ter in the interior of the earth. Then we say the volcano is erupting or that it is active. Sometimes the vent gets plugged up with solid volcanic material and the lava, smoke, gases, etc., cannot get out. In that case the volcano is said to be inactive.

Nevertheless, the hot seething mass of matter remains under the dormant volcano and gases under high pressure constantly seek an outlet through the volcanc shaft. In periods of great sun-spot activity, scientists tell us, these gases are expanded enormously by the magnetic waves from the sun. At length they exert such a pressure that the plug or "cork" of the volcano is blown out.

Different Fabrics As and Stains

The removal of stains is a necessary feature of the laundering and general care of clothing and other household textiles. Nearly all stains may be removed easily at home if reliable methods are known.

One of the most important factors is to apply the stain remover while the stain is still fresh. Drying, exposure to air, washing and ironing, all makes it harder to remove the The nature of the stain should be known if possible before its removal is attempted. since this deter-Sterling Silver Table War and mines the treatment to be adopted. An unsuitable stain remover may "set" the stain so, its removal becomes difficult or even impossible.

Treatment Depends on Fabric. The kind of fabric on which the stain occurs also should be known, for the method of treatment depends much on the nature, color, weave, finish and weight of the fabric. Do not use strong acids on cotton, and even diluted ones should be neutralized afterwards with a suitable alkali. Care should be taken in the use of alkali, as it weakens the fabric. After any reagent rinse the fabric

well. Do not use very hot water on wool or silk. Rubbing also must be avoided with these fabrics. Both wool and silk are dissolved by strong alkalis; borax or a weak solution of ammonia is more suitable. with the exception of nitric, do not sorbent; or warm water and soap; or attack silk and wool readily.

With colored materials avoid use chloride. California of a bleaching agent which will deare sure stroy the color of the material. Beg the best and most cause of this it is much more difficult to remove stains from colored materliver and bowels, ial than from white.







If all the harness leather tanners in the country should quit buying hides, it would have practically no effect on hide prices for the reason that harness leather is so small an item compared with the really big business in sole, belting, automobile and upper leathers. You see therefore that the price of harness leather hides, harness leather and manufactured harness is, and is always going to be, governed by the prices that the tanners of these other leathers will pay for hides. At the present time one of the largest tanners of harness leather is quitting it and it is reported that another large one is preparing to quit. The reason is because harness leather is not selling on a replacement basis, based on the present prices of the kind of hides that must be used to make harness leather. Native steers, 48c, Heavy Native Cows, 47c and Light Native Cows 50c. We see no prospect of people going bare foot, factories running without belts or a let up in the use of upholstery in automobiles. There is no prospect of a drop in prices on the best hides of the season being offered now and as the price of harness leather is dependent on the demand for other leathers and since tanners are quitting harness leather for the reason that they cannot produce it at present selling prices. we see no hope of lower prices for harness leather. On the other hand without a considerable decline in hide prices, of which there is no prospect, there is only one thing that can happen; harness leather must go up, for tanners will not produce it indefinitely at a loss.

MARKET LETTER

Kansas City Stock Yards, Oct. 13. Cattle prices were steady to 25 eents lower, hogs strong to 10 cents lower. Liberal receipts of cattle and sheep caused the weakness in those divisions, while hog receipts were barely large enough to meet urgent requirements.

Today's Receipts Cattle receipts today were 41,000, and the largest thus far this year, showing an increase of 1200 compar-ed with a week ago and 6000 compared with a year ago. Hog receipts were 11,000, the same as a week ago, and 2000 smaller than a year ago. Sheep receipts 19,000 were 9000 larger than a week ago, and 3000 larger than a year ago.

Beef Cattle. Good to choice fat cows and steers sold at steady prices, but the bulk of the arrivals were in the plain to fair classes and sold 15 to 25 cents off. No prime fed steers were offered. Some heavy Kansas steers sold at \$15.00 and \$15.25, and grass steers at \$13.00 to \$13.50. The bulk of the calvos were quoted steady.

Stockers and Feeders.


