship. Besides, Congress would almost certainly never approve a Turkish bases treaty.

At last week's NATO meeting in Brussels, Secretary of State Henry Kissinger tried again to break the Greek-Turkish deadlock over Cyprus - the source of all the trouble. Kissinger has been extremely active recently trying to soften Turkey's understandable but potentially suicidal hard line. One Kissinger ploy: secretly dispatching Democratic Rep. Wayne Hays of Ohio to Ankara last week for a long huddle. with Turkish Prime Minister Suleyman Demeril.

According to Defense Department officials, Demeril told Hays that since the five major American bases now closed down are all intelligence stations, the U.S. should guarantee regular payments to Turkey. Spy bases, said Demeril, are an obvious provocation to Moscow, which would

make them immediate targets in case

Some progress could result from Kissinger's efforts in Brussels to keep Greeks and Turks in regular contact on the Cyprus issue and from Cyprus negotiations scheduled next month under United Nations auspices. Certainly Greece wants a settlement. Presumably so does Turkey, which was chastised in the UN General Assembly last month, 117 to 1, on the Cyprus question.

But similar anemic signs of "progress" have been a running part of the tragic Cyprus affair for more than a year. They do not modify the harsh truth that Turkey has been transformed from faithful friend to sullen stranger, with dangerous liabilities for the U.S. and NATO and potential assets for the Soviet Union.

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
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Iran asserts industrial nations to blame for woes of Third World

PARIS (AP) - Iran today forcefully rejected an assertion by Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger that the oil producing countries were mostly responsible for the financial bind of the poor nations.

Iranian Interior Minister Jamshid Amouzegar told the conference on international economic cooperation that, on the contrary, it was the industrialized West which was responsible.

Amouzegar led off the expected stiff response by the oil producers to Kissinger's statement Tuesday on the first day of the conference. The two statements underlined that despite expressions of conciliation the two sides had not budged in the year of preparatory work leading up to the landmark conference.

Kissinger had said "the energy crisis ... has dealt a serious blow to global stability and prosperity" and that the oil producers therefore had to bear most of the burden of helping the poor nations with their balance of payments deficits.

'The staggering deficits in the

payment balances of the (developing countries) in 1975 and beyond cannot be simply or simplistically blamed on any one factor - certainly not the oil price rise," Amouzegar told the foreign ministers and high officials of the 27 participants.

"Their financial difficulties result mainly from inadequacies of export earnings, accelerated inflation and deepened recession in the West." Amouzegar said. "...The cruelest blow to developing countries' chances of accelerated development has come not from the oil price rise but from higher costs of imported food, industrial manufactures. Western services and capital goods."

Kissinger's speech was the major statement on the first day of the meeting, which is to launch a year of negotiations to create a new and more stable world economic order.

Kissinger repeatedly pointed out that the price increases by the Arabs and other oil-exporting nations had hurt the other Third World nations much more than they have harmed the industrialized countries of the Northern Hemisphere. The latter countries have largely recovered, he said, and it is the poor nations who are now suffering the most.

Saudi Arabia's Oil Minister, Sheik Ahmed Zaki Yamani, spoke after Kissinger. His speech was not made available to newsmen, but a U.S. source said it was "on the whole balanced and moderate.'

Yamani and Kissinger met privately after the opening conference session. A U.S. spokesman said they had "a constructive exchange of views on the conference and the Middle East."

Bouteflika was to have breakfast with Kissinger today before delivering his speech. The secretary of state was scheduled to spend most of the day in private meetings with representatives of other countries rather than in the conference hall.

Kissinger held his first meeting with the new Spanish foreign minister. Count Jose Maria de Areilza, on Tuesday to discuss the status of the three U.S. military bases in Spain. Negotiations for a new agreement covering them were inerrupted in October by Generalissimo Francisco Franco's

Jail reforms ordered

HOUSTON (AP) - U.S. Dist. Court Judge Carl O. Bue Jr. has ordered sweeping jail reforms for Harris County and hinted he may order jail facilities closed if the county does not

Bue said state court judges in this county have 15 days to set up a new pre-trial release system, replacing one currently headed by county commissioners.

The judge said he will meet with county officials in six months & discuss a major jail building program, including the amount of money which would be spent.

He made the decision Tuesday in acting on a suit filed in 1972 by county inmates, who alleged poor conditions in the county jails.

