## CLAUD HOLLEY, CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MANAGER, DIES

BAIRD — Claud Holley, 70, Manager of the Baird Chamber of Commerce and Executive Director of Baird Housing Authority, died Tuesday at 3:30 a. m. in Callahan County Hospital.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m. Wednesday in Godfrey Funeral Chapel, with Joe Wilson, minister of Baird church of Christ officiating assisted by Rev. Roger Powell, pastor of the First Baptist Church and Rev. Delton Fisher, pastor the First United Methodist Church. Bur-

ial was in Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery.

Mr. Holley was born Jan. 28, 1903 in Scurry County, and married the former Mary Nichols May 10, 1925 in Snyder. He moved to Baird in 1963 as manager of the Baird Chamber of Commerce. He was instrumental in obtaining Government Housing for Baird, and saw the third such housing project completed in early 1973.

He was a member of Baird Lions Club, of which he was treasurer for seven years, a member of the First Baptist Church in Baird, a former president of the United Fund and Callahan County Luncheon Club, a former president of the Graham National Bank and also served as Chamber manager in Graham. He was a former president of the Seminole bank.

He was active in getting the West Texas Telephone Co. to locate its new office building in Baird. He was appointed the Chamber's Feasibility Committee in 1965 to check on obtaining a Farm Home Administration loan to construct a golf course in Baird. The loan was obtained and the golf course became a reality in 1967.

The family requests the remembrances be made to the American Cancer Society.

Survivors are his wife, Mary; a sister, Mrs. Herbert Patterson of Bellevue, Wash.; an uncle, Loyd Holley of Snyder.
