Reported that Obregon Forces Captured 2000 Revolutionists at Puebla and Advance to Vera Cruz Continues

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 24.-In a sharp battle with the insurget forces under General Figuero, federal troops Monday recaptured Puenta de Ixtla, south of Cuernavaca i the state of Morelega, which was occupied by the rebels Saturday.

The enty-eight rebels were killed in a brief engagement, and

the rest of Figuero's troops retreatd to Iguluara.

In his message President Coolidge certainly invited the Soviet government to meet three requirements-compensation to American citizens who lost property during the revolution, recognition of the debt contracted by the Kerensky regime, and abatement of the spirit of e mity to our institutions.

Within three days M. Tchitcherin, on behalf of Russia, replied to this invitation and accepted every point with the provision that Russian losses resulting from the American invasion of Russian territory in Archangel and Siberia, also be con-

CHILD LABOR AND ILLITERACY

How large child labor bulks as an obstacle to scholastic progress may be judged by some statistics which the Children's Bureau of the United Mrs. H. W. The study was home of the bride's parents, 902 Aveconfined to the farms of six counties of the State and involved 845 children 10 years or more of age. It was found that nearly one-tenth of these children had missed half a school term, one-fifth had been absent 60 days in one year, one-third 40 days or more and one-half 20 days or more.

The farm, by the way, is a greater breeder of \$.60 child labor than is sometimes thought. 1.50 states which rigorously enforce complusory education laws in their industrial cities openly wink at violation of those same laws in the agricultural Dutside Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, \$1.00 per mo., districts, taking the ground that farm work keeps boys and girls in the open air and so is less harmful than work in a factory. More than one report of the Children's Bureau has called attention to this serious situation which not only keeps at least 1,000,000 Aemrican children in the rural districts from obtaining the common school education which they should have but also works irreparable harm to their physical well-being.

The recent North Dakota study is the first of a series to bring the whole question of rural child labor forcibly to the attention of the people of the country. Next will come investigations of the sugar beet fields of Colorado and Michigan; truck farms in Maryland, New Jersey, and Virginia; two cotton growing counties in Texas; tobacco fields of Kentucky, South Carolina, Virginia, Massachusetts, and Connecticut, and farms in three rural counties in Illinois.

TAX-EXEMPT SECURITIES

Both Democrats and Republicans admit the evil of tax-exempt bonds and securities. Just what administration is responsible for the act is beside the question and does not remedy the situation. It is an evil that should be corrected without delay:

Secretary Mellon recommends and President Coolidge indorses a constitutional amendment as the remedy. The Investment Bankers Asociation is solidly behind the suggestion, with the full knowledge that it would take several years to get it through—and even then it probably would not affect bonds issued by states. Meanwhile the exempt bonds will continue to flow at the rate now said to be a billíon dollars a year.

There is a short way of reaching not only Federal but State issues. It may not bring bonds already issued under taxation but it will stop fu-