Bue said if the county did not meet the standards he sets forth, his court would not hesitate to follow the course of other jurisdictions, namely closing

The pre-trial release program must be moved from the courthouse to the new municipal court building. Bue ordered. It also must operate on a 24hour basis and an objective system must be set up to determine if

Other standards ordered by Bue included: Counsel for indigent prisoners within 24 hours after being charged; two new annex courts set up within 90 days to handle nothing but jail dockets; present jail cells cleaned daily and inspected monthly; a dining hall, fulltime dietitian, clean clothes daily instead of once a week, exercise three times a week and a budget for vocational and educational rehabilitation programs.

NASA promotes Slayton


Houston (AP) -Astronaut Donald K Slayton, one of the nation's original seven astronauts, has been named deputy director of flight operations for approach and landing tests of the space shuttle.

The announcement by Johnson Space Center officials Tuesday said the 51-year-old Slayton will be in charge of planning and implementing a program to test how best to land the space shuttle, a reusable spacecraft which is launched like a rocket into space and lands on earth like an airplane.

Despite the new management position, officials said Slayton will continue as an astronaut and will be eligible for future space missions. Slayton is the only of the original seven U.S. spacemen who is still an

active astronaut. Officials said Slayton's main office will be at the Johnson Space Center, but he will spend much time at the Flight Research Center in California where the shuttle tests will be

I imagine Kleenex stock probably jumps two or three points this time of


And if the story HAS to have a happy ending, if Scrooge HAS to show up with a Christmas dinner for the Cratchits, then let us see plenty of misery before that.



The Washington Post WASHINGTON - The Justice Department is preapred to file an unprecedented antitrust suit against Bechtel, Inc. of San Francisco for allegedly participating in the Arab boycott of Israel.

The suit is being held up by the State Department, according to informed sources.

These sources said tuesday that, despite State Department "concern" over the foreign policy implications of the civil suit, it is likely that Justice will proceed before the end of January.

If the government wins its test case against Bechtel, a large construction firm, American corporations may be. faced with a choice of losing billions of dollars a year of business with the Arab countries or being charged with criminal violations of U.S. law.

While it is not unusual for the Justice Dept. to consult the State Dept. before a suit with foreign policy implications is filed, Justice sources said that only the President can order a prospective suit to be dropped.

Justice does not expect this to happen in this case since President Ford has said publicly that he is

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opposed to U.S. acquiescence to the Arab boycott of Israeli goods and of corporations that do business with

Justice sources said that the case against Bechtel is "not simple" and would involve new interpretations of U.S. antitrust law. It could not be learned Tuesday why Bechtel was singled out for the test case since Justice has said it is investigating "a number of U.S. firms" that may have

Bechtel had no immediate comment on the Justice Department suit or on Bechtel's record with regard to the Arab boycott.

The Washington Post obtained a copy that appeared to be a Bechtel, Inc. "invoicing instructions," sent to the construction firm's American subcontractors and reportedly forwarded to the Justice Department by the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation

According to the purported Bechtel document, suppliers must attach to invoices the following certification: "We hereby certify that the goods

enumerated in this invoice are not of Israeli origin nor do they contain any Israeli materials nor were they shipped on vessels boycotted by the Israeli Boycott Office nor were they designated to visit an Israeli port nor were they exported from Israel.

"We hereby certify that the goods enumerated in this invoice are of U.S.A. origin." The bechtel document was one of several from Amreican companies provided the Justice Department by B'nai B'rith earlier this year, government sources said.







missionary or an evangelist. And \$10 gets you a chaplain's rating or a license to preach.

An additional \$25 "free-will offering" to Calvary Grace Church of Faith in Rillton, Pa., brings "an embellished elaborate ordination certificate on fine paper bearing our corporate gold seal.

Calvary Church is just one of perhaps 100 mail-away outfits throughout the United States that offers ordination and degrees in religious subjects for little or no work and without educational requirements.

What the mail-order churches and religious schools advertise is true: their ordinations are just as valid in the eyes of the state as those received after years of college and seminary training.

THE RELUCTANCE of the government to tamper with the free exercise of religion protected by the First Amendment makes it possible for these churches and religious schools to remain in business.

On the one hand, many feel mailorder ordination is probably just the price of freedom of religion.

'Most people would not want the government to declare which ordinations are valid and which are phony." wrote the Rev. William Whalen

recently in U.S. Catholic magazine. "At the same time it is worth becoming aware of the ease with which anyone can become a minister.

