CLYDE — The Board of Trustees of Clyde ISD met in a called session April 10th, for the purpose of canvassing the election held April 7th, and for the purpose of organizing for the 1973-74 year.

The election was found to be in order and L. G. Chrane, Wayne Stezler and Duane Bennett were declared elected. The oath of office was administered to the newly elected members.

James Briscoe was elected as president of the board for the new year. Mr. Briscoe replaces Weldon Edwards, who had served as president for the past ten years. Mr. Briscoe has been a member of the board for 18 years and has served as vice-president since the resignation of Luyston Blanks in August of 1972.

Leo Chrane was elected vice-president for the new year. Mr. Chrane has served the local district as a board member for nine years.

He replaces James Briscoe as vice-president.

Frank Bailey was re-elected Secretary of the board. Mr. Bailey is the senior member of the Clyde board having served since 1953. He has served as secretary for the past 18 years.

BAIRD — Rodeo time is drawing near and entertainment is being planned for the week of April 30th, through May 5th. Many people are taking interest in the upcoming Western Week in Baird, and you are invited to come and join the fun.

So brush up the old hat, polish the old boots and travel along with us as we celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo.

Beginning April 30th, a part of 2nd and Market Street will be roped off for a square dance contest by various couples throughout the area. Ralph McMullen will be the caller and the couples swing their partners to a "How're You All."

To open the Rodeo celebration, a parade will proceed down Market Street at 5 p. m. Thursday, May 3rd.

Shanks Trial Re-Set For May 10 in Austin

AUSTIN — The trial of Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks has been postponed until May 10 in 167th District Court in Austin. Shanks, along with two other men, was arrested in Pease Park on February 13, by a City Park Ranger in a public rest room, and later charged with sodomy.

The three men were to have been tried Monday, without a jury, however, Judge Thomas Blackwell reset the trial to the later date at the request of Shanks' attorney, Charles Burton of Austin.

The two men arrested with Shanks are Ronald Burke, and Roberto Caraveo. Burke is employed by a state agency, and Caraveo is a sales clerk.

City Park Ranger Vernon Gunn, arresting officer, will be the single state witness in the May 10th trial, according to Travis County District Attorney's office.

Selan Canada Indicted Thursday By 42nd District Grand Jury

BAIRD — Selan Canada, 50, was indicted April 12 by a 42nd District Court grand jury for attempted murder, in connection with the March 2nd shooting of Callahan County Deputy Sheriff Luke Taylor of Clyde.

Canada was indicted for "assault with intent to murder" in the shooting which occurred northwest of Baird, on property leased by Canada. The father of nine children, Canada was released after posting a \$5,000 bond after the shooting and a trial date has not been set. Taylor has remained in the hospital since that time, and has not regained consciousness.

Three more felony indictments were returned Thursday by the grand jury. Marshall Sublett and Danny Weeks were indicted for "malicious destruction of private property, in connection with an incident on January 6th, in which several street lights and pickup campers were damaged by gunfire. Two expensive German Shepherd dogs were found shot to death at one of the shooting scenes, officers said.

Conn Rider was indicted for driving while intoxicated, second offense.

Information was presented to the grand jury by Criminal Dist. Atty Ed Paynter, and Asst. Dist. Atty. Billy John Edwards.

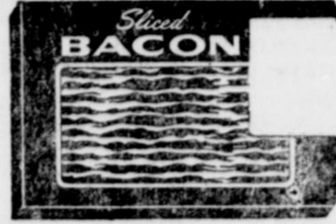

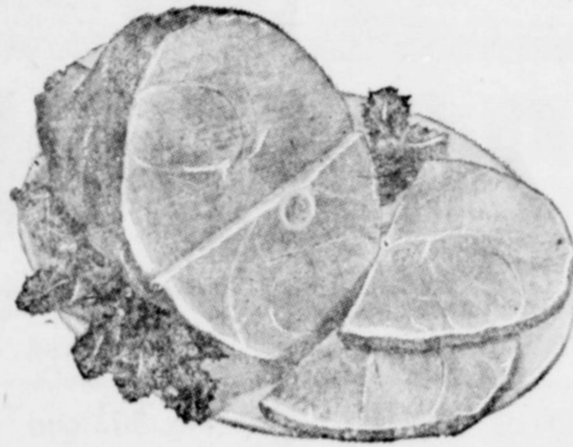