Only 18 states exercise any control over mail-order degrees.

Thus, for as little as \$10, someone can become an instant "Ph.D." or

"D.D." and open an office for marriage counseling or spiritual therapy.

The practice of granting religious and metaphysical degrees to persons who might not be able to qualify for them through traditional channels is proliferating, according to Milton Hood of the California Board of School Approvals in Los Angeles.

Such degrees are seen by many who seek them as the ticket to jobs, prestige and legal status within the religious community.

The Cadillac of the minister-bymail organizations is the Universal Life Church (ULC), headed by gradeschool dropout Bishop Kirby J. Hensley.

The Modesto-based ULC says it has ordained more than 3 million ministers (for free) since 1962, and has issued thousands of honorary doctor of divinity degrees (\$20 donation).

ON GROUNDS that his "constitutional right to free exercise of religious beliefs" had been violated. Hensley successfully won a six-year court battle last summer.

Hensley, a one-time carpenter who was born in a log cabin in Low Gap. N.C., was convicted in San Jose in 1969 and fined \$625 for violating the California Education Code for charging for his mail-order doctor of divini-

(His right to ordain ministers was upheld in a separate action in which a judge ruled that the ULC, founded in Hensley's garage in Modesto in 1962, met legal requirements of being organized with officers and trustees.)

The 9th U.S. Court of Appeals overturned the conviction, ruling that Hensley did not violate the Education Code because he had prescribed no educational requirements for the degrees.

Though the Board of School Approvals says it is still investigating Hensley, his operation - and others like it - at least for now appear to be free and clear of the law.

BUT SOME schools offering religious and other degrees are in trouble.

One, using a Pasadena, Calif., post office box address (and also doing business through Arizona and Tennessee addresses) is Jackson State University (not affiliated with Jackson State in Mississippi).

Jackson State's listing in a catalogue entitled "How and Where to Obtain a College Degree by Mail," says: "Our approach to education is considered by many as unusual because we require no courses, books. or form of study for our degree applicants ...

For "tax-deductible donations" applicants are offered: "high school diploma, \$75; bachelor degree, \$125; master's degree, \$150, Ph.D., \$180; 20 per cent discount if more than one degree ordered simultaneously." Jackson State claims to be "a nonprofit college under the administration of the Church of Universal

Education. A Los Angeles federal district court last August issued a preliminary injunction against Jackson State on the basis of allegations by postal authorities that it was falsely representing itself as a bona fide university with power to confer academic degrees

The injunction has kept Jackson State from receiving incoming mail including what one postal inspector said included many checks totaling a large sum. The mail, held in Pasadena since the order, will be returned to its senders if the government ultimately wins the case, he ad-

POSTAL authorities also told The

Dec. 15

Los Angeles Times that investigation is being made of other schools and a Southern California mail order pamphlet that tells how to obtain degrees through the mail.

Neither Jackson State nor the Universal Life Church has sought state authorization to grant degrees, according to the state Bureau of School Approvals.

The bureau has no control over the so-called-mail-order degree mills, according to field representative Collier McDermon, "except to see, whenever we are aware of their operation, if they are complying with the Education Code.

If they do not comply, then they are referred to the office of the state attorney general.

And the bureau's power to police and standardize the performance of schools that do qualify to offer degrees under a controversial section of the code is extremely weak.

Of California's 1,800 private schools, about 60 religiously oriented ones fall in the "A-3" category of section 29023 of the state Department of Education Code.

Under this provision, almost anyone who can muster \$50,000 in assets and a \$300 filing fee can qualify to open a school and grant degrees ranging from the A.A. (Associate in Arts) up to and including the Ph.D.

REQUIREMENTS for issuing both academic and honorary degrees under the A-3 section are so general that the quality of education offered runs from very poor to outstanding.

"A-3 as now written is an absolute tragedy" as far as the public is concerned, declared Herbert Summers,

school approvals chief in Sacramento. "You don't have to do anything, really. It's unbelievable... there are terrible loopholes.

McDermon added in an interview

that there are "many good A-3 schools" with high standards of academic excellence and adequate facilities.

Others in the school approvals office share his opinion that the A-3 degree mills give a black eye to quality A-3 schools - some of which move up to obtain accreditation from recognized associations or state approval.

The amphorous nature of the A-3 code section - and its loopholes cause particular problems for religious schools and the clergy profession.

For example, there is general misunderstanding about whether such schools have state approval or endorsement to issue degrees.

Often, according to an informal Times survey, the institution implies that it does have such approval.

IN FACT, the A-3 code section clearly specifies that no A-3 school may represent in any way that the state "has made any evaluation,recognition, accreditation, approval or endorsement of the course of

All the state has done is to grant the school permission to issue degrees,

cautions McDermon. 'Schools that state or imply approval under the A-3 code are violating the law," he said.

A small, new religious school often has no altérnative but to begin operating under the A-3 category. And some church schools, for doctrinal reasons, never desire accreditation from secular agencies.

Bureau of School Approvals officials generally would like to abolish the A-3 category of private schools, chiefly because it does not provide for quality control or inspections.

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

risk to persons living near the plants. An estimated \$198 million in new pollution-control equipment will be needed, EPA said, when the rules take effect in the spring

The chemical, which came into increasingly wider use in the early 1950s, is used in the manufacture of a broad array of products, including shoes, garden hoses, electrical wiring, heavy coats, phonograph records, upholstery, sporting goods

and flooring. EPA Administrator Russell E Train said that 58 plants would be affected by the regulations, and some may close because of them.

Train said that between one and 20 deaths from cancer attributable to vinyl chloride exposure have been recorded, but researchers have determined that it takes 20 years for the cancer to appear.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Oilstate senators who blocked final congressional action Tuesday night on an energy bill that would temporarily roll back prices of gasoline and heating oil say they probably will not try to prevent a vote much longer.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., has said that body would not begin its year-end holiday recess until the bill is disposed of. Work here had been scheduled to end Friday.

Sen. John Tower, R-Tex., said he and other opponents of the measure probably would agree to a Senate vote sometime today.

The legislation would roll back the price of oil for about 20 months before allowing it to rise again and would restore for 40 months the federal oilprice controls that expired Mon-

President Ford has not said whether he would sign or veto the bill, which Federal Energy Administrator Frank Zarb supports The opponents contend that the

bill's provisions would take away price incentives for U.S. oil com-

panies to increase their production.

NEW YORK - Going into the

bicentennial year, a fascinating picture emerges of just where the United States is today

It's a country where childbearing is going out of style and marriage might

It's a place of seeming inequities. where \$281 million is spent in a year on clock and table radios and \$154 million for crippled children.

It's a place of great opportunities, where the number of millionaires has tripled in a decade to 222,000, and (fortune-hunters take note) 18,000 of them are unattached men and 61,000 are single or widowed women.

Some of these trends might not be the ones that bicentennial boosters

will be citing when they orate about the United States at age 200. But they are all down in the fine print of the most authoritative diary of a nation, "The Statistical Abstract of the United States - 1975.

Offered without comment by the U.S. Census Bureau, some of the trends contained in the tabular matter are the kinds of things that politicians and planners seem sure to be arguing about as the nation goes into its third century:

THE FAMILY: For the first time since the Supreme Court legalized abortions in 1973, there are some definitive figures on just how widespread this trend has become.

Last year about 1.6 per cent of all women of prime child-bearing age had a legal abortion, compared with 6 per cent who chose to have a child.

In some places, there now are more legal abortions than there are births, notably in the capital itself, with 4,208 for every 1,000 births, and in New York City, with 1,408 for every 1,000. All told around the nation there were 31,137,000 births last year and 745,000 legal abortions

Babies once were being born at the rate of 25 for every thousand in the population. That was back in 1957. Now the rate has gone down to about 15, according to the '73-'74 figures. Since 1970, the marriage rate has gone down about 1 per cent, the birth rate has gone down 18 per cent and the

divorce rate has soared by about 31 actually a lot lower than the per cent.

QUALITY OF LIFE: Americans shunned electric corn-poppers last year, buying only 3 million of them. In fact they stayed away from most new appliances, except for steam irons and electric hotplates.

They were reading more books about business, sports and medicine - up 10 per cent alone - but a lot fewer works of poetry, foreign languages and what the census experts classified as "literature."

Security: While New York City was being criticized for its crime-in-thestreets, the state's rate of 10.6 murders per 100,000 population was conservative South's, where Georgia led the nation with a 17.8 rate, South Carolina scored 16.2 and Louisiana 16. (In frontier Alaska it was 13.6, while North Dakota was the safest place, with only 1.4).

For a crime whose punishment is directly tied into politics, the raw data shows that the average draft evader is being sentenced to only 14.5 months in prison these days compared with more than three years (37.3 months) back in 1968.

OTHERS: The nation really shouldn't have had much trouble finding a doctor. There were 338,000 active MD's around at last count. against only 311,000 in 1970. But if they looked and talked differently as they thumped your chest, it wasn't your imagination. During that period, the number of foreign medical-school graduates here more than doubled, to

One final note: From what the government statisticians tell us about their own employes, we get the clear indication that the federal government hasn't been much better to minority groups than the rest of the nation has been. In the seven years between 1976 and mid-1974 the number of full-time minority employes of the federal government increased by only about 3 per cent.

Author hides face because of book Brazil

NEW YORK (AP) - There's a woman traveling around the country with a black "Lone Ranger" mask on her face. Sometimes she even puts a brown paper bag over her head when

being photographed or interviewed on television. But no masked rider of the plains is she. She calls herself "J. Aphrodite," and is the author of a book on sex fantasies for women. She says she hides because of the book's subject, because she has a six-year-old daughter and because her telephone number is listed. But the mask adds that tinge of oddball mystery that publicists are fond of while promoting books, especially books

The 34-year-old writer talked recently about herself and why she wrote "To Turn You On." a book she insists is not autobiographical. 'I'm very interested in turning on," she said

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unmasked, sitting in the lounge of the Museum of Modern Art. "You can have it all if you have it mentally.

Many sex therapists recommend fantasy books and articles for their patients who are attempting to understand sexual pleasure, she said. But most are written by male psychologists who try to interpret female fantasies for the

"To Turn You On" was written and edited by women. It is a compilation of fantasies submitted to J. Aphrodite by friends.

"Friends told friends, and they'd call with ideas that emerged from consciousness raising groups or just discussion," she said. "In every case, they were things that turned women on. Some were very traditional - seduction. domination.

There are 39 fantasies in the book, ranging from sexual encounters with a masseuse, a gynecologist, a delivery boy and one's best friend, to sex in a pornographic movie, swimming pool, the office, a fraternity house and a

"I spoke to a lot of women around my age some older, some younger - and I wanted to talk to much older women who have a very special sexual approach and need," she said. "So I added chapters on widows and women who looked less than perfect.'

This is the first book for J. Aphrodite, a book editor who grew up in New York City's Brooklyn, where she said she had a "typically lowermddleclass experience." She was 18 when she married and 30 when she divorced.

"I am young enough to identify with some of the new sexual values and old enough to know about repression," she said. "Why do we need permission? Sex is such a pleasurable thing. I made a very concerted effort to have women respond the way I think they really do.'

Some feminists have objected to the book, saving some of the fantasies perpetuated longstanding myths about male domination in sex. They particularly disliked the chapters dealing with seduction by the gynecologists, n a gay bar and

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
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
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
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Chorale decked

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

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Bentsen supports tax cut, phaseout of controls

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Lloyd Bentsen says employment will be the leading issue in the 1976 presidential campaign, and restoring optimism to the United States by improving the economy must be the top priority of

Bentsen, a first-term senator from Texas seeking the 1976 Democratic presidential nomination, believes the Ford administration's economic plans will prohibit full employment until after 1980 and that without economic growth, improvements in education, health care and housing will not be achieved.

Bentsen also made these points in

-The 1975 tax reductions, some \$16 billion, should be extended but cuts should not be as deep as those proposed by President Ford. Acrosstheboard spending cuts should also be imposed, a goal generally shared by

the Ford administration. -Oil price controls should be phased out "over a period of months" and price controls on natural gas should be abandoned over a period of

-Too much emphasis has been placed on U.S.-Soviet and U.S.-Chinese relationships to the exclusion of traditional U.S. allies and Japan, Latin America and Africa.

-Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger has failed to "institutionalize" foreign policy in the State Department, making it, instead, "an extension of his own per-

"I feel jobs will be the foremost issue of the 1976 campaign," Bentsen said. "Healthy, stable economic growth is the key to fighting both joblessness and rising prices.

He said confidence is "the biggest asset and resource this country has.' but it has been "fiddled away by this administration and the previous administration because of the lack of credible leadership and because of economic maladministration.

"We can't restore optimism, put put pressure on the Federal Reserve people back on payrolls, stop inflation, provide for health care, education, housing and the other concerns of Americans without a reasonable growth in our economy.

This must be our No. 1 priority. His economic positions are built around three suggestions.

He has proposed offering a tax credit to encourage increased hiring. He would create a youth employment service to reduce unemployment among young people and he would establish a "national job clearinghouse" to link the unemployed with jobs throughout the

The senator said the employment tax credit would cost nothing, because the reduced tax receipts would be balanced by a greater saving in reduced unemployment compensation payments by the govern-

"I'd give a 10 per cent employment tax credit on the first \$8,000 of salary for hiring the unemployed who have been out of work for at least six weeks," he said. The six-week provision would prohibit employers from 'simply hiring each others' workers. Hiring would be required at levels greater than in 1974 or 1975.

He predicted that such a scheme would produce "permanent jobs, not make-work jobs" for 600,000 to one million persons in two years.

Bentsen says substantial budget cuts in all areas of government, which he advocates, would not damage attempts to reduce unemployment if the cuts are coupled with certain adjustments.

'We have to get a handle on government spending," he said. But Bentsen refused to say how much he wants cut or where it should be cut until . President Ford submits his budget proposals in January.

He said a key to fighting inflation would be reduced lending interest rates and that as president he would

Board to bring about lowered rates.

Bentsen favors removal of price controls from oil and natural gas to assure producers that the return on their investment will be sufficient to make continued exploration for more

supplies worthwhile Federal regulation has discouraged exploration for natural gas and encouraged waste of natural

gas for 20 years," he said. He believes the United States will never be able to elimina all oil

Bentsen

imports, but that with increased domestic production and emphasis on energy sources other than oil, virtual energy independence can be established at some unspecified future date.

Use of coal should be increased, he said, and solar energy should eventually become a "cornerstone of our national energy policy.

Bentsen criticized what he said was the failure to present a united front with other oil consuming nations in dealing with the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

"We have a big bargaining tool if we can get these consumer nations . to bargain together against the OPEC countries," he said.

Texans defeated on picketing bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - Both U.S. senators from Texas were on the losing side Monday as the Senate voted 52-43 to send the constrution site picketing bill to President Ford. Democrat Lloyd Bentsen and Republican John Tower both opposed

Bentsen said he has someone in mind for the position of secretary of state in any Bentsen administration, but he refused to name him.

'I'd be looking for one that would not be concentrating so much on just China and Russia," he said. "My secretary of state must possess greater expertise in economics, must place higher priority on openness in the process by which we develop foreign policy, and must be far less formation from the executive branch insistent on running the whole show

"I'd be trying to trade more where I thought we'd get a quid pro quo. I think there's been too much concern with coming home to some television extravaganza to try to display an. aura of success without enough concern for the details of the trade."

Bentsen said he favors continued attempts to reach a strategic arms limitation accord with the Soviet Union, but he refused to specify what it should include, citing a lack of inon which to base an opinion.



West follows with a diamond, and you have not committed yourself on the play of the trumps. Your object is to avoid committing yourself.

Give up another spade. No matter what is returned, you can ruff a diamond in your hand and a spade in dummy. Cash the top clubs, reducing to one club and three trumps in each



I've missed the staff, the players, the strategy and the field work, but I haven't missed the other demands that go with college football. I have already declared that I would not return to the collegiate game. After a great deal of consideration, I've elected not to coach professional football in 1976."

Parseghian, who suffered from high blood pressure during his final season at Notre Dame, said his health "was

not a factor" in his decision. Looking fit and tanned, he said:

"I feel very good health-wise. I was living at much too fast a pace during my 11 years at Notre Dame. I'm in excellent health right now. My blood pressure is normal, with control. I don't have the anxiety I had during the last year of my coaching career." Parseghian will continue to live in

South Bend, Ind., where he has an insurance and public relations agency. He also will continue his fundraising activities for the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

Should he decide a year from now that he wants to get back into coaching, Parseghian said he has no worries about finding a job or

adapting to the pro ranks. "The basics for coaching success are fundamental on any level," he

Each episode of his TV series will consist of young people participating in three different sports, plus a fourth segment of instruction by a wellknown athlete. Local, regional and national championship events will be covered from coast to coast.

Parseghian described the show as dealing with "participation, dedication and self-discipline, not winning.

"One of the few regrets I've had in my life is that I haven't worked with youngsters in their formative years," he said. "All of us who have worked with young people know that the greatest satisfaction comes from helping form the attitude that is the

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


